A PROCLAMATION.

IN consideration of the danger to be apprehended to this Province, from the progress of a grievous Disease with which the neighbouring Provinces, and many other parts of the world, are visited, I have thought fit, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Council hereby to order and direct, that on Wednesday, the Eighth day of October next, a PUBLIC FAST and HUMILIATION be observed throughout this Province, that so we may humble ourselves before Almighty God, and, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for averting those heavy judgments which our manifold provocations have most justly deserved, and particularly beseeching God to remove that grievous Disease, and in his mercy to preserve us from its visitation; and I do hereby strictly charge and command that the said Public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all His Majesty's loving subjects in this Province, as they tender the favor of Almighty God, and would avoid his wrath and indignation.

And Whereas a suitable form of Prayer has been prepared for this purpose, I do hereby authorize and appoint the same to be used on this solemn occasion in all Churches, Chapels and Places of public Worship throughout this Province.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the seventeenth day of September, in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, and in the fifth year of His Majesty's Reign.

From the New-York Albion, September 6. The St. Andrew, Capt. Taubman, has arrived from Liverpool with London papers to the 30th of July. The intelligence by this vessel is not essentially different from that received by former arrivals.

The accounts from Madrid are of the most afflicting character. Cholera and political discontent have plunged the unfortunate city into a state of misery, that almost baffles description. That the reports spread of the water being poisoned, had their origin in political manoeuvre is certain, from the tenor of the Proclamations promulgated

in that unfortunate capital. Truly does the hand of affliction fall heavily upon Spain. The frightful ravages of the fell disease we will not pretend to describe, but the following passage from the correspondence of the Morning Herald, may give some idea of the horrors of the scene:—

"No reports have yet been published by the Board of Health, but the reports made up and presented to that body, gave the following results: July 14th, 18 deaths; 15th, 38; 16th, 140; 17th, 270; 18th, 281; and the reports incomplete. Of the subsequent days to the 22nd, when our advices terminate, the returns have not reached us. Every moment the black litters are passing through the principal streets, while the death cart goes about collecting the bodies of the poor, and we see them heaped eight and ten together, covered with some tattered cloth, which scarcely conceals them with decency.

Hundreds, it is affirmed, die for want of medical assistance, and some of the first families have to deplore the loss of friends who were never visited by a medical attendant.

The affairs of the East thicken apace.—The movements of the British and French fleets, have excited alarm at Constantinople, and the new fortifications along the Bosphorus are hurried in consequence. The deluges at that important point, under the direction of Russian engineers, will speedily be made impregnable, in the ordinary sense of the word, that is to say, until British valour has proved it to the contrary, to which test it must infallibly sooner or later be brought, thanks to my Lord Palmerston and his short sighted policy.—If a general war, be again brought about, the great battle of opinion so often spoken of, it may be fought on Turkish ground. The state of Greece is such, that some kind of foreign interference will ere long be again necessary; and who is the power to interfere? Not Russia, nor France, nor England separately; will they do it conjointly? We doubt it, and therefore, apprehend, that fresh cause of general discord, is to be found there. Time will soon throw additional light on these subjects, for things seem to be hurrying on to a crisis, that must speedily break upon us. It will be a shock that will shake Europe to its centre, and cause the Crown to totter on the head of every Sovereign in christendom.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

Saturday, 13th September, 1834.

At a Meeting of the BOARD OF HEALTH, held this day at the County Court House—

THE Board being fully satisfied that it will tend greatly to protect the Town of Fredericton from the consequences to be apprehended from the introduction of the Cholera, that *Tipping or Drunkenness* in the respective Taverns be prevented as much as possible.

It is Ordered, That all Tavern keepers within the Town of Fredericton shall be, and are hereby prevented from selling or allowing Liquor to be drank within their respective Houses, between the hours of seven o'clock in the afternoon and seven o'clock in the morning, and that between those hours they shall keep their houses closed against all Customers, under the penalty of FIVE POUNDS for each offence.

Provided always, That nothing herein shall prevent the Proprietors of the respective houses kept for the accommodation of Travellers or Boarders, from giving the necessary accommodation to their respective inmates.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

15th September, 1834.

At a Meeting of the Board, held this day at the County Court House—

IT is ordered that no Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description which shall, after the passing of this order, leave any part of the County of Saint John, shall approach nearer to the Town of Fredericton than the *Short Ferry*, so called, until such Vessel, Steam Boat, or other Boat, shall have first reported to the Health Officer, who will be appointed to attend at that place, and shall obtain a Certificate or Pass from him, permitting such Vessel, Steam Boat, or other Boat, to proceed further, under the penalty of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for a breach of this Order, to be paid by the Owner, or Master, or Person having charge of such Vessel respectively: And it is further Ordered, that no Certificate or Pass shall be granted by the Health Officer to any Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description, unless the Person having charge of such Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description respectively, shall produce a Certificate signed by the President or Secretary of the Board of Health in the City of Saint John, dated the evening of the day before such Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description, shall have taken their departure, that no case or cases of Asiatic Cholera existed in the said City.

Nor shall such Certificate or Licence be proceeded further, be granted by the Health Officer, if he shall deem it expedient to withhold the same, until Report can be made to the Board, and leave be obtained from them.

And it is further ordered, That if any such Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description, shall pass further up than the said Short Ferry, without such Certificate or Licence from the said Health Officer, such Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description, together with all the Passengers and Cargo, shall be immediately taken back to the said Short Ferry, and there remain until released by order of the Board, under the further penalty of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for every act of refusal or disobedience of this Order, to be in like manner paid.

It is further Ordered, That no Person who shall be on board of any such Vessel, Steam Boat, or Boat of any other description, shall be landed therefrom after passing the County Line, until Licence shall be obtained from the said Health Officer, under the penalty of FIFTY POUNDS, to be paid by the Master or Persons having charge—and also, by every person who shall presume so to land.

It is further ordered, That one of the Medical Gentlemen, Members of this Board, do give constant attendance at the said Short Ferry, for the purpose of seeing the foregoing and all former Orders carried into effect, until some Person shall be particularly engaged and appointed for that purpose.
