

Halifax Bank, although they have no gold for the payment of their own notes, will be ready enough to lend, and the next day they will receive it back from the Treasurer in exchange, in the Province Paper which they have hoarded up. Such a measure shall not have my sanction, and I hope not that of the Committee. I prefer restoring the currency to a sound state by compelling that Bank to do what every Bank ought to be prepared to do, and the propriety and necessity of which it has been my endeavour to point out. I do not pretend to accurate acquaintance with the subject, and I am taught the more I consider it, how very little I know about it. But I never remember to have opened a volume in which the subject is treated, without seeing it laid down as a fundamental and undeniable principle, that the only sound paper currency is one convertible into specie, and that this is the only safeguard and security against an excessive issue of the Bank.

In this as in other matters we may all lie under the influence of immediate interest or personal friendship, or be swayed by some other indirect and perhaps unknown bias. I may be equally liable to this suspicion—but in a measure in which the public interests are concerned, I trust we shall all form an opinion without regard to private considerations, and with a desire only to promote the public good.

The latest European dates are by way of New York—we copy the substance of extracts from the *Albion* of the 23rd February.

The *New York* has arrived from Liverpool bringing London papers to the 14th ult.

The intelligence by this vessel does not materially differ from our previous accounts, and we therefore content ourselves with the following brief summary with a copy of the details.

The reply of the last proposal of the British Government to Holland had been received, but the precise contents had not transpired. It was believed, however, that the advances of England had been met by a counter project of the Dutch Government, for the argument of all difficulties; and it is added, as had been before stated, that Holland had required as a preliminary step, the liberation of the garrison of the citadel of Antwerp, the removal of the blockade of her ports, and that permission should be given to the Dutch vessels to sail into English and French ports to proceed to their destination. It is even said that these demands will be complied with; that France has reluctantly considered the case, and is willing to grant notice of execution, the said Commission on the 19th day of February last, which was unavoidably postponed.

The copy of the last news from Oporto. The English papers contain a very voluminous correspondence from that place from which we gather, that the position of Don Pedro is not very enviable. A plan is spoken of, to restore tranquillity in Portugal; it is that both brothers should quit the country and Donna Maria assume the reins of government. This, if true has probably been concocted in the cabinet of Louis Philippe, who looks forward to marrying his second son to the young queen.

A great fire had taken place in Liverpool, in which 10 to 12,000 bales of cotton were consumed. The total damage said to be 150,000 pounds sterling.

The state of Ireland, according to the accounts before us, is most lamentable, and we fear that matters in that country are hastening on to a fearful contest. A large additional military force is on the point of being sent thither. The country of Kilkenny is in a very distressed state. 22 houses had been attacked by the Whites, principally with a view of disposing of holders of land taken in opposition to the regulations of the Whitefeet. 39 persons were committed to the county jail, during the month of Dec. for alleged offences against the government. Near Newport, in the county of Mayo, and near Newmarket in Cork, the police and peasantry had met and blood had flown profusely. The collection of tithes was again the exciting cause. Contested elections, in the counties of Westmeath and Longford, had considerably aggravated the disturbed state of the public mind there. On the 18th January, the National Council, so denominated by Mr. O'Connell, would meet with a view to consult on measures which would bring about a repeal of the Union. 28 members of Parliament, recently elected, had intimated their intention to attend.

The Belgic question is certainly a perplexed one, and the blockade of the Scheldt by the Dutch increases it with new difficulty. If the French army is returning to France, in fulfillment of the terms of the Convention, leaving Fort Lillo and a Dutch squadron unrecaptured, the state of Belgium is worse than ever. If the French army should re-advance and commit acts of aggression on Holland, then Prussia, according to her declaration to the German Diet, is bound to interfere and resist such aggression. But the latest accounts say that to the fresh overtures made by France and England to Holland, an answer had been returned which indicated a disposition to treat, but on a

basis somewhat different to that offered. After all we think that a fresh appeal to arms will not take place.

## West Indies.

Jamaica.—We received, just as we were going to press, Kingston papers, by the *Orbit*, to the 4th inst. We submit a few items only, lamenting that they exhibit a most disturbed and alarming state of the island.

A report was current that Commodore Farquhar would proceed to the North side of the island, in his Majesty's ship *Blanche*, for the purpose of affording protection to the Baptist preachers.

An ex-officio information had been filed by his Majesty's Attorney-General against the editor and publisher of the *Dispatch* newspaper, for a libel on his Excellency the Governor.

The Parishes of St. Mary, St. Ann, Tre-lawney, St. James, and Hanover, as represented in Committee of the Colonial Union, have solemnly pledged themselves, at the hazard of their lives, not to permit any Baptist or other sectarian preacher to teach or preach or teach in any house in towns where the influence of the Colonial Union extends. This resolution is accompanied by others expressive of the warmest attachment and loyalty to his Majesty, and of attachment to the Established Religion.

A riot had taken place amongst the colonized population of the island on the house of Mr. Manden, a Colonial Unionist, Mr. M. having hissed the Governor. The proclamation of the King against all colonial Unionists published in all the papers forbidding their meetings for illegal purposes, which was disregarded by the Unionists.

It is a remarkable fact that, while the Press is teeming with volumes devoted to every other science, no plan has yet been struck out for the promulgation of a comprehensive and popular system of medicine, which, based upon a knowledge of the structure and physiology of the human frame, shall give a rational and untechnical exposition of the healing art.
