TO THE EDITOR.

Sir,  
Give me leave to request the attention of your readers to a subject which, in a country where new pastures are continually forming, must be allowed to possess peculiar importance:—I refer to the various species of Grass, and am desirous of obtaining information and advice as to the sorts best adapted for cultivation by the New-Brunswick farmer.

I hear almost exclusive mention made of "Timothy Grass," but am inclined to be somewhat doubtful of its paramount merits. The experience and observations of English agriculturists, I perceive, have not sustained its American character. *Phleum pratense* (says Professor Martyn) was much recommended about thirty years ago under the name of Timothy Grass. It received this name from Mr. Timothy Hanson, who is said first to have brought the seeds of it from New York. It had then a great character in North America, where it is called Herd's Grass. Its reputation here (in England) was short-lived, and it has no one good property in which it is not excelled by Fox-tailed Grass; but besides this, it is harsh, and late in its appearance. It is proper only for moist lands; in a dry soil it makes a pitiful appearance.

Mr. Curtis, in his "Practical Observations on British Grasses" (a very valuable work, published about forty years since) selects out of a vast variety Six of the best sorts of Grasses, which he considered adapted to ground of different qualities. They are the following:—

1. *Anthoxanthum odoratum*, or Sweet scented Vernal Grass. This is described as nearly the earliest of all the British Grasses. It will grow in any soil or situation; cattle are fond of it; but it is not so productive in point of crop as some others, and it yields but very few seeds.

2. *Alopecurus pratensis*, or Meadow Fox-tail Grass. This is almost as early as the foregoing, much larger, and of quicker growth; consequently much more productive. It shoots also very rapidly after mowing, producing a plentiful aftermath.

3. *Poa pratensis*, or Smooth-stalked Meadow Grass. The foliage shoots early, but the flowering stems are not produced so soon, by a week at least, as the foregoing. It rather affects a dry situation, and hence retains its verdure in long-continued dry weather better than most other Grasses.

4. *Poa trivialis*, or Rough-stalked Meadow Grass. This loves moisture and a sheltered situation. Hence, although few Grasses are more productive, or more adapted to hay or pasture, it is tender, and liable to be injured by severe cold or excessive drought.

5. *Festuca pratensis*, or Meadow Fescue Grass, is large, and abundant in foliage. It is strictly perennial, very hardy, and will thrive, not only in very wet, but also in dry ground. It produces also more seeds than any of the others, which are easily gathered, and readily grow. The flowering stems are a fortnight later than Meadow Fox-tail; yet it cannot be considered as a late Grass, for the Meadow Cat's-tail (*Timothy*) and others flower at least three weeks later.

6. *Cynosurus cristatus*, or Crested Dog-tail Grass, grows in dry situations, and will not thrive in wet meadows. It flowers about the same time as Meadow Fescue, and is not very productive of foliage. Its seeds may be easily collected.

Of these select Grasses the second and fourth are considered the fittest for moist land; the first and fifth for land moist, or moderately dry; the third and sixth for dry pastures. They flower in the order of their enumeration.

Ignorant as I am of the botany of America, I presume that most of these Grasses would flourish here, if indeed they are not all the indigenous growth of the country. But some of your readers may have it in their power to communicate the result of experiments, made for the purpose of ascertaining their value in comparison with the widely-cultivated Timothy Grass. I should be glad also to learn the nature, as discovered by the same test, of the Ray and Fiorin Grasses, which have at different periods been highly recommended in England. What, again, does experience say of the Leguminous plants which have acquired the name of "Artificial Grasses," although totally different from Grasses, properly so called, in every respect except their serving for the food of cattle? I refer to the different sorts of Clover, Lucerne and Sainfoin.

It is probable that not a few of those who have lately repaired to this country may be desirous of the same information which I now request; a consideration which will perhaps be admitted for my excuse, should any be necessary, in taking this public method of soliciting it.

## SUPREME COURT,

The English Mail for April was received here on Saturday last, but we are without any intelligence of importance, unless we refer to some changes which had taken place in the French Ministry occasioned by the rejection of a ministerial proposition to indemnify the United States for spoliation sustained during the memorable enforcement of the Berlin and Milan Decrees.

