

LANCASHIRE.—The Cotton factories at Bolton, Shaw, Oldham, and Heywood have nearly commenced working full time, and there is a better prospect for the cotton trade. The silk weaving business, for several miles round Manchester, continues to be very bad. Above one half of the hands are out of employment.

IRELAND.—The intelligence from this country bears too much its ordinary impress.—Burnings and murders—beatings, robberies and maimings continue to prevail. The potato crop too, especially in the southern part of the Island, has fallen vastly short of its usual rate of production. "Such a circumstance," says the Tipperary Free Press—"one which is almost uniformly followed by sequels the most distressing to a population who rely on the potato as their principal sustenance, and chief support, must, at the present juncture, bring with it many disagreeable sensations to the great majority of the Irish people. The failure to which we allude is not isolated—it is not confined to one county or two; if such were the case, so many unpleasant anxieties could not arise—but if we argue from the paragraphs put forth in many of our provincial contemporaries, this blight has been experienced very generally."

FRANCE.—The Moniteur contains a Royal Ordinance, convoking the French Chambers on Monday, the 23d of December. The long existing difference between Marshal Soult and M. Humann, Minister of Finance, were daily assuming a more serious aspect.

SPAIN.—The papers received by this arrival give us additional reason to believe that the cause of the Queen Regent of Spain, in support of her daughter's title to the throne, will be sustained by the French government. It is reported that the Queen mother has been compelled to leave Madrid, but there is no confirmation of the news. It has been also said that the French Army of observation had crossed the Spanish frontier for her relief. This, however, was also a matter of doubt; for it does not appear that her cause was desperate. The recent movements of General Sarria were unknown, but he had not been beaten. It is reported that General Castagnon had received a check, and the Carlist force to which they were opposed amounted to 12,000 men; but St. Sebastian had not surrendered.

The country, at various places, is up in arms, but Madrid is tranquil. Mervin, the curate, is said to occupy the whole road from the capital to Bayonne, but couriers pass without much interruption. The Carlists are entering Spain from France, but the Constitutionalists were also returning home.

On the whole, however, the aspect of affairs, on the part of the Queen Regent is by no means flattering, unless she obtains early and effectual succor from foreign powers. One of the French accounts states, that Don Carlos has entered Biscay, and adds—he has understood the necessity of giving a leader to his partisans; the example of Don Miguel losing his kingdom by proxy has determined him on trying his fortune in person. The rebellion will henceforth have a centre and a common direction.

PORTUGAL.—Our advices by these papers are no later from Lisbon than Nov. 2d. The same dates have been received before. Party spirit was running high in the Portuguese capital. It was believed that affairs would proceed with more domestic harmony, if foreigners, both ashore and afloat, would cease their officious intermeddling. Recruits from England, and also from Belgium, were frequently arriving, and were sent off to the army, in fine spirits, at Santarem. Orders have been received in England, however, directing the agents of Don Pedro to enlist no more recruits. We presume, therefore, that the contest is considered in effect to have been decided.

Dutch papers are to Nov. 11. It is stated in one of them, and with an air of authority, that the missions of Prince Schwartzburg to the King, whatever its special objects might have been, had met, at the hands of his Majesty, with entire success.

There is as yet, however, no palpable manifestation in their Dutch councils of a better disposition to accommodate than has yet appeared.

RUSSIA.—A letter from Pultawa, in the Ukraine, presents a deplorable picture of the extremity to which the population of that fertile part of Russia is reduced by the total failure of the crops. The inhabitants have given themselves up to despair, being obliged to feed upon roots. A great number have perished through exhaustion. Corn, which is so scarce that it may be said there is none at all, has risen to an excessive price, it being more than fifteen times its ordinary value.

Still later advices from St. Petersburg, reaching to the 1st Nov., show that the famine spoken of in a preceding paragraph is by no means confined to the province of Ukraine.

Russia is suffering at the present moment, to a dreadful extent, from the total failure of the harvest in many parts of the empire. We form some conception of the extent of the consequent scarcity from some of the Imperial ordinances contained in the last Petersburg papers, which reach to the 14th (26th) of October.

By a resolution of the Ministerial Committee every kind of corn is allowed to be conveyed free of duty, and even in foreign vessels, from one Russian port to another, and this permission is to remain in force, not only for the present but even for the whole ensuing year.

CAPTAIN ROSS.—A theatrical representation, entitled "Captain Ross, or the King of the Arctic Regions" was recently brought out in the Royal Pavilion Theatre, White Chapel road. The gallant Captain attended in person, but his presence becoming known by accident, the theatre was soon crowded to excess. He remained during the exhibition, and when it closed, drove off in his carriage, amidst the cheers of an immense crowd which had assembled in front of the building.

