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The Epidemic Cholera, which unfortu-
nately carried off so many of the inhabi-
tants of the Town, during the Autumn, has
disappeared for the present. We should be
thankful to the Almighty that it did not ex-
tend into the Province, and prove more de-
structive. We should take warning, and use
every precaution to mitigate the ravages of
this frightful disease, should it again unhap-
pily visit us, by establishing an efficient and
vigilant Police, who will enforce cleanliness
and temperance, and see that such nuisances
as endanger the health of the Town are re-
moved. The charitable donations given by
individuals during the prevalence of the
Cholera, were liberal and praiseworthy;
the exertions of the gentlemen composing
the Board of Health, and of the Health
Wardens, entitle them to my warmest thanks
and approbation, and to the gratitude of
the public. I feel much pleasure in making
known to the Assembly and to the people of
Nova Scotia, that the Parent State, on
learning the affliction with which this Town
was visited, sent a liberal sum of money to
be applied in relieving destitute emigrants,
and others who had acquired no claim upon
this community for assistance.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the
House of Assembly,
The public accounts have been made up
to the end of September, but as I conceive
it will be more satisfactory to you to have
the accounts of the whole year before you,
I have ordered them to be continued to the
31st December.
I trust that you will find the supplies
granted to His Majesty last year have been
faithfully applied. I have desired that an
account of the expense attending the Chole-
ra Hospital, &c. may be submitted to you.
I have no doubt but that the expenditure
incurred you will readily sanction. I
have also desired that the estimates for the
ensuing year may be submitted to you; they
are prepared with the utmost attention to
all necessary and useful economy.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the
Council,
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the
House of Assembly,
My most anxious and earnest desire, and
the first object of my ambition, are to be
useful to the Province, to co-operate with
you in every measure to promote the pub-
lic good; to have the benefit of your advice
and experience, in correcting any abuses
that may be found to exist, and to possess
your confidence and support in my adminis-
tration; and I confidently trust that the
Legislature of Nova Scotia, may continue
to be distinguished for unanimity in its
Councils, for liberality in its proceedings,
and for loyalty and attachment to His Ma-
jesty's person and government.

Sir—The Douglas Temperance Society
have long viewed with pleasure and satisfac-

have evidently displayed in the discharge of

the arduous duties of your official capacity
as a Magistrate; but the decided step you
recently took at the Militia Drills and Gen-
eral Inspection to crush and destroy such
pernicious practices, so generally tolerated
on such public occasions, calls forth their
warmest expressions of gratitude and most
unqualified approbation. The Society, on
contrasting the harmony, order and disci-
pline, so evident throughout the whole of the
last General Inspection, with the confusion,
irregularities and dissipation, so prevalent on

Tremendous Conflagration.—Symrna pa-
pers to the 13th September, received at
New York, bring information of a terrible
conflagration which took place on the night
of the 6th, at Aidin, a city of Asia Minor.
Ten thousand shops were reduced to ashes,
with the greater part of the merchandise
which they contained. The loss amounts
to several millions. Several persons perished
in the flames.

MYSTERIOUS WRECK.—We are informed
by Capt. Carrick of the St. George, that on
the 11th October, while in Latitude 52. 57
N. and longitude 19 W. he fell in with a
wreck which was burnt down to the wa-
ter's edge, and nothing but the foremast
standing. A skull with some hair on it was
the only vestige of mortality to be seen.
One of Captain Carrick's crew thought the
Hull was that of the "Two Brothers" of
Dublin, and on making search a brass plate
of the cabin stove was found, on which that
name was engraved.—The Chain Cable was
entangled fore and aft among the timber,
which was large and appeared to have been
shipped from Quebec.—Captain Carrick lay
too all day but did not discover any thing
that could throw the least light on the aw-
ful scene that must have occurred; and the
weather being very severe he could not save
any thing from the wreck.
