I must again advert to the departure from ordinary forms into the present occasion. I am far from being disposed to establish it as a precedent; but on the contrary, I desire it may be understood only as the consequence of the extraordinary state into which the affairs of the Province have been thrown by recent events. I will now conclude by assuring you that I shall have much satisfaction in complying with your desire, by transmitting your Address to the King to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, for the purpose of being laid at the foot of the Throne.

KING'S COLLEGE.

FREDERICTON, June 18, 1834.

Since the above was in type, and just as we were going to Press, we received, from the Treasurer, a further List of Warrants, from No. 176 to 233, inclusive, which are now in course of payment at the Treasury. This List, and also a list of Pedlars who have received License to travel in this Province will be published next week.

The defeat of Mr. O'Connell's motion for a Recess of the Union was most signal, only 38 votes being obtained out of a House of upwards of 500 members. This remarkable decision must, we think, put the question at rest—at all events it will not soon be broached again in the British Parliament. One of the best speeches in opposition to the motion was that of Emerson Tennant, Member for Belfast, a sketch of which we must endeavour to find room for hereafter—he probably speaks the sentiments of a large portion of the people in the north of Ireland. The King's reply to the address moved by Mr. Spring Rice had been received by the House of Lords—it is as follows:—

"It is with great satisfaction I receive your Address, stating your determination to maintain inviolate the Legislative Union of the two countries, which, I perfectly agree with you, is essential to the safety, peace, and integrity of the British Empire. I shall use the powers that are by law intrusted to me to put down and repress all attempts, by whomsoever made, to sever my dominions. I look back with satisfaction to the salutary laws which have for a series of years been passed to remedy the grievances which affected my Irish subjects, and have resolved to continue to remove, from time to time, all just causes of complaint."

The affairs of the Peninsula begin to wear a new aspect. A treaty, it is at length announced, has been formed between England, France, Spain, and Don Pedro's government in Portugal, the object of which is to assist in the expulsion of Don Carlos from Spain, and Miguel from Portugal. Great Britain, it seems, will supply any naval force that may be requisite, and it is reported that ships of war, with arms and ammunition, have already left the British shores for those of Spain. The following is put forth as the substance of this treaty. We do not vouch for its authenticity, though we do not observe that its accuracy has been denied, or its existence doubted:—

1st. Don Pedro binds himself to expel Don Carlos from Portugal, and to publish an amnesty in favor of such as may within a limited time, desert the cause of Don Miguel.
2d. The Queen Regent of Spain binds herself to send an army into Portugal to assist in putting Donna Maria upon the throne.
3d. His Britannic Majesty binds himself to send such a fleet as may be deemed necessary to co-operate with the land forces of his allies.
The King of the French binds himself to contribute to the objects of the league such aid, as the other three contracting parties may jointly demand.

Now if this treaty be authentic, and we

are assured that it was signed in London on the 22d of April, there is an end to all non-intervention; and although we think the act unjustifiable and impolitic, we would prefer a case of actual war to the shabby and covert proceedings hitherto adopted. To say that England has heretofore stood neuter in the quarrel would be to utter a common absurdity, for it is notorious that Pedro has derived all his resources from other countries—but more particularly England—the nation which he came to deliver and regenerate, refusing to give him the most trifling succour. Portugal, then, will be subjugated by a band of foreigners, in opposition to the will of four-fifths of the inhabitants. This is liberty with a vengeance, and yet Pedro's is called the "Liberating Army." What a mockery. The Marquess of Londonderry has brought the subject of this treaty before the House of Lords, and the 5th of May was fixed for the discussion; the next packet will give us the result.

But in the midst of this business, and while the public mind is agitated and divided on the question of peace or war, intelligence arrives from Lisbon that Donna Maria's government has withdrawn from England all the commercial advantages enjoyed from time immemorial. It is known that in consequence of a promised protection to Portugal from foreign invaders, British commerce enjoys unusual privileges in that country; it is these privileges, we understand, that are now withdrawn.—N. Y. Albion.

ENGLAND'S COLONIAL COMMERCE.—Our colonial commerce is capable of rendering us independent of the whole world—of giving profitable employment to our half starved population; thus renovating the social fabric at its base, and making England more secure in her dominion over the ocean—more powerful for the protection of the oppressed—more wealthy for the relief of the poor—more thoroughly efficient for the disseminating the boundless blessings of religion. Babylon, Nineveh, and Rome fell from their high estate leaving no traces of their past glory but in the name;—their empire was territorial—their Government that of the few—their knowledge unaided by the press, their precepts unguided by the gospel; not thus it is with the British Empire—her dominion is maritime—her government that of the many—her people's voice heard in every corner of the earth, through the press—and her endeavours for the spread of the gospel everywhere crowned with propitious prospects. Have we, then, cause to think the British empire has passed its meridian, and now hastens towards the twilight of existence? No! unless freedom—unless knowledge—unless Christianity be the stepping stones to annihilation. On our empire the sable curtain of night is never complete, for while the bright luminary of the heavens is temporarily unillumined the skies of Albion, it is but to shed light and life on another section of our wonderful social frame. May this astronomical phenomenon be typically that of our national history—may the sun of Britain's glory never set in obscurity until the great globe itself shall have passed away—and may our maritime dominions (under the auspices of Him alone, to whom power and dominions belong) become more and more consolidated, forming unto Christianity, that prophesied kingdom, whose branches will extend over the habitable earth for the exaltation and happiness of man.—Martin's His. of Brit. Colonies.

THE ELECTION.—Yesterday a Poll was opened at the County Court House, for the election of a Member to represent this County in General Assembly, in the room of William Taylor, Esquire. John A. Beckwith, Esq. proposed Lemuel A. Wilmot, Esq. who was without opposition declared duly elected. This is, we believe, the first time that an election has terminated without a contest, in the County of York. Mr. Wilmot addressed the multitude twice with considerable eloquence and effect. Time forbids any further notice at present; we have only to add our cordial acquiescence in the choice which the Electors of this County have made, and our ardent hope that Mr. Wilmot may prove himself fully worthy of that exalted honor which has been conferred upon him.—Watchman.