A gentleman in New York writes to his friend in this Province, as follows:—"I went yesterday to see the new Steam Boat, built to run on the North River, with a speed equal to twenty eight miles an hour, and I think from her appearance that the expectations of the builder will be accomplished. The owners of the Steamers now running on that river have purchased the Boat and the Patent, at a large price—they were fearful of her. I came down from Albany in one of the Boats now running in ten hours and three quarters although the wind was adverse. This new invention resembles two segars three hundred feet long; six feet in diameter in the centre, tapering to a point at each end—placed about nine feet distant from each other. The Machinery and Cabins are placed on a floor or platform. The Wheel is about 17 feet diameter, fitted in the centre; she will be steered by two small iron rudders—will draw about two feet water, and will cost only about one third the expence of the Boats now in use. A Boat of this description, built on a small scale, would, I am of opinion, answer well for the river Saint John, between Fredericton and Woodstock." The Gentleman who writes this letter is well qualified to form a correct opinion on the subject.—Communicated.

## COMMERCIAL BANK.

We announced some time since that his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor had received instructions to grant a ROYAL CHARTER to this Bank, and that the same was in progress. A draft has now been prepared by his Majesty's Attorney General, a copy of which has been received by the Bank Committee, and we hope to have the pleasure of laying it before our readers next week.

Immediately on receiving information that a Royal Charter would be granted, an address was prepared by the Committee, with which JOHN M. WILMOT, Esq. DANIEL ANSLY Esq. and M. H. PERLEY, Esq. were appointed to proceed to Fredericton and present the same to

his Excellency. These Gentlemen attended to that duty, and we have great pleasure in being allowed to give publicity to the address and his Excellency's answer; and we would beg to draw particular attention to the sentiments expressed in both these documents.

To His Excellency Major-General Sir Archibald CAMPBELL, Baronet, G. C. B. Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency.

The undersigned, a Committee, appointed by the Merchants and Inhabitants of St. John, to obtain a Charter for a Commercial Bank, have this day received, through W. B. KINNEAR, Esq. the copy of a despatch from the Right Honourable E. G. STANLEY, acknowledging the receipt of your Excellency's dispatch of 27th May last, inclosing the Petition of the undersigned, and directing your Excellency to affix the Great Seal of this Province to a Bank Charter, on certain conditions, with which the undersigned have been made acquainted.

**SALMON RIVER COAL.**—A quantity of Coals, from a new vein recently opened on the banks of Salmon River, at the head of Grand Lake, have been brought to town during the week. **QUEBEC, April 28.**—The Montreal papers repeat the rumour in circulation here several days ago, that the house of the late Horatio Gates & Co. have suspended payments, since the death of the two principal partners. The Hon. Mr. Moffat, W. P. P. Esq. and Timothy Follet, Esq. of Burlington, Vermont, are said to have been appointed Trustees to the Estate. The amount of the claims and assets is of course a matter of mere conjecture; the most generally accredited rumour is that the former may exceed £200,000 and the latter be under £300,000.—In the assets would be included a large proportion of long outstanding and bad debts.

The Mercury states, in confirmation of the former report that the Controllers of Customs were to be discontinued, that the Commission of Mr. Hamilton, the person in office as Controller at Montreal, received by the March mail, is as "Landing Waiter."

**LI. Col. Harris** who held the situation of Deputy-Adjutant-General in this Garrison for many years, has resigned that office, and it is not the intention of His Majesty's Government to appoint a successor for the present.—Hal. Royal Gaz.

At a Meeting of the Board of Health, for the County of York, held at the County Court House in Fredericton, on Monday the fifth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty four:

ORDERED, That for the purpose of examining the Town of Fredericton, and having the same cleansed and kept in a proper state of cleanliness, the same be divided into Six Districts, as follows, viz:—

District No. 1. To extend from Phillips' Creek to the centre of Westmorland-street.

District No. 2. To extend from the centre of Westmorland-street to the centre of York-street.

District No. 3. To extend from the centre of York-street to the centre of Carleton-street.

District No. 4. To extend from the centre of Carleton-street to the centre of Regent-street.

District No. 5. To extend from the centre of Regent-street to the centre of Saint John-street.

District No. 6. To extend from the centre of Saint John Street, to the first creek or Inlet below the Town;

And that Committees as herein after named be appointed for the respective Districts, who are required to proceed forthwith to examine the Buildings, Inclosures, Streets and all other places within their Districts, respectively, and cause all nuisances and matters which may be deemed prejudicial or dangerous to Health to be removed and every place to be cleansed so often and in such manner as they may consider necessary. The following persons are appointed Committees for the purpose, viz:

For District No. 1. Thomas Pickard and James Taylor, Junior.

" " No. 2. William I. Bedell and Thomas Emerson.