At a late meeting of the Geographical Society in Regent street, the intrepid Captain Ross attended for the purpose of receiving the royal medal of fifty guineas, which had been voted to him for his scientific and geographical discoveries in the Arctic regions. The meeting was numerously attended.

There has been a continual fall in the price of Wheat ever since the commencement of the late harvest.

Kean died intestate, and although it is ascertained that he had received, during the nineteen years that he was an actor, the sum of £150,000, or nearly \$750,000, yet he died so poor, that his widow has not deemed it advisable to take out letters of administration upon his estate.

Mr. Heber's representatives are sanguine of obtaining from £50,000, to £60,000 by the sale of his immense literary treasures.

Lord Francis Egerton has dropped the surname of Leveson Gower in compliance with the will of Scrope, late Duke of Bridgewater, and assumed that of Egerton only. His Lordship returns to England to take possession of the vast canal property bequeathed to him by

the late Duke of Bridgewater, and which is estimated to exceed £100,000 per annum.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.—It will no doubt be highly gratifying to our readers, to learn that there is every prospect that a Library will be established during the ensuing season, in the town of Chatham. Several public meetings have been held to discuss the feasibility of such an undertaking, and a committee has been appointed to obtain Shareholders; and if a sufficient sum be raised, to confer with the proprietors of the Miramichi Subscription Library, to effect a junction with that body, and from the liberal feeling evinced on their part, there is every reason to suppose that that desirable object will be effected. The terms of the library it is proposed, will be liberal, and be conducted on such a plan as will enable all classes of the community, as well as our friends in Gloucester and Kent, to participate in its benefits.—*Miramichi Gleaner*.

Last Saturday week, the Court House and Jail, of Kent, had a very narrow escape from fire; and had not the element been very fortunately subdued at the time it was, two lives would inevitably have been lost. The building is heated by a red hot furnace, which concentrates the heat to so great a degree, near the floor of the Jail, that the timber took fire; and as the occurrence happened in the night, and at the only entrance to the prison, had it not been providentially discovered by the accidental circumstance of one of the goalers children crying, which aroused his wife, the entire building would have been consumed, and the loss of human life the consequence. A man belonging to the house, who, although he was not a prisoner, slept in that part where prisoners are kept, being wanted to render assistance, was called by Mooney at the top of his voice across the flaming passage, but who could not be made to hear the uproar. This alarmed a sailor, (the only prisoner), who is confined preparatory for trial for murder, but who it is believed was unfortunately and not wilfully the cause of a seaman's death. When he looked through the hole in his door, and saw the flames bursting up, apparently shutting him in, and observing Mooney leave the entrance, he considered himself, in the language of Mr. Thurtell, as fairly booked, and with praise-worthy resignation concluded on sleeping it out in his hammock. Mrs. Mooney however most heroically rushed over the blazing floor, and released the poor man, who sprang from his bed and immediately ran to the well in a state almost of nudity, and rendered almost effectual aid in quenching the fire.—The building and furniture cost the county upwards of £1800, and is insured for only £1000.—*Id.*

Most gratifying will it be to the lovers of science, and to the Province in general, that a notice has been given by an honorable Member of our Assembly to bring in a Bill authorising our Excellency Sir John Colborne, to convey the thanks of our Legislature to Captain Ross of the Royal Navy, accompanied by a gift of £1000. Merit like that of Captain Ross, should invariably be rewarded, especially when earned under heavy personal loss, and with almost insuperable toil and hardships.—*York Patriot*.

AT A MEETING OF A NUMBER OF THE MERCHANTS AND OTHER INHABITANTS OF FREDERICTON, HELD ON THE 26TH DECEMBER, 1833.

To take into consideration the propriety of adopting measures, to obtain the establishment of a Bank in Fredericton, the following Resolutions were agreed to unanimously:—

Resolved, That this Meeting, being deeply sensible that the example and experience, of all enlightened commercial countries, fully demonstrate the great benefits derived from the introduction and prosecution of Banking, and from the establishment of Banks, based upon liberal principles, and having heard with much pleasure, that efforts are being made in the City of St. John, for the incorporation of another Provincial Bank, is of opinion, that the establishment of a Branch, of the proposed Bank in Fredericton, will tend greatly to relieve the Mercantile, Mechanical, Agricultural, and all other classes of the community, from many of the difficulties, under which they now labor.

