

The loss of the French was estimated at from 16 to 18,000 men. Several thousand were destroyed by springing the Dykes. The French destroyed several gun-boats in the river, and one sloop of war was nearly destroyed, and taken possession of by the French.

The French troops marched into the Citadel on the 25th. The loss of the Dutch was not stated. Capt. Penderon understood that the Austrian, Prussian, and Russian governments, would take side with Holland, and it was supposed a general war would be the result of the capture of the Citadel, and in fact it was reported that an army of one hundred thousand Russians were already on the march for the frontiers.

We exceedingly regret to learn from the City Papers that Thomas Heavside, Esquire, Secretary of the Marine Insurance Company; Cashier and Clerk of the Savings Bank, and Secretary of the Marine Hospital had absconded on Sunday the 31st instant, having previously made known to the Directors of the two former, by his Attorney, that he was a defaulter to a heavy amount, to both establishments, and that in order to make good their loss, as far as possible, he had assigned his House in the City and his Mills at Sissiboo, (N.S.) for their benefit. It has been subsequently ascertained that the funds of the Savings Bank are minus about £1500 and that of the Insurance Company from £5,000 to £6,000. Mr. H. has resided in that City about thirteen years, the most implicit confidence was placed in his integrity, and for several years he has filled a variety of situations of trust and emolument, and his conduct therein has always been considered upright and honorable;—and this only tends to increase the astonishment and regret in the mind of every person at the present "untoward and truly unhappy event."

The above delinquent was overtaken about 12 miles on the Halifax road, and brought to St. John on Wednesday last.

Also, whether any communication has yet reached His Excellency from the Colonial Department, relative to the Marriage and other Acts, which were passed by the Legislature, under suspending clauses, until the Royal assent was thereunto declared.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Weldon, and Mr. Kinnear, be a Committee, to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee of Correspondence, informed the House that he had received a letter from John Bainbridge and Henry Bliss, Esquires, the Province Agents, in London, giving important information upon the subject of the Boundary Line, between this Province and the United States.

On motion of Mr. Simonds,
Whereas the determination of His Majesty to enforce the payment of Quit Rents, has excited much uneasiness in the minds of His Majesty's Loyal Subjects in this Province, and whereas it is highly expedient that this House should take the subject into consideration, with a view to its final settlement; therefore,

Resolved, That a humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor praying that His Excellency will be pleased to suspend the collection of Quit Rents, and all proceedings which have been instituted for the recovery of the same to be discontinued, until this House shall have time to bring this highly important subject, a second time before His Majesty.

Ordered, That Mr. Simonds, Mr. Stinson, and Mr. Connell, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

WEDNESDAY 6th.
A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Shore, acting Secretary, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message.

NEW-BRUNSWICK
Message to the House of Assembly.
6th February, 1833.

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.
The Lieutenant Governor informs the House of Assembly, in answer to their Address of yesterday's date, that he cannot, without incurring the consequences of the heavy responsibility that would attach to his deviating from the express commands of His Sovereign, comply with the request of the House, to suspend the proceedings for the collection of the Quit Rents, unless with a view to relieve him from that responsibility, the House may think proper, either by a permanent Law to grant to His Majesty an annual sum not less than that at which the Quit Rents were formerly offered to the Province by Sir George Murray; or to redeem them by the payment of a gross sum, calculated at or near the lowest term of years, at which they are now offered for sale to individuals.

"The adoption of either of these propositions, with an assurance that the House will make good the amount still due for the year ending at midsummer last, would enable The Lieutenant Governor to stay all proceedings which have been instituted, until His Majesty's pleasure thereon should be known."

"The Lieutenant Governor, in offering the foregoing suggestions to the House, begs to remark, that the adoption of either of them will not, in the least degree, militate against any representation that the House of Assembly may think proper to

submit to His Majesty, as the collection of the Quit Rents for the current year, under existing orders, will not commence until midsummer next, which will afford ample time for bringing this highly important subject again under the consideration of His Majesty."

And further this deponent most solemnly deposeth upon the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God, and saith, that he never suspected or knew that any of the said Bills so received by him as aforesaid, were forged—and that he never paid away or passed off any of the said Bills knowing them to be forged—and that all of the said Bills which were paid out by Deponent or any of his Family, and which have been returned to Deponent have been taken back and other money paid therefor—and lastly Deponent saith that to the best of his knowledge and belief, he has not received or paid out any forged Bills except those received from the said Hardy as aforesaid.
