Provincial Appointment.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Honorable Ward Chipman to be Chief Justice of this Province in the room of the late Honorable Chief Justice Saunders.

On Wednesday last the First Battalion of York County Militia, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel MINCHIN, assembled on the Race Ground for general muster and inspection. The weather was extremely favourable and afforded every facility and excitement in the discharge of the duties of the day. On the arrival of Lt. Col. ALLEN, the Inspecting Field Officer, the usual salute was given from the whole Battalion formed into line. This corps has uniformly and deservedly received the most marked approbation of the Inspecting Officer, and we are happy in being enabled to state that on no previous occasion did the orderly and good conduct of the Battalion appear more conspicuous, nor produce a more general feeling of satisfaction amongst the numerous assemblage of gentlemen as spectators—and we have much additional pleasure in adding that not the slightest mark of intemperance was visible, nor bad behaviour of any description during the day.

The Officers of the Battalion afterwards dined together at Staple's Hotel, in company with their worthy guest Lt. Col. ALLEN, where the remainder of the evening was spent in the greatest harmony and conviviality.

The English Mail for August which arrived here on Saturday last brings us London dates to the 7th, and Falmouth to the 9th of that month. We have selected a few interesting articles from *Bell's Weekly Messenger*, but there is nothing of much importance contained in our latest papers. The news from Spain is of a very contradictory character. Whilst the Regent is opening the Cortes with unusual splendour, and proclaiming the elements of a representative constitution under the old system of the Cortes, Don Carlos is advancing at the head of such troops as he can collect in Biscay and Navarre to Madrid; but the accounts are so perplexed on this subject that but little reliance can be placed on them.

The Speech of the King of the French, says the *Messenger*, "is certainly the most rapid and inconclusive, of all the pieces of royal declamation, we have ever read."

"The bill for the admission of dissenters to the privileges of the English universities, has met with the fate which we predicted for it, in the House of Lords, on Friday night—the second reading having been lost by a majority of 187 peers, to a minority of 85. Thus this important question, which passed all its stages in the House of Commons, has been rejected in the Lords by a numerical majority of one hundred and two peers."

The mutilated Coercion Bill has got through the House of Lords, Lord Melbourne pledging himself that if it fail in preserving tranquillity in Ireland, he will assemble parliament without delay to demand more ample powers.

Lord Althorp's financial statement appears to have given general satisfaction.

The present Ministry are now considered as having settled down into such a consistency as seems to promise its permanence, at least till February next—some very important measures are contemplated and will speedily be brought forward. The conduct of the present Ministry as regards Ireland, particularly as respects the Coercion Bill—the Tithe Bill, and the application of the Revenues of the Church, appears to be generally approved.

The two houses of Parliament are engaged in forwarding the several bills before them, for the purpose of bringing the present long session to a conclusion.

We had written thus far when we received by the Western Mail English advices to the 17th August. Parliament was prorogued by the King in person on the 15th, on which occasion His Majesty delivered the following Speech:—

"My Lords and Gentlemen,

"The numerous and important questions which have in the present, as in the two preceding years, been submitted to your consideration, have imposed upon you the necessity of extraordinary exertions; and it is with a deep sense of the care and labour which you have bestowed upon the public business, that I at

length close this protracted session, and release you from your attendance.

"I continue to receive from all Foreign Powers assurances of their friendly disposition.

"The negotiations, on account of which the Conferences in London upon the affairs of the Low Countries were suspended, have not yet been brought to a close; and I have still to lament the continued postponement of a final settlement between Holland and Belgium.

"On the other hand, I have derived the most sincere and lively satisfaction from the termination of the civil war which had so long distracted the kingdom of Portugal; and I rejoice to think that the Treaty which the state of affairs in Spain and in Portugal induced me to conclude with the King of the French, the Queen Regent of Spain, and the Regent of Portugal, and which has already been laid before you, contributed materially to produce this happy result.

"Events have since occurred in Spain to disappoint, for a time, the hopes of tranquillity in that country, which the pacification of Portugal had inspired.

"To these events, so important to Great Britain, I shall give my most serious attention, in concert with France and the other Powers who are parties to the Treaty of 22d of April; and the good understanding which prevails between me and my Allies, encourages me to expect that our joint endeavors will be attended with success.

"The peace of Turkey remains undisturbed, and I trust that no event will happen in that quarter to disturb the tranquillity of Europe.

"I have not failed to observe with approbation that you have directed your attention to those domestic questions which more immediately affect the general welfare of the community, and I have much satisfaction in sanctioning your wise and benevolent intentions by giving my assent to the Act for the amendment and better administration of the laws relating to the poor in England and Wales. It will be my duty to provide that the authority necessarily vested in Commissioners nominated by the Crown, be exercised with temperance and caution; and I entertain a confident expectation that its prudent and judicious application, as well as the discreet enforcement of the other provisions of the Act, will, by degrees, remedy the evils which at present prevail; and while they elevate the character, will increase the comfort, and improve the condition of my people.

