We have been induced from the untoward appearance of political affairs in Lower Canada, during and since the late Elections, to lay before our readers an epitome of the views entertained by the CONSTITUTIONAL party, on the present posture of affairs in that Province. We need not detail our own opinion on the subject: such a state of things must eventually produce confusion and disorder, and the consequences to which they lead are painful to dwell upon. As we live under the happiest form of Government, and one which best secures the natural and civil rights of men, we esteem the happily blended Constitution of England, (in which the Colonies participate,) as a peculiar privilege; and would strenuously uphold and defend it—and our own connection with it—against all assailants, foreign or domestic. One thing is evident, says a Quebec writer, that a few more elections of this kind would lead to regular attempts to settle the matter by force of arms, and to overturn all lawful authority.

The New York Emigrant contains the President's Message to Congress. At present we can only transcribe the observations of the Editor on this highly important document:—

### THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

WAR WITH FRANCE.

By dint of exertion we are enabled to lay before our readers all the important parts of the document, which is on this occasion doubly important, on account of the state of the relations with France. Our readers, of course, know that the claims, amounting to some millions of the United States on the French nation, for spoils under the decrees of Bonaparte, have long been pending, and that about two years ago, the whole question was settled by treaty—France agreed to pay a stipulated sum. Upon the faith of this treaty, the United States drew for the first instalment; the Draft, to the surprise of every one, was dishonored by the French Government, on the ground that the Chambers had not voted the requisite appropriation—since which various pleas and put off have been made, until at last all patience is exhausted. Hostilities are now inevitable, unless the Chambers vote the necessary sum at their next session. France alone is to blame in the matter. Honest John Bull would have paid the money like a man.

We are sorry the North-eastern Boundary question remains yet unsettled.

The President, after discussing the Bank question, comes to the conclusion that no United States Bank is necessary for the wants of the country.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia has appointed to-morrow, the 18th inst. as a General Thanksgiving day to Almighty God, for his unmerited goodness in removing from the people of that Province, the dreadful scourge, with which he permitted it to be visited.

PIRATES.—The trial of the twelve men under charge of Piracy, sent out to the United States by the British Government, some time since, terminated at Boston on the 26th ult. when the Jury returned a verdict of Guilty, against seven, one of whom was the Captain of the Piratical vessel (Pedro Gilbert).

The sympathies of the jury was strongly moved on behalf of *Benardo de Soto*, on account of his generous, noble, and sacrificing conduct in saving the lives of more than seventy human beings, constituting the passengers and crew of the ship *Minerva*; and they desire that his case should be presented to the merciful consideration of the Government.

The trial occupied fifteen days. We make the following extract from Judge Story's charge to the Jury:—"There has been a great effort made to produce a very strong doubt in your minds of the correctness of the conduct of the British Government with respect to the captain and crew of the *Panda*. What are the facts? They had a right to retain the prisoners in England, and try them there for this very piracy—the tribunals of England had jurisdiction and perfect right, by the law of nations to proceed against them; but instead of so doing, the Lords of Admiralty had ordered them here, where the vessel, robbed is owned and the evidence of it at hand, and where their guilt or innocence can best be made manifest; and in not retaining jurisdiction for the offence, the Government can hardly receive too much thanks from every American citizen. We should open our hearts for the exercise of authority, which puts within our reach all the means of evidence to decide upon a cause so deeply affecting the interests of our own citizens."
