By the arrival of the *Marie Anne*, yesterday, we received the Boston papers of Saturday last. They contain European items of few days later date than those furnished by the *English Mail*. The two concluding paragraphs, which we subjoin, (taken from the *Boston Gazette*), respecting the sailing and departure of the combined fleet, appear premature, as the latest date is only from the 15th to the 19th November, and from the 12th, while it is stated that the fleet sailed on the 14th, but the ships were not ready to anchor at Deal on the 15th.

The three dates received from New York are to the 12th Nov. A full party of Nov. 12th, has also been received, containing London dates to the 10th. A vessel had been captured for inflicting the blockade, and sent to a Society.

Convoys have been forwarded on by the English Government for the protection of property against the Dutch. Considerable movements have been observed in the Russian Army. The regiments are concentrated and formed into brigades. These circumstances have occasioned great satisfaction in Warsaw. Count Paskewitch is in correspondence with the Prussian Cabinet, and said to have unlimited authority from the Emperor to dispose of his troops. It was generally believed that the French army would have to deal with the Prussians and Dutch at the same time. It consisted of 95,000 men. Hostilities had not commenced in Belgium. The 12th November was the day named for the passing the frontiers by the French army; the Prince royal and the Duke de Nemours had set out to join the troops. General Chasse was resolved, it was supposed, to defend himself in Antwerp to the last, but it was reported in Brussels that his garrison was disaffected, and desertions were going on to a great extent, and he was routed by the Prince of Orange.

The London Courier of the 31st states that Russia, Austria and Prussia, are all of opinion that by proposing negotiations, matters may be arranged between Holland and Belgium without a resort to arms, and that the answer, in favour of the Dutch King will terminate by his accepting in the Spring the proposed conditions. England and France, however, have no longer faith in any but coercive measures. The Courier says that the former powers are united to present some definite plan for terminating the difficulties in question, if they appear that of the others, or to withdraw from the Conference entirely. It is stated in one of the London papers that influence had reached London in the course of the day, that a large Russian squadron had actually entered the English Channel. The capture of the *Duchess de Berri*—The *Duchess de Berri*, after so long a time, the most glorious of the authorities, and actively exerting influence to the Government throughout the Kingdom of the West of France, was at length been arrested. She was discovered at Nantes on the 7th Nov. and attended by a very small escort, and conducted to the Hotel de Ville. She was traced by the Agents of the Paris Police.

A Paris paper of the 10th states that the opinion was much excited on the subject of the ordinance of the King, directing the *Duchess de Berri* to be brought before the Chamber of Deputies, which was very generally pronounced to be illegal and absurd, that minister, struck with the general disapprobation expressed towards the ordinance, attributed its production to M. Casimir Perier. The event had excited the greatest interest throughout the country. By the government party it was hailed with joy, and properly enough, for as one of the journals explains, "it is not merely the arrest of a feeble woman that has gratified France, but it is the conclusion of the civil war—it is the new model in La Vendee." The government are accused of having intentionally delayed the arrest, and having known all the movements of the *Duchess* for a long time; but the *Moniteur*, the official paper, denies this. The opposition are a good deal depressed by this stroke. The papers are almost exclusively filled with the subject.

The Anglo-Galle fleet, destined to act against Holland, has already had proof of the impotence of its mission at this season of the year. Our Deal letter states that it has encountered a storm, by which the Southampton frigate has been rendered unfit for service. Thunder and lightning in November are rather unusual in this latitude. If inclined to superstition, we might be led to consider them bad omens, portending the failure of the expedition. *Albion and Star*, Nov. 7.
