

or licensed, and having taken the Oaths as mentioned and prescribed in the said first in part recited Act, and being also duly licensed to solemnize Marriages as herein after provided.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, That from and after the passing of this Act, nothing in the said Act for regulating Marriage and Divorce, and for preventing and punishing incest, adultery and fornication, herein before in part recited, shall extend or be construed to extend to prevent any Minister or Teacher of any denomination of Christians in this Province, such Ministers or Teachers not being engaged in any secular calling, and being British born subjects actually resident in the Province, chosen and elected, or licensed, and having taken the Oaths agreeably to the directions and provisions of the said herein before in part first recited Act from celebrating and solemnizing Marriage agreeably to the forms and usages of their respective Churches or Denominations: Provided always, that in order to exercise the privilege conferred by this Act, every such Minister or Teacher shall be licensed to celebrate and solemnize Marriages by licence under the hand and seal of the Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, which licence such Governor or Commander in Chief is hereby authorized and empowered to grant upon a Petition being preferred to him by such Minister or Teacher representing to the satisfaction of such Governor or Commander in Chief, the circumstances herein before specified as necessary to qualify him for exercising that Privilege; and any such Governor or Commander in Chief shall also have power to revoke and recall any such licence for abuse of the said privilege, or for any such change of the circumstances under which the same was granted, as may appear to him to require it.

II. And be it enacted, that every Marriage solemnized under and by virtue of this Act shall be in the presence of two or more credible witnesses besides the Minister or Teacher who shall celebrate the same, and that a certificate of every such Marriage shall be made, attested, transmitted and registered in like manner in every respect as is described and required in and by two Acts of the General Assembly of this Province, the one made and passed in the fifty second year of the Reign of King George the Third, intituled "An Act more effectually to provide for the public registering of all Marriages solemnized within this Province," the other made and passed in the fifty fourth year of the same Reign, intituled "An Act in addition to an Act, intituled 'An Act more effectually to provide for the public registering of all Marriages solemnized within this Province,' and every such Minister or Teacher, who shall celebrate any such Marriage by virtue of this Act, or any person or persons who shall thereby be married shall be and are hereby respectively made liable and subject to the same pains and penalties, for neglecting and refusing to make, transmit or sign such certificate, as by the said two last mentioned Acts, or either of them, the persons solemnizing Marriage or married, are made subject and liable for any such neglect or refusal.

III. And be it enacted, that no Marriage shall be solemnized by any Minister, Teacher, or ordained person thereunto authorized, either by the said in part recited Act of the thirty-first year of King George the Third for regulating Marriage and Divorce, or by this Act, until after proclamation shall be made with an audible voice of such intended Marriage, in some church, chapel, or other public place of meeting for religious worship in the Town or Parish where such parties, or one of them reside, during the time of Divine Service, on three Sundays successively, except a Licence be first had and obtained therefor, under the hand and seal of the Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief, for the time being, which Licence the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, is hereby authorized and empowered to grant.

IV. And be it enacted, that if any Minister, Teacher, or ordained person, authorized to solemnize Marriage by virtue of the said last mentioned in part recited Act, or of this Act, shall presume to solemnize any Marriage within this Province, until after proclamation on three Sundays successively, as is provided and directed in the next preceding section of this Act, except a Licence be first had and obtained therefor, under the hand and seal of the Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, as aforesaid, such Minister, Teacher, or ordained person, shall be subject to the same penalties and forfeitures, in every respect, to all intents and purposes, as any Parson, Vicar, or Curate, or other person in holy orders

of the Church of England, are subject and liable to by virtue of the second section of the said last mentioned in part recited Act.

V. And be it enacted, that one or more person or persons in each and every County in the Province, shall be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, to issue Marriage Licences, and to take the Bonds required in such cases, under such regulations as such Governor, or Commander in Chief, may think proper to prescribe, and all such Bonds shall, on or before the first day of January in each and every year, be transmitted to the office of the Secretary of the Province, to be there deposited.

VI. And be it enacted, that this Act shall not be in force until His Majesty's Royal approbation be thereunto had and declared.

Finally enacted, ratified, and confirmed, by Order of His Majesty in Council, 15th August, 1834.

CAP. XLVII.

An Act to increase the Representation of the Counties of Carleton, Gloucester, and Kent.

Passed 22d March 1834.

WHEREAS, the great increase of Population and advancement of Commerce and Agriculture, of the Counties of Carleton, Gloucester, and Kent, respectively, renders it expedient and just, to increase the number of Members to serve in General Assembly of the Province for the said Counties;

I. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that the several Counties of Carleton, Gloucester, and Kent, shall be entitled to send one additional Member to serve in the General Assembly of this Province for each of the said Counties, to be elected by the Freeholders in the said Counties respectively, in like manner and subject to the like laws, rules, and regulations, under which the other Members are elected in the said Counties respectively, or any other County. Provided always, that no Writs shall issue for the election of such Members, until there shall be a General Election for the Province.

II. And be it further enacted, that this Act shall not be of any force or effect, until His Majesty's Assent thereto shall have been duly signified.

Finally enacted, ratified, and confirmed, by Order of His Majesty in Council, 15th August, 1834.

THE Commissioner of Crown Lands having been directed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council to take charge of and superintend the Common Lands in the Parish of Fredericton, PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given, that no Timber, Lumber or other incumbrance will be suffered to be placed upon such Lands, nor will any person be permitted to dig sand or gravel, either above or below the Bank of the River, or in any wise injure the said Commons, under pain of prosecution.

