Whereas the collection of His Majesty's Quit Rents in this Province will produce a large sum of money, and bear heavily on many Proprietors of Land, His Majesty has proposed to surrender or to transfer them to the Legislature of the Province, for a permanent grant of the annual sum of £2,000.

Resolved therefore, That it be recommended to the House, that, for the purpose of settling a claim so long pending, they do, by Bill, to be for that purpose prepared, grant unto His Majesty, the said annual sum for the surrender or transfer of His Majesty's Quit Rents.

Resolved, That it be recommended to the House, that a Committee be appointed to prepare a Bill to carry the above Resolution into effect, and that the said Committee insert a clause therein, by which the said sum shall be specifically applicable towards the payment of the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being.

We feel convinced, that this decision will be hailed with much satisfaction by the People of the Province generally. The claim was a just one, and had it not been acceded to by the Assembly, the enforcement of it would have occasioned much distress and expensive litigation in every County and District in Nova Scotia.—Nova Scotia Royal Gazette, Dec. 17.

DIED.

On Thursday, the 11th inst. CATHERINE LEONARD, infant daughter of John Dow, Esquire, of Margerville. There is something in the manner of this child's death very distressing. On the preceding Saturday she and her little sister, after playfully washing their faces in the snow, ran into the house to warm themselves. Their mother was in the room adjoining to them—their father at the outer door. Almost instantly the clothes of the deceased child caught fire. Her sister, in her endeavors to put them out, caught fire also; but ran screaming to her mother who promptly saved her. But before the mother could reach little Catherine, and extinguish the flames, which she did at the risk of her own life, the poor little sufferer was so seriously injured, that, though medical assistance was speedily obtained, no hopes of her surviving could be given.

She was a remarkably interesting child, and manifested a capacity seldom seen in children of her years. But the opening bud was snatched from earth to bloom in heaven, before it had unfolded half its loveliness. We can but sympathize with the afflicted parents—their feelings of grief and loss can only be imagined.