" " No. 3. Rev. J. Somerville, George P. Peters and D. L. Robinson.

" " No. 4. William Fraser and George F. S. Barton.

" " No. 5. Jarvis King, Geo. E. Ketchum and Charles Lee.

" " No. 6. William T. Peters and L. A. Wilmot.

ORDERED, That the Board do meet on Monday in every Week, at the County Court House in Fredericton, at eleven of the Clock, in the forenoon.

RESOLVED, That the Slaughter House on the upper side of Carleton-street is a nuisance, and dangerous to the public Health, and it is Ordered, That the said nuisance be forthwith abated, and the District Committee are required to attend particularly to this order.

ORDERED, That no Building or place within the town of Fredericton, between the River Saint John and the reserved Street, called Charlotte-street, shall be used as a Slaughter House for the killing or butchering of any oxen or other animals whatsoever, and every person offending against this order shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds, to be recovered and applied as the Law directs.

The District Committees are enjoined to pay particular attention to the proper cleansing of the Tanneries in the Town.

WHEREAS, The depositing rubbish, filth, scrapings of yards, and other offensive materials below or near the Bank of the River tends to affect the purity of the air, and therefore, in case of the Town of Fredericton being visited by any malignant pestilence, may tend to its increase and spreading among the Inhabitants: For prevention thereof, it is Ordered, That no dirt, rubbish, filth, scrapings of yards, or other offensive material of any description shall be deposited or laid on any part of the shore or bank of the River in front of the Town of Fredericton, between the upper side of the upper Landing next adjacent to Government House Grounds, and the first Inlet below the Town; and that any person or persons who shall cast, deposit, or lay, or aid, assist, or be concerned in casting, depositing, or laying any dirt, rubbish, scrapings of yards or other offensive material, on any part of the said Shore or Bank, shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Forty Shillings.

RESOLVED, That the quantity of rubbish, placed and suffered to remain and increase on the Commons and uninclosed Grounds, and in the public Streets of the Town of Fredericton, and the Stagnant water which is frequently allowed to remain in the Gutters and Water-courses of the said Streets, cause unwholesome exhalations and are dangerous to the public Health, it is therefore Ordered, That from and after the publication of this order, no rubbish, straw, packing cases, barrels, boxes, lumber, dirt, filth, or water be suffered or permitted to be placed, thrown, cast, or remain on or upon any part of the said Streets or Commons, and any person or persons offending against this order, shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings, to be recovered and applied as the Law directs.

And for the more effectual prevention of the ac-

cumulation of dirt, rubbish, and Stagnant waters aforesaid, it is further Ordered, That every householder in the Town of Fredericton, shall on Saturday in each and every week cleanse and sweep or cause to be cleansed and swept, the Street in front of the house and premises by him or her occupied, from the margin to the outside of the Gutter or Water-course of the said Street, and at all times to afford a free passage to the water which may be therein, and where there shall be a space of Ground, without any Inhabitants residing thereon, between any two Buildings, the persons residing on either side thereof shall cleanse and sweep the same, each person to cleanse and sweep the half adjoining his or her house or premises: Provided always, That no person shall be required to sweep or cleanse a greater distance than four rods, to the right or left of his house or premises, and when any house is occupied by more than one Tenant or Family, it shall be equally the duty of every such Tenant to perform and obey this order, and every person or persons who shall neglect or refuse to perform the duty required by this order, shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Five Shillings, to be recovered and applied as aforesaid.

ORDERED, That no dead beast or animal whatsoever shall be cast or thrown into the River Saint John, or any other River or in, or upon any part of the Lands within the County of York, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings, for every breach of this order: And further, that the Owner of any such dead beast or other animal shall within twenty-four hours after the death of such beast or other animal, bury the same or cause it to be buried at least three feet below the surface of the earth, under a penalty of Twenty Shillings for every offence or neglect of this order.

ORDERED, That every house occupied by any Tenant within the Town of Fredericton, shall forthwith be provided by the Owner or Occupier thereof with a decent and sufficient Privy, with a sufficient vault beneath the same, and if any house be unprovided therewith after the first day of June next, the Owner or Occupier thereof (at the election, of the Committee for the District in which such house may be situate,) shall forfeit and pay a penalty of Forty Shillings for each and every week he, she, or they shall neglect to provide the same, to be recovered and applied as the Law directs.

ORDERED, That the foregoing Orders be published twice in the Royal Gazette and in Fifty Hand-bills.
