Lord William Bentinck has recently adopted the English language in his correspondence with Fyz Mahomed Kan, one of the native chiefs in the West of India; this has caused a considerable sensation in Delhi, where a demand for English tutors and secretaries is in consequence perceptible. At Bombay, too, the English language is more generally sought after than before by the natives. Besides the school at Poona, the central school of the Native Education Society has 100 students, to which number it is limited. There are also several private schools in the island.

**SUPREME COURT, HALIFAX.**—John Lee, the person mentioned in our paper of 26th ult. as having attempted the life, and robbed the person of Thomas Trueman, of Margaret's Bay, of paper money to the amount of £10, has been found guilty of highway robbery.

Mr. Duckett, of the treasurer's office, being called on to prove the Treasury Notes, was asked by Mr. Ritchie, the Council for the prisoner, if he would swear to the value of them: whereat there was some laughter in the Court. On the 22nd inst. as Mr. O'Connor, Deputy Surveyor, and two men in the employ of Mr. Charles Enor were on their return from running lines on the west side of the Oromocto Lake, and passing through the woods to Mr. Enor's camp observed some unnatural tracks near a large pine stump, of about twelve feet in height. Having a dog and gun and two axes with them they proceeded to the stump, which was hollow, on reaching which the dog gave an alarm, and on striking it several times, out scrambled a monstrous Bear, upon which O'Connor fired and lodged the contents of his musket in his neck; when he reached the ground the dog seized him behind, and while in the act of turning to give battle to his assailant, one of the men sunk his axe in his head which ended the conflict. He is said to be among the largest and fattest of the kind which are rarely to be met with in the Province—weighing about 350 weight.

FROM THE NEW YORK ALBION.

We are without later advices from England, but by the *Manchester*, from Havre, we have received papers a day or two later from the Continent.

From these papers we have made some extracts—they are not of importance, further than showing that the Spanish contest is still going on, and that the horrors of civil war still afflict Spain. It is said that matters wear a more favourable aspect for the Queen's cause—it may be so, but there is no particular evidence of it in the

papers before us; her troops are still blockaded in St. Sebastian, and a large part of the north of the kingdom is yet in arms against her. Don Carlos is supposed to be lingering on the frontiers of Portugal, without making any effort, or offering any public encouragement to his partisans. Time alone can decide the fate of this struggle.

Our private accounts from England represent the trade of the country as most prosperous, and the revival which has taken place during the last six months to be on a solid and wholesome foundation. There is sufficient explanation of this a new and happy state of things in the removal of the causes that gave rise to the previous depression, namely, the Cholera, and the political agitation excited by the Reform Bill. Pestilence and internal commotion are two powerful solvents of national wealth; and if we look back and see how fearfully England suffered from each of these causes, our surprise at her late embarrassment ceases. The country sustained a fearful shock by the great panic of 1825, and the excessive speculations that immediately led to it. So great, indeed, was that shock, that several years were requisite for the country to recover itself. This recovery was on the point of taking place in 1830, when the death of the late King, the revolutions in France and Belgium, the change of ministry in England, and the adoption of a new system of policy in the British councils, checked the returning tide of prosperity—while the Reform Bill and the Cholera, as before stated, brought on the national distress that prevailed throughout the years 1830 and 1832. These difficulties have now passed, not, we hope, to return. Providence, we trust, has caused the desolating plague to pass by us, satisfied with the chastisement we have already received. The people of England, from bitter experience, have seen the sad effects of agitation, and now they have obtained that addition to their political privileges for which a large majority of them so zealously contended, they will not readily court a renewal of the evil. From these premises our correspondents infer that much prosperity is at hand; and it is, moreover, known that the utmost activity prevails in all the great branches of national industry throughout the kingdom.

It is an undeniable fact that England, notwithstanding her previous exhaustion, not only rallied her former energies, but gained a double strength and vigour in the reaction that ensued. The necessity of a rapid transportation of products was therefore soon experienced, in order to meet the continued demand, and with the admirable and successful experiment of the Liverpool and Manchester railway before them, our countrymen were not long in devising a similar means for the enjoyment of similar benefits in other parts of the Kingdom. Already the note of preparation is heard from Liverpool to Birmingham; from Birmingham to London; from London to Norwich, to Gloucester and the iron districts of Wales, thus connecting the Metropolis with the locations from whence the great staples of the country are supplied. In other situations, where canals are the channels of communication, a mode has been devised for the transit of goods at the rate of ten or twelve miles an hour, thus overcoming the often-repeated objection to canal navigation, at the same time accomplishing the advantage with perfect safety and convenience.

In many places, the system of spade husbandry has been carried into effect, stimulated by the example of the patriotic Bishop of Bath and Wells, and it is not too much to hope that the time is near at hand when the pauper population will be reduced to the sick and the aged, redeeming a race of men, with physical power to benefit themselves, from the disgraceful penalty of receiving alms.

