For several days past we have suffered an unusual degree of heat such as has not been experienced for many years, and with scarcely a breeze to cool the air. Fahrenheit's scale generally indicated from 85 to 90 in the shade, and when exposed to the sun marked from 110 to 115. The prospect of an abundant harvest is cheering, and the prospects of the agriculturalist were never better.

From the St. Andrews' Standard, July 31.

By the arrival of the ship Princess Victoria, Capt. Paul, 26 days from Liverpool, we have English dates to the 28th June. Although they contain nothing peculiarly interesting, we can gather from the clashing opinions of the opposite political parties, that the Ministers are beset by powerful difficulties, but are steering on under a fresh breeze that promises to carry them safely through many of the shoals and quicksands by which they are surrounded.

In the Commons, a conversation on the Fisheries, drew from the President of the Board of Trade, a pledge, that inquiries shall be made into the French and American interference with our Fisheries off Nova Scotia, Labrador, and Newfoundland.

Earl Grey, in speaking of the King's promises to the Bishops, says, 'with respect to the speech alluded to, my lords, I can say nothing whatever; not having advised it, being in no way responsible for it, not knowing to whom it was reported, nor upon what authority it rests.' There is something very strange in this. Suppose His Majesty had interfered with the rights of Parliament and invaded the Constitution by the use of undue influence, who is to be brought to account? Not the King, for he has just told us that the law says he can do no wrong; not the Minister, for he disavows being in any way responsible. This is only the beginning of the confusion which this declaration, said to be extorted or dictated by the Bishops, will inevitably produce.

The Ministry remains the same as reported after Mr. Stanley's resignation.

Lord Lansdowne and the Lord Chancellor do not differ much in sentiment on the interference with the Irish Church property, from Mr. Stanley and the other dissentients of the Cabinet, which as a proof that the Ministry is still liable to explode, should any thing occur to call their different sentiments into collision.

Mr. S. Rice has carried his election at Cambridge against Sir E. Sugden, and was warmly cheered when he re-appeared in the House of Commons.

Mr. Abercrombie, son to Sir Ralph, is returned for Edinburgh: another powerful aid for the Whigs.

Lord Belhaven, by His Majesty's most gracious desire, holds his Court as Lord High Commissioner of the General Assembly of the Kirk of Scotland, in Holyrood House, the ancient palace of the Kings of Scotland.

Admiral Napier arrived at Portsmouth on the 25th June, and landed under a salute from the Victory. He was loudly cheered by the populace, & conducted to the George Hotel, opposite the residence of Don Carlos. General Merino has arrived in London, and is at large. The presence of this miscreant in the metropolis of Britain is an insult to the nation.

The Times says, that this is the individual who took, and shot the unfortunate Gen. Torrijos, Mr. Boyd, and their followers.
