

Mr. Dickson, advocate, seconded his motion, and the Assembly divided, when 156 voted for Dr. Cook's motion, and 44 for that of Mr. Carment.

At half-past ten the Assembly adjourned till Tuesday.

THURSDAY.

VOLUNTARIANISM IN THE ESTABLISHMENT.—A reference was read from the Presbytery of Irvine for advice or decision, in the case of Mr. Hugh Craig, an elder of the High Church, Kilmarnock, who had presided at a public meeting at which resolutions were passed to petition parliament for a separation of the Church from the State. Dr. Cook remarked that it was so clear a point that this Church was only known as a Church in connection with the State, he was astonished that any Presbytery should call for advice on the subject.

FRIDAY.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY'S SCHOOL.—Principal Baird gave in the annual report of the Committee on the General Assembly's Schools in the Highlands, extracts from which he read, after which

Principal M'Farlane rose, and after passing high eulogium on the venerable principal and the committee, moved that the Assembly approve of the proceedings of the committee—reappoint them—and recommend to the Presbyteries, and Christian inhabitants of Scotland, to endeavour by every means in their power to give their continual support to the scheme—that the thanks of the meeting be given to Principal Baird and the committee, and that the Assembly further agree, in accordance with a suggestion in the report, to petition the House of Commons for aid in erecting parochial schools within the bounds of all the parochial churches, which would leave the country at liberty to extend its scheme farther throughout the Highlands.

The motion was unanimously carried. The Moderator then, in a feeling address, conveyed to Principal Baird the thanks of the Assembly.

Proposals for building twenty new parochial churches in the city and suburbs of Glasgow.

"1. It is proposed to build twenty additional parochial churches, each to contain about 1000 sittings.

"2. It is estimated that the costs of the ground, and the building of each church will not exceed £2000.

"3. It is intended to endow each church, by vesting in government or other securities, the sum of £2,000, which may be expected to yield an annual revenue of about £80.

"4. It is proposed to build four churches each year, either in the city or suburbs; thus completing the whole in five years.

"5. To each church it is intended to assign a small parish, containing a population generally not exceeding 3,000.

"According to this estimate, the twenty churches would cost £80,000, which sum it is proposed to raise in the following manner:—

"1. In the city and suburbs there are 40,000 families or heads of families; one tenth, or 4,000 of whom are supposed to be capable of affording £200 for such an object.

"2. Of the 4,000 who are able to afford £200, it is presumed that one tenth, or 400 may be willing to contribute this sum for the accomplishment of so important an object. And 400 persons each contributing £200 will produce £80,000.

"3. As it is proposed to build four churches each year, thus completing the whole in five years, so it is proposed that each contributor should pay the £200 in five years, by successive instalments of £40 a year, subject to the conditions enumerated at the conclusion of this proposal.

The English Mail for June arrived here on Saturday last bringing London dates to the 8th of that month, and subsequently the arrival of the Lady Dunmore at Halifax from Liverpool, with papers to the 11th. Our columns contain the only articles of importance, if indeed they may be termed so, that we have seen or heard of by these conveyances. We are happy to see the two Church Establishments vigorously marching into the field against their enemies, and we doubt not of their ultimate success;—for if these foundations once be destroyed—farewell to all that is good and great. The Editor of the Halifax Times makes the following very excellent remarks on the subject:—

Great exertions are making by the National Church Establishments in England and Scotland, to ensure their permanency, and a decided stand is taken against innovation. They do not now as in the olden time, endanger their existence by a violent use of their power, but appeal to the patriotism of the people, and as on their side they have a great preponderance; both in numbers and wealth of the substantial power of the kingdom, their object must be accomplished. It is too much the nature of Establishments, that they lose their energy, and confident in the protection of the State settle into indifference; and it is in our opinion to be attributed to this want of energy and spiritual exertion more than to other causes, that their opposers have become so powerful, and that they require at almost the last hour, such an array of strength to crush their enemies. The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, have wisely abolished as far as practicable, the law of patronage, and if we consider the spirit with which the Proposals have been met, to build twenty new churches in the City and Suburbs of Glasgow, it may be conjectured that innovation as yet has made but little progress in diminishing the real strength of the Church in that quarter. The excellent answer of His Majesty to the Address of the Archbishops is also tolerably conclusive of the extent of Reform which will be permitted in the Church of England. The mild and protecting influence of an Established religion, as an effectual guarantee against impiety and infidelity, is now more needed than ever, and though abuses (inseparable from the holiest institutions,) may have crept within its pale, yet their eradication should be left to those who can best tell what part is affected by disorder. The members of both Establishments, have it appears set about the good work in earnest, and free from the insanity of the Mob, which would overturn a great good to raise in its place an accumulation of grievous evils.
