[This article will be interesting to our friends promote the Salmon fishing in the rivers which fall into lake Ontario.] The Natural History of the Salmon appears

to have been hitherto involved in deep obscurity, and the law concerning the rights of propri etors entitled to fish salmon has in consequence been uncertain and contradictory. The salmon spawn on fords in rivers, where the stream runs rapidly. They remain some months in the rivers previous to spawning, and are generally several weeks on the spawning fords before the operations commence. The spawning fishes lie on their sides, and by a quick jerk and curvature of their hodies make furrows in the gravel, by means of their fins and tail.
