

her for Middlesex, he (Lord H.) would be reminded that no question had been raised with respect to the right of rejecting a Member, but it was doubted whether or not it was just or politic to reject him. But at all events, having been rejected, the writs should issue. Before he sat down he had to express his regret that the affairs of Lower Canada had arrived at their present very unsatisfactory state—(hear, hear.) From the very first moment he had a seat in that House, his most anxious attention was always directed to the welfare of the Canadas. When, upon the other side of the House, he had, in conjunction with the late Mr. Huxford, opposed, and he was glad to say successfully opposed, the measure of Sir G. Murray with respect to the revenue of Lower Canada, by which it was proposed to establish a very moderate Civil List. In the subsequent Session, as Under Secretary, he had introduced a measure in which the government gave up all right to the disputed revenue, on the condition that the government and Judges should be provided for. He regretted that such a provision had not been made. He should observe that when he left the Colonial Office the aspect of affairs was rather threatening.

Mr. P. M. Stewart regretted that the hon. member for Bath should have so confounded Lower with Upper Canada, and from the state of one, have drawn inferences with respect to the other. He rejoiced that a Committee was to be appointed to inquire into the subject. The only objection which he would suggest to the statement of his right hon. friend except that for his own part he would not stop at anything short of the re-union of the colonies of Upper and Lower Canada; and in going into the Committee he should deceive the House if he did not explicitly state thus much.

Mr. Roebuck said that after what passed he would certainly consent to withdraw his motion. The hon. and learned gentleman in the course of a brief reply, observed that if any breach of promise had been committed, the odium rested with his Majesty's government, and not with the House of Assembly of Canada. A promise had been made that the Judges should be rendered independent of the Crown; but that promise had not been fulfilled. Nay, the Judges of Canada had made an attempt to suppress the use of the French language, and that attempt had only been frustrated by the loudly expressed opinion of the people. Unjust distinctions were kept up, and whilst this was the case it was impossible to suppose the people of Canada would not feel distrust of the Government.—Every evil had arisen from the attempt, which in this case, as in all others where the Government predominated, had been to establish that curse of a country—an Established Protestant Church, for a people amongst whom the majority were Roman Catholics and Dissenters.

The motion of the hon. and learned gentleman was then by permission of the House, withdrawn, and the amendment was put and carried.

Mr. Secretary Stanley, in handing the list of the Committee, to the Speaker, observed that he had included the names of the gentlemen who were Members of that House in 1823, and were Members of the previous Committee in that year.

Mr. Hume's name having been given, that hon. gentleman begged that his name might be withdrawn: not, as he observed, from any want of good wishes for the success of the exertions of the Committee, but because he was already on seven Committees.

The request of the honorable gentleman was then acceded to, and, on the motion of Mr. Secretary Stanley, the name of Mr. Robinson was substituted for that of Mr. Hume.

During the last hours of her brief existence on earth her sufferings were extremely painful, and but for the extraordinary confidence she had in "persevering prayer" they would have been almost insupportable—indeed it proved to be the most effectual medicine in the moments of her greatest agony; addressing herself to those around her bed, she would frequently exclaim "I am in great pain, but I should feel better if you would pray for me; do not pray that I may live longer in this world, but pray that God would take me to himself." On mention being made that her prayers would soon be lost in praise, she replied, yes, I am going to Jesus, but you must pray, on, and pray loud, otherwise I cannot hear you. When her speech and breathing became exceedingly difficult, the grace of God in her was triumphant!—while labouring and panting for breath she spoke of that world where all her sufferings would have an end, and of her Saviour whom she knew loved her, and was about, she believed, to take her to himself. Her patience and resignation are worthy of notice: She was completely delivered from the love of life and the dread of death—and we have seldom witnessed one that was more truly ready to be early transplanted into the paradise above.—The last words she uttered were "pray for me." It was a delightful death scene—so solemn and affecting, yet so full of comfort to the beholders. Like a rose "nipped by the winds untimely blast" ere it had disclosed its beauty, she has escaped the storms and vicissitudes of life, and now "Beneath a brighter sun and in a nobler soil "To flourish fair, and put forth all her bloom." May her early and happy death lead the young to "Remember their Creator in the days of their youth."
