

"That the commission lately issued appears to us fraught with the greatest mischief, as widening the distinction between Protestants and Roman Catholics, and as preparatory to the extinguishing of the Protestant ministry in those parishes where the latter predominate, in proportions to be fixed at the dictation, perhaps of the bitterest foes of our religious institutions."

"That in his Majesty's memorable declaration, in reply to the address of the bishops, we recognize the assertion of those hereditary principles pertaining to his Majesty's illustrious house; and that an humble and dutiful address be presented to his Majesty, expressive of our gratitude for that declaration, and of our confident hope that he will continue to support and uphold the church and the Protestant religion."

"That a petition be prepared and presented to the hereditary branch of the legislature, expressive of our grateful sense of the constitutional exercise by that body of their unquestionable right in upholding, by their late votes, the Protestant establishment of the empire; and expressive of our unshaken confidence that they will continue to act with firmness and resolution; and that a petition be also presented to the House of Commons, praying them to reconsider the ground upon which they have hitherto adopted measures tending to the destruction of Protestantism in Ireland."

"That an appeal be made to the electors of England, claiming their assistance in the maintenance of the united kingdom, by taking such measures as shall insure the return to parliament of those persons only whose opinions are known to be favourable to that object, and that a committee be appointed to prepare such address."

The Board of Health in Saint John have announced that several cases have lately occurred in the City which have been pronounced by the Physicians to be cases of Asiatic Cholera. The Courier of Saturday last states, that the report of that morning was flattering and that hopes were entertained that all unnecessary alarm and excitement will now cease.

HEALTH OF THE TOWN.—Thank God, we can at last announce the almost entire disappearance of the Cholera, and the gradual revival of business. Though there have been a few deaths since our last, these have been so few that since Saturday, the Board of Health has discontinued their daily bulletins. The Cholera Cart stands idle—the horse that drew it eats his oats in peace—the Hospital is empty—and the few cases that occur in private practice have but little of that virulence and inveteracy which made the first attacks of the disease so terrible. Indeed we doubt if there is more of sickness and death in the town now, than is usual at this season. A young gentleman, who had been sent to Preston to administer to the blacks, among whom some cases of cholera had occurred, returned to town on Saturday, there being no further occasion for his services in that quarter. We are now anxious to hear from our sister Province of New Brunswick; as, from some letters received by Saturday's Mail, it would appear that there had been deaths at York Point, of a disease exhibiting the symptoms of cholera.

Extract from the Minutes of the Central Board of Health, 27th September, 1834: "Resolved, that from the improved state of the health of the Town—the small number of patients lately sent to Dalhousie Hospital, and the few cases now remaining, the board deem it unnecessary to continue their daily reports, and should no other cases occur, they hope to discontinue the Hospital establishment after Monday next."

"Resolved, also, that the Committee of Hospitals be requested to discharge as many Hospital attendants as can be spared."

Nona Scotlan. The Rifles returned to town yesterday in excellent health and spirits. The encampment at the back of the Citadel has been broken up, and the 83rd and 96th Regiments have again taken possession of their barracks.

It is with pleasure we learn by the following extracts, that the account given in the Journal of the 15th inst. relative to the loss of the ship Schelle and Passengers, was a fabrication.—*Holistic Journal.*

Piquet, Sept. 23.—A sailor boy has been circulating a report, viz. that he was steward of the ship Schelle, of Liverpool, Capt. Davidson bound for Quebec, with 350 passengers, from Cronmaty, which vessel he states to have been lost upon St. Paul's Island on 3d September, and that himself and five others of the crew, were all that escaped watery grave.

We have been making as diligent enquiries as possible respecting the truth of the Boy's tale, and the conclusion to which we have come is, that the story is a fabrication, with the view of extorting charity. The narrator is not consistent in his narrative, and particularly the date which he assigns to the shipwreck does not correspond with his appearance in this District.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

September 18, 1834.

At a Meeting of the Board of Health, held this day at the County Court House—

ORDERED, That it shall be the duty of all the Ferryman, connected with the Parish of Fredericton, to endeavour to ascertain from whence all Persons requiring to be conveyed across the River Saint John have come; and in no case shall the said Ferryman, or either of them, presume to convey into any part of the Parish of Fredericton any Person or Persons whom they or he may, on enquiry, ascertain or suspect to have come from Halifax, or any other place known to be infected with Cholera, under the penalty of FIVE POUNDS for each violation of this order.

And further Resolved, That it shall be the duty of all Keepers of Taverns, Boarding Houses, and other Houses of Entertainment, to make diligent enquiry as to the places from whence all Persons requiring accommodation at their respective Houses shall have come; and should it be ascertained that they have come from Halifax, Quebec, or any other place infected with Cholera, it shall be the duty of the said Keepers of Taverns, Boarding Houses, or other Houses of Entertainment, to give immediate information of the fact to the Chairman, or some other Member of the Board, under the penalty of TWENTY FIVE POUNDS for every neglect or disobedience of this order.
