LOWER CANADA.
ADDRESS
To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN.
We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of the Province of Lower Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly approach your Majesty to renew the expression of our affectionate devotion to your Majesty's person and government.
When the House of Assembly, in the session of the Provincial Legislature of the year 1832-3, addressed your Majesty to recommend to the Imperial Parliament to call a convention of the people to effect a change in the Government established in this Province, the Legislative Council felt it to be their duty to resist the attempt of the Assembly, and it was with feelings of great satisfaction that we received the assurances conveyed in a despatch from your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, communicated to the Legislative Council by Message from His Excellency the Governor in Chief, on the 14th January last, that your Majesty will not fail to secure to all classes of your subjects in this Province the constitutional rights and liberties which they enjoy by their participation in British institutions.
After this formal communication of your Majesty's gracious intentions to preserve the Constitution as by law established,

ed, we are compelled to view the Address of the Assembly of this Province to the two Houses of the Imperial Parliament praying for a change in the fundamental institutions of the country, as an impeachment of your Majesty's justice and impartiality, and as this appeal from the decision of your Majesty must be considered as a renewal on the part of the Assembly, of the attacks on the government and institutions of the country, we feel ourselves bound in duty and by inclination to oppose pretensions, which, as exhibited in the Resolutions of the Assembly, are alike dangerous to the stability of your Majesty's Government, and destructive of the peace and happiness of the loyal inhabitants of this Province.

We therefore most earnestly renew the assurance of our unvaried attachment to the present Constitution and form of government, and reposing unbounded confidence in your Majesty's most gracious word and paternal protection, and in full reliance on the wisdom and firmness of your Majesty's Government, we pray that your Majesty will not sanction the change demanded by the Assembly, destructive of a Constitution affectionately cherished by your faithful Canadian subjects, and most respectfully assure your Majesty of our perfect conviction that the Resolutions and Address supporting the demands of the Assembly, by threats of no doubtful import, present an unfaithful exposition of the opinions, and are not in unison with the feelings of loyalty & attachment to your Majesty's government entertained by the great body of your Majesty's subjects in this Province.

From the New York Albion, March 29.
We have accounts a few days later from London, but they contain no additional intelligence of importance.
By the *Montano* at Boston, we have accounts to the 12th of February from Madrid. The new order of things appears to be going on prosperously at the capital, but in the northern provinces the insurrection is still unsubdued and indeed unabated. Fresh advantages are daily gained by the Queen's troops, but these lead to nothing decisive in a guerilla warfare. The Carlist bands if dispersed at one point speedily re-assemble at another, and possessing the mountain passes on the most formidable opposition to regular troops. The legions of Napoleon fought these almost invisible enemies for several years, and learnt to their cost, that Spain was unconquerable while defended by such a description of force. At that time the whole country population was urged on, and often led by the priests; the same thing, though not perhaps in an equal degree, exists now, and while it does so exist, we defy all the efforts of the Spanish soldiers to put down insurrection. The liberal party that is now come into power may perhaps infuse new vigour into the Queen's Councils, but after all we should despair of seeing Spanish troops effect that, which the troops of Napoleon failed to accomplish.

The advantages said to have been obtained in Portugal over Miguel, are repeated in the accounts by the *Montano*. And it is affirmed, moreover, that a division of Miguel's army had been defeated while making a demonstration on Lisbon, and that Santarem was evacuated. We are surprised to hear that a demonstration that attempted on Lisbon, as we certainly thought that the vicinity of the capital was in undisputed possession of Pedro. If it be true we should be inclined to suppose Pedro's much weaker, than is commonly imagined; and if it be not true, then are the concomitant statements of the evacuation of Santarem, and the victory of Saldanha obnoxious to doubt. In the present state of the matter, it is the safer plan to place no confidence in any of the statements until we obtain more precise information.