Dreadful Hurricane in the West Indies.

An arrival at Alexandria, D. C. from Barbadoes, brings the Editor of the Alexandria Herald, a file of papers, from which he gathers the following particulars of a Hurricane in the West Indies. It occurred on the night of the 20th ult. at the Island of Dominica.

The works on two thirds of the principal Sugar Estates were levelled to the ground, the canes blown flat to the earth, and in many instances buried in this mud and blown from the soil; every description of provisions above ground completely swept away, and the face of the country, which exhibited before the utmost luxuriance of vegetation, changed to the appearance of a general conflagration having passed over it. There are not 50,000 feet of lumber in the Island, nor 100,000 shingles. Every vessel that was in the roads at the time shared the same fate, viz: the sloops Dolphin and Antelope, and a small sloop, from Monserrat. An American schooner was driven on shore, bottom up, on the south end of the Island opposite to Martinique. The officer's barracks and hospital at Morne Bruce, are mostly blown down, and those standing in such a delapidated state as to make them unsafe to occupy. Every building on the garrison has either been crushed to ruins or has suffered considerably—the spacious hospital lately built on an improved plan, has been partly unroofed, and the Barrack Master's and Adjutant's offices have been entirely destroyed, and it was with great difficulty that the troops escaped with-

out loss of life. The left side of the Government House was blown down, and the other parts of the building partially damaged. The office of the Auxiliary Commissioners of Compensation, adjoining those premises, has been materially injured, and a great many of their original documents destroyed. The new Commissariat building—the Custom House—the Court House—Market House—the Gaol and the Protestant Church, and almost every other building in town, have suffered considerable injury from the effects of the Hurricane. The Mercantile Houses of Messrs. Thomas Laing & Co. and Thomas W. Doyle, on account of their proximity to the sea, have also experienced most heavy losses.

Throughout the whole Island, on every estate, the most dreadful destruction took place, the full account of which would fill a column.

The Northern part of Martinique has suffered severely, and many vessels have been lost. St. Pierre did not escape, and considerable loss has been sustained at Fort Royal.

Great fears were entertained that the people of Dominica would suffer for the want of food, and measures were taken at Barbadoes and elsewhere to send supplies to the suffering inhabitants.

All accounts go to show that this has been one of the most destructive hurricanes ever experienced in the West Indies.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST SEMINARY.—This Building, which is 70 feet by 40, and two stories above the basement, was recently raised on a lot near the Presbyterian Church in this place. We believe that the materials of the frame, as well as those of the basement story, are of a very superior description; such as will reflect much credit upon the contractors and others engaged in its erection; and which must, when completed, be an additional ornament to our town. We hope that its anticipated advantages will be fully realized.—*Watchman*

On Thursday last a match against time, which excited much interest, and upon which bets to a considerable amount were pending, was decided by Lord Jocelyn of the Rifle Brigade; the match was, to ride from Halifax to Windsor and back again, a distance of 90 miles in 7 hours, on two horses, and to walk 8 miles, both to be performed in 10 hours, it was accomplished by his Lordship in gallant style, notwithstanding the badness of the roads, which were heavy odds against him: he rode fourteen stone.

His Lordship started at 7 o'clock, walking 7 miles in an hour and thirty minutes; he then changed his dress, and was ready mounted to start for Windsor at a quarter before nine.

From Halifax to Pence's 1 hour 23 minutes, Pence's (where he changed horses) to Mrs. Wilcox's, Windsor, 1h. 24m. Hay at Windsor 6m. From Windsor to Pence's 1h. 22m. Pence's to Halifax 2h 27m. Thus winning with three minutes to spare; and then walked the last mile, accomplished the whole match within 9 hours.—*Halifax Journal*.

THE ARMY.—War Office, September 12. Staff.—Lieutenant-Colonel J. J. Snodgrass, on half-pay, unattached, to be Deputy Quartermaster General to the Troops serving in Nova Scotia and its dependencies, vice Broke who resigns.

The Legislature of Nova Scotia is to meet for the dispatch of business on the 27th of the present month.

THE CHOLERA.—During the early part of the present week, fears were entertained that the disease was about to extend its ravages to all parts of the city,—cases having occurred in several of the Wards which had before been entirely free from the malady; we are glad however, to have it in our power this morning, to state, that although some very sudden deaths have taken place within the last few days, the disease is manifestly declining.—In proof of this assertion, we refer to the subjoined reports of the Board of Health.

The number of cases reported since the commencement, now amount to 100—deaths, 45.

CITY AND COUNTY OF SAINT JOHN.

Tuesday morning, November 4.

Sixteen new cases of Asiatic Cholera have been reported by the Physicians since Saturday morning, four of them fatal; besides four deaths from those then under treatment.

Thursday morning, November 6.

Nine new cases of Asiatic Cholera have been reported to the Board since Tuesday morning, three of which have been fatal; those then under treatment are doing well.

The Board are happy to add that of the new cases now reported, only two occurred within the last twenty-four hours.

Saturday morning, November 8.

Since Thursday morning—Seven new cases of Asiatic Cholera, one death;—besides one death from among those then remaining. The Board feel very happy in being enabled to issue so favourable a report.
