At a Meeting of a Number of the Merchants and other Inhabitants of

FREDERICTON, HELD ON THE 26TH

DECEMBER, 1833.

To take into consideration the propriety of adopting

measures, to obtain the establishment of a

Bank in Fredericton, the following Resolutions

were agreed to unanimously:—

Resolved, That this Meeting, being deeply

sensible that the example and experience, of all

enlightened commercial countries, fully demon-

strate the great benefits derived from the intro-

duction and prosecution of Banking, and from the

establishment of Banks, based upon liberal prin-

ciples, and having heard with much pleasure,

that efforts are being made in the City of St. John,

for the incorporation of another Provincial Bank,

is of opinion, that the establishment of a Branch

of the proposed Bank in Fredericton, will tend

greatly to relieve the Mercantile, Mechanical,

Agricultural, and all other classes of the com-

munity, from many of the difficulties, under which

they now labor.

Resolved, That as the committee appointed

by a meeting held in St. John, to adopt the neces-

sary measures to obtain the required institution,

have intimated a perfect willingness, and wish,

that the counties of York, Sunbury, and Carleton,

with all others trading with Fredericton should

participate in the advantages to be derived from

the proposed Bank, it is the opinion of this Meet-

ing, that measures should be immediately taken,

to co-operate with the committee in St. John, for

the attainment of the object they have in view.

Resolved, That a Petition be prepared for

the signatures of this community, to be presented

to the Legislature, praying the enactment of a

Law incorporating THE COMMERCIAL BANK

OF NEW BRUNSWICK, and containing a clause,

or clauses, rendering it obligatory on the Direc-

tors, to establish a Branch in Fredericton, and to

enforce the commencement of business thereat,

at the same time, and in all respects similar, to

the operations of the principal establishment in

St. John.

Resolved, That this meeting, being fully con-

vinced that the introduction of the Scotch System

of Banking, will greatly enhance the benefits which

the Province will derive from a new Bank, and

be of incalculable advantage to the Agricultural

Counties in particular, and noticing that the Re-

port of the St. John Committee, avows an inten-

tion of introducing that system, is of opinion, that

the Petition should pray the Legislature to insert

a clause in the proposed Bank Bill, requiring the

Directors to introduce it as far as practicable.

Resolved, That the following Gentlemen be

a committee, to adopt the necessary measures to

carry into effect the objects embodied in the pre-

ceding Resolutions:—viz—

To His Excellency Major General Sir

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, Baronet, Lieu-

tenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief

of the Province of New Brunswick, &c.

&c. &c. The Honourable His Majesty's

Council, and the Honourable the

House of Assembly for the same Province,

in General Assembly convened.

The Petition of the undersigned Inhabitants of

Fredericton and the adjacent Country

Humbly Sheweth—

That your Petitioners view with much satisfaction

the efforts making in the City of St. John, to

establish another Provincial Bank: but they are

convinced the evils complained of by the Mer-

chants of the City will continue to exist in the

interior, unless measures are adopted to ensure a

more general participation in the benefits of the

contemplated establishment.

That the embarrassments complained of are

common to all parts of the country, and to all

classes of the community, as well Agricultural as

Mercantile: That the recent depreciation of every

any alteration in its charter during this session of the Legislature, in order that both Banks may be placed upon an equal footing, and enabled to come before the public under similar circumstances. And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

YORK, Nov. 22.—It is certain that the Bar-

ings and Rothschilds have concluded to estab-

lish a Bank in Canada (whether in Upper or

Lower we are not informed) in which is to

be employed two million of pounds sterling,

and their business is to be conducted on the

Scotch principle. Before it has been in opera-

tion five years, we predict that no other kind

of Bank will be tolerated on that Continent.

NEW-YORK, Dec. 14.

It is understood that a line of steam packets,

to run between Liverpool and New-York, is

about to be established. These vessels will be

built in the most complete manner with en-

gines of extraordinary power. The practicability

of passing to and fro, from England to this

country, has already been demonstrated, first,

by the Robert Fulton, and lastly, by the Roy-

al William. In these voyages coal will of

course be employed for generating the steam,

and as it can be procured in England at a low

rate, it will be more economical than wood; it

will be an expensive matter, however, to pur-

chase the regular supply in this port for the re-

turn voyage, unless the Nova Scotia coal, or

that from the Sydney mines, in Cape Breton

be used. The company, however, will soon

make this discovery, and doubtless purchase

the cheapest. Of the efficacy of the Nova

Scotia coal there can be no doubt, as it has al-

ready been fully tested by the Royal William,

who made her passage to Cowes in seventeen

days. One of the Providence steam-vessels,

we understand, uses it with great advantage;

and the new boat about to ply between this

port and Charleston, will be provided with the

same material. In fact, it is asserted, and we

even believe it to be so, that the Sydney coal

is even better adapted for steam-boat purposes

than the English. This arises from the cir-

cumstance of the former containing more hu-

morous matter, and being therefore more in-

flammable. It is not quite so durable perhaps

as the English, but the rapidity with which it

undergoes combustion, and the quantity of gas

evolved during the process of combustion, fits

in a peculiar manner for steam-boat and gas-

work purposes. The Nova Scotia coal is

however, pretty well known now, and the mer-

it of its general introduction here is to be at-

tributed to the spirited exertions of Mr. Rupert

Cochrane, the resident agent in this City. We

congratulate our colonial friends on the increas-

ing demand for this great staple of their coun-

try.—Albion.