"The amendment of the law is one of your first and most important duties, and I rejoice to perceive that it has occupied so much of your attention. The establishment of a Central Court for the trial of offences in the metropolis and its neighborhood, will, I trust, improve the administration of justice within the populous sphere of its jurisdiction, and afford a useful example to every other part of the kingdom.

"To the important subjects of our Jurisprudence and of our Municipal Corporations, your attention will naturally be directed early in the next Session. You may always rest assured of my disposition to co-operate with you in such useful reformatory measures.

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

"I thank you for the readiness with which you have granted the supplies. The Estimates laid before you are somewhat lower than those of former years, although they included several extraordinary charges, which will not again occur. The same course of economy will still be steadily pursued. The continued increase of the revenue, notwithstanding the repeal of so many taxes, affords the surest proof that the resources of the country are unimpaired, and justifies the expectation that a perseverance in judicious and well considered measures will still further promote industry and augment the wealth of my people.

"My Lords and Gentlemen,

"It gives me great satisfaction to believe, that in returning to your several countries, you will find a prevalence of general tranquillity and of active industry amongst all classes of society. I humbly hope that divine providence will vouchsafe a continuance and increase of these blessings, and in any circumstances, which may arise, I shall rely with confidence upon your zeal and fidelity. And I rest satisfied, that you will inculcate and encourage that obedience to the laws, and that observance of the duties of religion and morality, which are the only secure foundations of the power and happiness of Empires."

The Lord Chancellor then declared the Parliament prorogued to the 25th September next.

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The CHOLERA.—We rejoice that we are able to state that this fearful disease has at last almost entirely disappeared; and although a few cases of a milder character remain, the anxiety and alarm which for some weeks depressed the spirits of the community, are passing away with the melancholy cause of their intensity. Those who met each other a fortnight since, with faces eloquently expressing the doubt that they might never meet again, are now exchanging heartfelt congratulations, upon their narrow escape, and the safety of friends and relations—the absentees, who had fled to Dartmouth, and to the Inns along the post roads, are returning to their homes, and business is beginning to revive. In the 24 hours ending at eleven on Tuesday, there was no death in the Hospital, where the whole number of patients is reduced to 9, and but one in the town. There are still about 20 cases returned, as remaining in private practice; but we are happy to find, from free conversation with the medical men, that scarcely any of them are considered dangerous. The Central Board have great pleasure in referring to the diminished numbers in Dalhousie Hospital, and also in being able to state, that most of the cases that have occurred within the last few days, in private practice, have been of a milder nature, and readily yielded to medical treatment—and in consequence of the amelioration of the disease, the Board have been enabled to reduce the Establishment at Dalhousie Hospital nearly one half.—*Nova-Scotia.*

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BRUNSWICK STREET METHODIST CHAPEL.—This very neat building was opened for public worship on Sunday last. Its appearance inside and out is very creditable to the congregation, directors and builders, by whom it was erected. It is a wooden building on a stone foundation, 50 feet by 60, somewhat in the Gothic style, its several parts, finishing &c., being in good keeping. The chapel being on a declivity, although the entrance doors are on a level with the street, considerable space intervenes between its floor and the surface below; this space is taken advantage of, and is occupied by a substantial stone building, capable of being used as comfortable dwellings, or for other purposes connected with the chapel. The chapel has a pretty tower attached, which is of much use as an aisle, besides adding to its exterior appearance. The building altogether is a considerable ornament to the part of the town in which it is situated, and is a very pleasing evidence in these gloomy times that a spirit of improvement is not altogether annihilated.—*Halifax Recorder.*

THE WEST INDIES.—Accounts have now been received from Jamaica, St. Kitts, Barbadoes, Trinidad, Berbice, Demerara, Tobago, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Grenada, Nevis and Montserrat, from which it is evident, that the first shock of the new system being got over, order and tranquillity very generally prevail. At St. Kitts Martial Law which was proclaimed on the 6th, ceased on the 18th. Forty natives of Fagua have been introduced into Trinidad to test their capacity to perform the labour hitherto exclusively confined to negroes.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

September 18, 1834.

At a Meeting of the Board of Health, held this day at the County Court House—

ORDERED, That it shall be the duty of all the Ferry-men, connected with the Parish of Fredricton, to endeavour to ascertain from whence all Persons requiring to be conveyed across the River Saint John have come; and in no case shall the said Ferryman, or either of them, presume to convey into any part of the Parish of Fredricton any Person or Persons whom they or he may, on enquiry, ascertain or suspect to have come from Halifax, or any other place known to be infected with Cholera, under the penalty of FIVE POUNDS for each violation of this order.

And further Resolved, That it shall be the duty of all Keepers of Taverns, Boarding Houses, and other Houses of Entertainment, to make diligent enquiry as to the places from whence all Persons requiring accommodation at their respective Houses shall have come; and should it be ascertained that they have come from Halifax, Quebec, or any other place infected with Cholera, it shall be the duty of the said Keepers of Taverns, Boarding Houses, or other Houses of Entertainment, to give immediate information of the fact to the Chairman, or some other Member of the Board, under the penalty of TWENTY FIVE POUNDS for every neglect or disobedience of this order.
