

...the more gratifying, in as much as the income has risen from any extraordinary source, but is to be attributed to a regular and progressive improvement in the benefactions, and subscriptions, and in the amount received for the Society's publications.—The hopes and desires of the Society, with regard to the Indian episcopate, have at length been in some degree fulfilled. In the Act which has recently passed for the renewal of the East-India Company's Charter, Parliament has authorized the creation of two new Sees, one at Madras, the other at Bombay; the Bishops of which are to be subject to the Bishop of Calcutta, who will thus become metropolitan of India. The salaries of the Archdeacons are hereafter to be very small; and thus the change will be effected at a very little expense.

MARRIAGE.—It was not until the Council of Trent, in 1420, that the intervention of a priest or other ecclesiastical functionary was deemed in Europe indispensable to a marriage. The celebrated decree passed in that session interdicted any marriage otherwise than in the presence of a priest, and at least two witnesses. Before the time of Pope Innocent the Third (1198) there was no solemnization of marriage in the church, but the man came to the house where the woman resided and took her home to his own, which was all the ceremony then used; hence the expression, "*uxorem ducere et capere in vtrum*." Banns were first directed to be published Canon Hubert Walter in 1200.—*Burn's Fleet Register.*

Capt. Harris, of the Navy, foreseeing the possible delinquency of the sugar culture in the West Indies, has at once struck out a plan whereby these valuable islands may be made the means of furnishing this Country with a vegetable fibre which will entirely supersede the hemp and flax of Russia and Holland.—His Majesty's ship, *Vernon*, at present on the West India station, has her complement of sails and cordage manufactured from some of the fibrous productions of the West Indies, by Capt. Harris, under permission of the Board of Admiralty, by way of experiment.

Robert Kaye Greville, LL. D., F. R. S. Edinburgh, has prepared a document regarding the moral and physical properties of Ardent Spirits, embodying a most unequivocal testimony against them from upwards of 440 of the most eminent physicians and surgeons of Scotland, England, and Ireland. This document, without suggesting any measure in regard to the pernicious liquors, has been submitted to the consideration of the Members of both Houses of Parliament.

Liverpool exceeds in trade and resources all the cities of the world, with the exception of London. The revenues of the town property and dues amount to nearly £100,000 annually; its dock duties exceed £182,000; its assessed house property is estimated at £200,000; the rates levied for its poor amount to £50,000; about 12,000 vessels, with a tonnage of 1,411,944 tons, belong to its port; and the collected Customs on its merchandise amount to nearly the sum of £4,000,000. The reader may form some idea of the prodigious magnitude of the latter item, when we mention that it exceeds the Custom House duties of all Scotland and Ireland put together; and that no port of France, with the exception of Havre, yields one-fourth of such a revenue.

The Bishop of Calcutta has recently presided at a large meeting at Calcutta, at which he was determined to introduce INFANTRY SCHOOLS on an extensive scale in that Presidency. A Committee has been appointed under the patronage of the Governor General, and instructions forwarded to this Country, to send over a master and mistress for a central school.

Louis Philippe, King of the French, has recently written to Dr. Chambers, for the purpose of being supplied with the plans of education which have proved so successful in Scotland, and also with the best method of conveying Scriptural knowledge to his people.

On motion of Mr. S. Humbert,

Whereas, The Act extending the privilege of Solemnizing Marriage to Ministers of certain Religious Congregations, passed by this House in the Session of 1832, has not been confirmed by His Majesty for the reasons set forth in the Dispatch from the Right Honourable Mr. Stanley, Secretary of State for the Colonies, of the 1st day of January last; And whereas a Bill is now before this House for the like purpose, with such provisions, as will obviate the objections pointed out in said Dispatch, therefore

Resolved, That a humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to inform this House, whether he could assent to such a Bill, without reserving it for His Majesty's Royal approbation.

Ordered, That Mr. S. Humbert, Mr. Slason and Mr. Kinnear, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Resolved, That a humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying His Excellency to lay before this House, Copies of all Official Dispatches and Documents transmitted by him to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, since His Excellency assumed the Administration of the Government, up to the present time, relating to the subject of the Casual and Territorial Revenues, and to the Petitions of this House to the King in 1832 and 1833, upon the subject of the said Revenues, and a permanent Civil List to be provided by the Legislature:—And also Copies of all Official Dispatches in reply to such as may have been received from the Colonial Office, relating thereto:—And also Copies of all Official Dispatches and Documents which have been received from the Colonial Office since His Excellency assumed the Administration of the Government, upon the foregoing subject.