We have received Bahama papers to the 12th instant. The Governor, Mr. Balfour, appears to be going on very harmoniously with the new House of Assembly, although we certainly thought that gentleman's language rather dictatorial to the former Parliament, for a politician of the Whig school. We are glad, however, that our good friends in the Bahamas have taken it so quietly, for it has enabled the important business of the colony to proceed, and the fruits are seen in the bills that have been passed. Among the most important acts is that for the abolition of slavery in August next, in accordance with the act of the Imperial Parliament for that purpose, act of the Imperial Parliament for that purpose. Many of our readers we know will rejoice to read the following announcement, which we copy from the Royal Gazette of the 15th of February: "This day, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor went down to the Council Chamber, when the House of Assembly having attended, his Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the following bills, viz:—An Act Auxiliary to an Act of the Imperial Parliament, entitled an Act for the Abolition of Slavery throughout the British Colonies; for promoting the industry of the manumitted slaves; and for compensating the persons hitherto entitled to the services of such Slaves." Several other Bills are enumerated—one to regulate Pilotage, another to regulate the Salt Ponds of Exuma, a third to establish and regulate Public Schools, &c. Jamaica, Antigua, and the Bahamas have then already adopted the great measure of Emancipation.

CAPT. BACK.—We find the following article in the Montreal Gazette. The hopes held out that the dispatches will overtake the intrepid traveller in good time are very gratifying:—
We noted a few weeks ago, that the dispatch for Captain Back, forwarded direct from New York by the United States mail to Saint Mary's about the end of November last, had not reached that place up to the 16th January. Subsequent intelligence received at the Hon. Hudson's Bay Company's office at Lachine announces its receipt on the 20th January, three weeks after the duplicate (forwarded from Lachine, on the 30th November) had come into the possession of the resident partner of the Company. As both the packets were forwarded onward without delay, there is still reason to hope that, by the first sent on from Saint Mary's intelligence of Captain Ross' return, and the new instructions of his Committee, will reach Captain Back, either before he breaks up his winter quarters, supposed to be some way beyond Great Slave Lake, or, failing that, ere he arrived at the ocean.

MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION.—Some days since we mentioned that an important arrangement had been entered into by nearly all the wholesale merchants of this City, who were connected with the business of the country, to abstain from suing or requiring security from their customers.
We are now authorized to state that about THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTY FIRMS have actually become parties to this Association, and that, with very few exceptions, they comprise all the important wholesale merchants of this

City, who are specially interested in the trade of the country.
We are aware, that owing to the unprecedented scarcity of money, considerable alarm has existed in some places and that premature failures have actually taken place in consequence of the existing panic.
But we have now the pleasure of being able to state to our readers in the country, as the opinion of men in business whom we believe most competent to judge in a matter of this sort that there is in this city a decided and unquestionable relief in the money market, which we trust and believe will be abiding; and which, with the important arrangement of the merchants in Boston, ought to give encouragement and confidence to the merchants in the country.
—Boston Daily Advertiser, March 22.

The pressure in the Money Market has lessened considerably. At the close of the week, cash could be obtained at much better rates than heretofore. Yet there still remains a considerable degree, a want of confidence, and an indisposition to active business. As a general remark, there are no sales of any great importance, the operations of the market being chiefly confined to sales to the trade, to supply daily wants. —[From a Review of the Boston Market, Mar. 22.]

EAST INDIES.—The cholera is raging extensively. While the Governor General was on board the *Indis*, the disease broke out amongst the crew, and in three or four days carried off 12 out of 48 individuals, attacked. Throughout the continent the great mortality was attributed to the excessive heat of the season. At Calcutta about 16 Europeans were, in August last, dying daily; and at Allahabad the average of deaths per day, in July, was 50. The unfortunate natives in the neighbourhood of Madras, who for several months had patiently endured the scarcity of the season, were driven to violence on the 19th of August in consequence of a combination amongst the grain-merchants to maintain an exorbitant price of rice. The populace plundered several bazars, and it was found necessary to call in the military.

A dreadful famine prevails in Southern India, the consequences of the late drought in that quarter. The tremendous storm and flood which deluged the lower parts of Bengal in the early part of the year, occurred as if to exhaust the usual supply of moisture for the southern provinces. In Bengal their land have been submerged, and their cattle destroyed, the influx of the sea having deprived them of fresh water. On the Coromandel Coast the people have eaten raw rice while they possessed any, having no water in which to boil it, and none with which to irrigate their lands.

CHOLERA.—We are informed by a person direct from New Orleans, that the cholera made its appearance at that place during the first week of February. Its ravages had not at the last dates been very great, but it was apprehended that the coming season would be a very severe one. —Philadelphia Inq.