If we regard the prospects of the merchant, they are, perhaps, yet more cheering than those of any of the classes to whom we have alluded; the article in our columns this day, respecting the East India Charter, is admirably explanatory of the advantages awaiting mercantile adventure, and if to these be added the probabilities of successful enterprise with the West India Colonies, when the hour of their trial has passed over, the path of the ocean will once more lead to the havens of wealth, where the industry and intelligence of the Englishman are sure of reward.

We have said enough in allusion to the condition of our country, to justify the impression that a brilliant career is before her, provided the circumstances of the times are now left to their natural operation. England is not in a condition to put up with further experiment, although some profitable changes might yet be directed, it is better to leave her for a while at rest, that her children may work undisturbed in the variety of pursuit that claims their attention and forms their wealth and power.

The following is a copy of the Petition which has been approved of by some of the most influential inhabitants of the County of Carleton, and has already been signed by several of the Magistrates and many of the principal inhabitants of the County.

To His Excellency Major General Sir ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor, and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick &c. &c. The Honourable His Majesty's COUNCIL, and the Honourable the HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY for the same Province, in General Assembly convened.

The Petition of the undersigned, Magistrates, Merchants, and other Inhabitants of Woodstock, and other villages and settlements in the County of Carleton.

**Humbly Sheweth**—That your Petitioners have read with great satisfaction, the efforts making in various parts of the Counties lying on the River St. John, for the establishment of a new Provincial Bank, and the location of a Branch at Fredericton, to be conducted upon such principles as will embrace within the sphere of its operations the Agricultural and Lumbering districts of the interior.

That your Petitioners have long suffered from the want of such an Institution, and they have the most palpable evidence to convince them that not only have the real capabilities of the country continued to lie dormant, and the strenuous efforts of its inhabitants been paralyzed from the want of a sufficient circulating medium, but all the important interests of the country must continue to languish, unless some such means as those proposed, be devised to relieve the multiplied requirements of an increased population.

That while real estate of every description has, during the last seven years, increased in value in the neighbouring States, it has depreciated in a progressive ratio, upon the St. John. Your Petitioners are convinced that with a climate as favourable as Maine, with a quality of soil and all other high statistical resources in the aggregate, vastly superior to its most favored district, the great cause of your Petitioners' embarrassments is to be attributed to the artificial defect alluded to, for they are bound to admit the humiliating fact, that the most wealthy Merchant, or Farmer of Carleton possessed of Lands or of Houses to any amount, and with all kinds of dead property, whether in action or possession, cannot, without great sacrifices, realize a sufficient sum of Money to enable him to pay the deposit on a grant of Land or a Mill Privilege, or the stumpage of a timber berth, while the inhabitant of Maine has upwards of twenty banks to resort to, to enable him to supply his immediate demands, and the most insignificant trader of Houlton has only to repair to Bangor, where three banks are open for his accommodation.

Your Petitioners having noticed with much solicitude, the flourishing and extensive settlements forming in the wilderness parts of the adjoining State, the rapidity of their increase, the comfort and apparent wealth of their population, the excellence of their roads, and the rapid advancement of the arts and all other marks of civilization—all the works of a few years, all effected with advantages far inferior, to those possessed by your Petitioners, they are inclined to enquire into the cause of the superiority of their Republican neighbours, and the result of their investigation induces them to attribute it to the greater facilities they have of converting their property into a tangible medium, and the greater supply of that medium it procures. Your Petitioners, believing the establishment of a Bank in Fredericton, which for its centrality will be accessible to the inhabitants of the interior will remedy many of the evils which now press so heavily upon all classes of the community, inasmuch as it will call into action much capital that now lies dormant, for the want of some secure and profitable employment, and invigorate all the energies of the country.

Your Petitioners would draw the attention of your Excellency and your Honors to what is termed the Scotch System of Banking as eminently adapted to the situation of an Agricultural Country, and in a high degree calculated to meet the requirements of villages and settlements, removed at a distance from the locality of the Bank.

Your Petitioners therefore pray your Excellency and your Honors to take the premises into consideration, and pass an Act incorporating the Commercial Bank of New Brunswick, and containing a clause or clauses, rendering it

obligatory on the Directors to establish a Branch in Fredericton, to be supplied with a sufficient portion of capital to meet the wants of the populous districts in its vicinity and to commence operation at the same time, and upon the same principles as the principle establishment in St. John, and which will likewise require the Directors to introduce the Scotch System as soon, and to as great an extent as may be found practicable.

And as your Petitioners are fully convinced any immediate increase of the Capital Stock of the Bank of New-Brunswick, will tend to defeat the objects they desire to attain, they therefore pray your Excellency and your Honors will pass no bill during this Session, authorising such increase, or in any way altering its charter, in order that both Banks may be placed upon an equal footing.