Ordered, That Mr. Allen, Mr. Rankin and Mr. Clinch, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

TUESDAY, 11th March, 1834.

Mr. Brown from the Committee on the present circumstances of the Province from the failure of the Crops, made a Report, which he read, and is as follows:—

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the situation of the several Counties in this Province, occasioned by the failure of the Crops during the last year, with a view to Legislative aid, having had the subject under consideration, report:—

That in many parts of the Province great distress prevails, by reason of the failure of Crops, and that some Legislative aid is absolutely necessary, to enable many inhabitants to procure seed, grain and potatoes.—They therefore recommend an appropriation of two thousand pounds, including the amount already expended for the relief of the Madawaska Settlement, to be apportioned as follows, viz:—

York, £100

Carleton, 176

Northumberland, 200

Gloucester, 200

Kent, 150

Westmorland, 200

King's, 200

Queen's, 200

Sunbury, 120

Saint John, 80

Exclusive of the sums of £374 for the Madawaska sufferers.

The Committee would also recommend that the money be expended by the Justices of the Peace in the several Counties, in the purchase of seed, grain and potatoes, and supplied to such poor inhabitants as may stand in absolute need thereof, taking from such persons so supplied, a receipt for the amount, and a promise to pay the same to the Province Treasurer, to be cancelled by labour performed by such persons on the roads, either under the Supervisor of Great Roads, or Commissioners of Highways, in the County.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honourable Mr. Secretary Odell, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Message.

"NEW BRUNSWICK."

"Message to the House of Assembly, 11th March, 1834."

"ARCHBISHOP CAMPBELL."

"In complying with the Addresses of the House of Assembly, of the 13th and 24th ultimo; the first requesting detailed accounts of the Receipts and Expenditure of the King's Casual Revenue, for the year 1833; and the second asking for a statement of all Fees which had accrued to the Public Officers on the Civil List of the Province, for the same period, it was the Lieutenant Governor's wish and endeavour, to render the required information so complete and satisfactory, as to leave the House nothing to desire, on that head: It is therefore with regret that he finds, by the Address of the 7th instant, that his efforts to give full effect to the wishes of the House of Assembly, have so far failed; and that numerous and voluminous accounts and statements are now sought for—some of which now are of a nature, which, notwithstanding the most earnest disposition on the part of the Lieutenant Governor, to aid, to the utmost of his power, the deliberations of the House, on the great question now before it, he yet feels himself compelled to decline furnishing. Guided, however, by feelings and considerations, which he trusts will be duly appreciated, he will take upon himself the responsibility of directing all such of the accounts and statements enumerated in the last mentioned Address, (as he can with any degree of propriety furnish) to be prepared as speedily, and in as perfect form as may be practicable, with the understanding, however, that it is not to be considered as any precedent for future proceedings; but the names of parties who have had their timber seized or forfeited, or the number and names of Petitioners, at the Crown Lands and Secretary's Offices—whether their Petitions have been complied with or not, is information which, if it could be correctly ascertained, the Lieutenant Governor considers would be improper for him to give;—as to all moneys paid by such Petitioners, the same will appear in the accounts to be rendered, to which they respectively belong. The Accounts of the Receiver General and Commissioner of Crown Lands, applied for in the Address, are regularly transmitted, at the end of every quarter, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, after having been audited by the Auditor General, who is responsible to His Majesty for the correctness of his audit; and therefore as they are accounts exclusively between those Officers, and the Crown, the Lieutenant Governor does not deem it expedient to order them to be laid before the House.

Mr. Partelow, Chairman of the Committee of Correspondence, laid before the House, important Communications received from John Bainbridge and Henry Bliss, Esquires, the Province Agents at London, on the subject of Duties on Foreign Timber.