Resolved, That as the committee appointed by a meeting held in St. John, to adopt the necessary measures to attain the required institution, have intimated a perfect willingness, and wish, that the counties of York, Sunbury, and Carleton, with all others trading with Fredericton should participate in the advantages to be derived from the proposed Bank, it is the opinion of this Meeting, that measures should be immediately taken, to co-operate with the committee in St. John, for the attainment of the object they have in view.

Resolved, That a Petition be prepared for the signatures of this community, to be presented to the Legislature praying the enactment of a Law incorporating THE COMMERCIAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK, and containing a clause, or clauses, rendering it obligatory on the Directors, to establish a Branch in Fredericton, and to enforce the commencement of business therein, at the same time, and in all respects similar, to the operations of the principal establishment in St. John.

Resolved, That this meeting, being fully convinced, that the introduction of the Scotch System of Banking, will greatly enhance the benefits which the Province will derive from a new Bank, and of the innumerable advantages to the Agricultural Counties in particular, and noting that the Report of the St. John Committee, avows an intention of introducing that system, is of opinion, that the Petition should pray the Legislature to insert a clause in the proposed Bank Bill, requiring the Directors to introduce it as far as practicable.

Resolved, That the following Gentlemen be a committee, to adopt the necessary measures to carry into effect the objects embodied in the preceding Resolutions:—viz.

Mark Needham, Thomas T. Smith, Joseph Gaynor, Thomas R. Robertson, Thomas Pickard, Thomas C. Everett, F. E. Beckwith, Robert Chesnut, Asa Coy, Oliver Smith, Charles Fisher, Benj. Wolhaupter.

The following is a Copy of the Petition prepared under the direction of the Committee, and which is now receiving the signatures of this community.

To His Excellency Major General Sir ARTHUR CAMPBELL, Baronet, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. The Honourable His Majesty's COUNCIL, and the Honourable the HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY for the same Province, in General Assembly convened.

The Petition of the undersigned Inhabitants of Fredericton and the adjacent Country

Humbly Sheweth—That your Petitioners view with much satisfaction the efforts making in the City of St. John, to establish another Provincial Bank; but they are convinced the evils complained of by the Merchants of the City will continue to exist in the interior, unless measures are adopted to ensure a more general participation in the benefits of the contemplated establishment.

That the embarrassments complained of are common to all parts of the country, and to all classes of the community, as well Agricultural as Mercantile: That the recent depreciation of every description of real estate, is mainly to be attributed to the insufficient supply of a circulating medium.

That your Petitioners are decidedly of opinion the incorporation of another Provincial Bank, upon such principles as will make the sphere of its operation co-equal with its name, and render its benefits general, will greatly remedy the evils which now press so heavily upon all, inasmuch as the additional capital which individual exertion, and infuse new vigor in all classes of society, and into every department of domestic enterprise.

That your Petitioners would most respectfully draw the attention of Your Excellency and of Your Honours to the system so successfully practiced in Scotland, of keeping cash accounts, and the payment of a reasonable interest upon deposits, as eminently adapted to the situation and requirements of this Province, a system which, wherever it has been introduced, has been productive of incalculable good.

That, when your Petitioners most explicitly state, that in coming before Your Honours, they are actuated by no feelings of hostility towards the Bank of New Brunswick in its corporate capacity, or towards the individuals who compose its Directory, they honestly avow their full belief that the increase of the Capital Stock of the present establishment will be productive of serious evil, inasmuch as the intimate connexion existing between the trade of this part of the country and of St. John, the great entrepot of the interior, must render our participation in any of its embarrassments unavoidable.

That your Petitioners are not aware that they are guilty of any crime, moral or political, that should deprive them of rights or privileges now enjoyed by other of their fellow subjects, and they only crave to be placed upon an equal footing with them.

Your Petitioners therefore pray your Excellency and your Honours to take the premises into consideration and pass an Act incorporating The Commercial Bank of New Brunswick, and which will likewise contain a clause or clauses rendering it obligatory on the Directors to establish a Branch in Fredericton, to commence operations at the same time and upon the same principles as the principal Institution in Saint John, and also to introduce the Scotch system as far as may be found consistent with the general interest of the country and the safety of the establishment.

And your Petitioners further pray your Excellency and your Honours that you will not give your assent to any Act to increase the Capital stock of the Bank of New Brunswick, nor make any alteration in its charter during this session of the Legislature, in order that both Banks may be placed upon an equal footing, and enabled to come before the public under similar circumstances.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.
