### CASUAL REVENUE, &c.

" Mr. Partelow, from the Committee to whom were referred the Accounts of the Casual Revenue for 1833, and the returns of Land disposed of in the same period, submits the following Report :—  
No. 1. It is a Schedule of Warrants drawn on the King's Casual Revenue, between 1st January, and 31st December, 1833, amounting to £26,229 3 8

It will be observed that on the 31st December, part of the Warrants to the extent of £3,647 9 64, enumerated in No. 1, were unpaid; and that consequently the actual balance in the hands of the Receiver General and Commissioner of Crown Lands, on the 31st December last, was £8,179 5 02. Your Committee being not in possession of the Honorable Thomas Baillie's Account, are not aware in what way the balance in his hands arises, or why any part of the Warrants should remain unpaid on the 31st December, or Warrants paid in part, when there was so large a sum in the hands of the Public Officers.

The difference in amount of this Balance, and that stated in the Account rendered last year, for the information of the House of Assembly, is occasioned by the addition of £79 4 63 to the amount of Fines and Purchase Money on Grants of Land, under the old system—and the sum of £5 13 78 to the amount of Quit Rents; the Receiver General's Accounts not having been rendered in time to admit of their being credited when the Account was required.

**SATURDAY 1st March 1834.**  
Mr. Weldon, Chairman from the Committee to whom was referred the Report of James A. Maclauchlan, Esquire, Commissioner for extending relief to the Madawaska sufferers, made a Report, which he read, and as it followed :—

The Committee to whom was referred the accounts and papers relating to expenses incurred for the relief of the inhabitants of the Madawaska settlement, by the direction of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, have examined into the same, and submit the following Report, viz :—

That, from Returns furnished by the Commissioners, James A. Maclauchlan, and Francis Rice, Esquires, it appears the settlement of Madawaska contains 2,513 souls, of which 983 were destitute of the means of support : That 680 bushels of Indian Corn, and 30 barrels of Rye Flour, were distributed among the sufferers, the expense of which is

And it was carried in the affirmative. The following was then moved :—

" Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the present Revenue Law should be continued and amended, and that a small Ad-valorem Duty should be imposed on Goods of British Manufacture."

Whereupon the Committee divided—  
**YEAS 17. NAYS 15.**

And it was carried in the affirmative. The following was then moved :—

" Resolved, That the opinion of this Committee it is expedient to impose an additional Duty of three pence per Gallon on all Wine imported into this Province."

And upon the question for this Resolution, the Committee again divided—  
**YEAS 10. NAYS 15.**

And it was decided in the negative. That the following was then moved :—

" Resolved, In the opinion of this Committee, that Treasury Notes to the extent of £15,000, payable on demand at the Treasury Office, be issued out of which the Road appropriations for 1834 be first paid, and that £5000 be borrowed on interest, to meet such portions of the same as may be required to be redeemed by the holders from time to time at the Treas-

ury."

Whereupon the Committee again divided—

**YEAS 7. NAYS 15.**

And it was decided in the negative, That another Resolution was then moved, viz.—

" Resolved, In the opinion of this Committee, it is expedient that the Treasurer of the Province issue Treasury Debentures bearing interest, reasonable in not less than 18 months, to an amount of £ in payment of Warrants tendered for payment at the Treasury, for appropriations of the past and present year."

To which the following proposal as an amendment—