The several Documents being read at the Clerk's Table, were ordered to lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Chandler,

The House went into Committee of the whole in further consideration of the several Messages received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Smith in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having under their consideration the Message received from His Excellency the 6th instant, on the further subject of the King's Casual and Territorial Revenue, reserving the proceeds of the sale to the New Brunswick Land Company, and that the Committee had passed the following Resolutions:—

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Dispatch from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated 4th January, relating to the monies arising from the New Brunswick Land Company, would have most materially influenced the deliberations of this House, when in Committee of the whole on the 4th and 5th instant, in consideration of the propositions made by His Majesty's Government, dated the 30th September last, relating to the surrender of the Casual and Territorial Revenues.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Committee, as His Majesty's Government in consequence of the repeated applications of the Assembly, had, by the said communication of the 30th September last, stated the terms on which the control of the said Revenues were to be surrendered to the Legislature, and that as the House of Assembly after full consideration had on the 5th instant, agreed to accept the said proposal made in the said communication, and had appointed a Committee to prepare a Bill with suitable provisions to meet the view as in the said Dispatch were expressed and understood, it is deeply to be regretted that the additional condition contained in the Dispatch of the 4th January now prevents this Committee recommending to the House to act further upon the said Resolution of the 5th instant.

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that it is expedient to Address His Majesty on the subject of the foregoing Resolutions.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

Mr. Allen from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address of yesterday, requesting copies of certain correspondence with the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, reported, that they had attended to that duty and His Excellency was pleased to make the following reply:—

"GENTLEMEN,"

"The new and comprehensive right assumed by the House of Assembly in this Address, of calling for the correspondence that may have passed between His Majesty's Government and the Representatives of His Majesty in this Province, appears to be subversive of the principles and spirit of the British constitution; and I feel that I should ill deserve the confidence reposed in me by His Majesty, were I to hesitate in meeting so dangerous an encroachment, not only on the independence of the Executive of this British Province, but upon the Prerogatives of the British Crown, by a most decided and unqualified refusal."

By the English Mail for February, express from Halifax, we have been positively favored with London papers up to the 6th ulto. The Royal Speech will be found in another column. It is a document, in these times more particularly, of the deepest interest. What the effect will be of that part of it which relates to Ireland we cannot pretend to foresee. Those who lament the distractions of that unhappy country, will evidently have harder work now than they have heretofore experienced; and the popularity of the King's stand, with, in all likelihood, be thoroughly tested on the Royal visit to the Emerald Isle. To declare his sentiments on so important a subject, as the question of the Repeal of the Union, prior to his going amongst His Irish subjects, is a trait in the King's character for which he is worthy of much praise. We shall see what the result will be. During the debate in the House of Commons on the Address to His Majesty, a violent altercation took place between Lord Althorp and Mr. Sheil, the Member for Tipperary, which eventually ended in their being given into the custody of the Sergeant at Arms. The proceedings are so very lengthy, that we cannot now present our readers with any tolerable connected outline of the views of the Speakers, who delivered their sentiments on the subject.—We have copied the Editorial remarks of the *Morning Post* and the subsequent explanations of Lord Althorp and Mr. Sheil, upon which they were again liberated.

Timber, we are informed, had experienced a considerable rise in the Liverpool market, and some cargoes from this Port had recently been sold at fair remunerating prices.—*St John Courier.*

On Thursday morning after a lingering illness Mrs. Martha, consort of Anthony Lockwood, Junr. Esq. leaving a husband with four small children to lament their sad bereavement.

At Government House, Halifax, on Saturday night last, after an illness of nine weeks duration, which he bore with exemplary resignation, patience, and fortitude, Lieutenant Colonel James Fullerton, C. B. & K. H. commanding His Majesty's 90th Regt. aged 52 years.

At Cornwallis, (N. S.) on the 22d ult. John Barnard Rolph, about 27 years of age.—He has left considerable landed property to his heirs, if any can be found.—He was born in Halifax, but left there quite young, and was brought up by Samuel Bishop, Esq. of Horton.

At York, on the morning of the 25th ulto. Ann, wife of William Harley, Esq. and Sister in law to J. S. Howard, Esq., P. M. aged 36 years. Mrs. Harley was a daughter of the late Capt Arch'd McLean of the Parish of St. Mary's, New Brunswick; came to this Province last Autumn—found peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ—and among her last acts recommended her five children to the care and blessing of Him unto whose hands she peacefully committed her own Spirit.
