

...the rapidity of their increase, the abundance and apparent wealth of their population, the excellence of their roads, and the rapid advancement of the arts and all other marks of civilization—all the works of a few years, and all affected with advantages far inferior, to those possessed by your Petitioners, they are inclined to enquire into the cause of the superiority of their Republican neighbours, and the result of their investigation induces them to attribute it to the greater facilities they have of converting their property into a tangible medium, and the greater supply of that medium it procures: Your Petitioners, believing the establishment of a Bank in Fredericton, which for its centrality will be accessible to the inhabitants of the interior will remedy many of the evils which now press so heavily upon all classes of the community, inasmuch as it will call into action much capital that now lies dormant, for the want of some secure and profitable employment, and invigorate all the energies of the country:

Your Petitioners would draw the attention of your Excellency and your Honors to what is termed the Scotch System of Banking as eminently adapted to the situation of an Agricultural Country, and in a high degree calculated to meet the requirements of villages and settlements, removed at a distance from the locality of the Bank.

Your Petitioners therefore pray your Excellency and your Honors to take the premises into consideration, and pass an Act incorporating the Commercial Bank of New-Brunswick, and containing a clause or clauses, rendering it obligatory on the Directors to establish a Branch in Fredericton, to be supplied with a sufficient portion of capital to meet the wants of the populous districts in its vicinity, and to commence operation at the same time, and upon the same principles as the principle establishment in St. John, and which will likewise require the Directors to introduce the Scotch System as soon, and to as great an extent as may be found practicable.

And as your Petitioners are fully convinced any immediate increase of the Capital Stock of the Bank of New-Brunswick, will tend to defeat the objects they desire to attain, they therefore pray your Excellency and your Honors will pass no bill during this Session, authorising such increase, or in any way altering its charter, in order that both Banks may be placed upon an equal footing.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

THE EPISCOPAL CLERGY.—Our readers are already aware that it is the intention of His Majesty's Government no longer to contribute towards the support of the Established Church in these Colonies. A communication to that effect having been received from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, a meeting of the Parishioners and Pewholders of St. Paul's Church, Halifax, was held on Monday the 30th December, when Dr. Willis having stated that, as Archdeacon, he at present receives £300; and that his income, as Rector, derivable from various sources, is equal to £625, out of which he pays £100 a year to a Curate—leaving a net yearly income of £525; it was agreed—That upon a statement being made by the Rector, on the next and every subsequent Easter meeting, setting forth the amount received by him from the Parish, either as allowance for Pew-rent or fees, together with any sum he might receive from this Society at home; if it should appear that he did not obtain during the preceding year the sum of £500, as Rector, that sum would be made good by the Parish.

SCARCITY OF MONEY.—The Chamber of Trade in New-York agreed to a memorial to Congress on Saturday last, which prays for some mode of relieving the pecuniary embarrassments now existing among the merchants, which are thus spoken of in the New-York Daily Advertiser of Monday:—"Saturday was a day of unusual interest in the Money Market, owing in part, to the failure of two large and highly respectable houses. It is now admitted by all intelligent men, that the pressure is unusually severe. Great and calamitous falls in stocks; the fact that good notes are sold at one and a half per cent. a month; the difficulty in obtaining discounts, the impossibility of regulating distant Domestic Bills of Exchange or to sell Produce for cash; together with other causes, are demonstrations of a scarcity of money that comes home to the business and wants of every individual." Some kinds of Stock fell 7 per cent. On the same subject the Courier and Enquirer thus speaks:—"A failure for a very large amount took place in Wall-street on Saturday, and two of three others, of minor consequence, in other business parts of the city. The failure in Wall-street, we are informed, arose from the return with protest of a large amount of drafts on England, passed on the strength of a remittance of Ohio State six per cent. stock certificates, which could not be sold there. The Baltimore American gives the following account of the transaction:—"We learn that one of the last packets from Europe brought back a considerable amount of Ohio State six per cent. stock certificates, which had been sent out for sale from New-York, but which, it is said could not be negotiated in England in consequence of apprehended difficulties in the currency and moneyed operations of this country. The bills drawn on the strength of the negotiation of the certificates, were also returned protested."

JAMES LEE.

This wretched young man, who is a native of England, was yesterday found guilty of Highway Robbery, upon the clearest evidence.

It appeared by the statement of Thomas Trueman, the Prosecutor, that he and Lee worked for some time together in the employ of Mr. Dauphiney at St. Margaret's Bay—that, on the 11th December last, Mr. Dauphiney settled with them, and they both immediately afterwards started for Halifax—that just previous to leaving the Bay, Lee applied to Trueman for the loan of £4; that he lent him £3, and promised to let him have £1 more when they arrived

ed in town: that they travelled together, and, at 7 o'clock, in the evening, when they had nearly crossed the exercising ground, Lee placed his left hand upon the forehead and over the eyes of Trueman, and with his right drew a razor across his neck, which passed through his neck-handkerchief, some padding which was contained in it, his shirt, and cut his neck: that Trueman grasped at the razor, which he succeeded in wresting from him,—that he staggered for a moment, when Lee thrust his hand into one of his trousers' pockets—seized his pocket book, containing six thirty shilling Bank notes, and one twenty shilling Provincial Note, with which he instantly made off,—that Trueman proceeded into Town, and reported the occurrence to the Police Magistrates, who lost no time in sending the Constables, with the Prosecutor, in pursuit of him—that, at about ten o'clock, the same evening, they fortunately discovered him in the house of one Franklin, who keeps a Tavern in Barrack Street, and on his person found the pocket book and notes which had been stolen from Trueman. The evidence was so direct and conclusive, that the Jury pronounced him 'Guilty, without leaving their Box. The wretched man appeared fully sensible of the awful situation in which he was placed. Sentence, will not be passed upon him, we suppose, until the last day of the Term.—Hal. Royal Gazette.

The accounts received on Thursday morning last, by the Mail Boat from Bermuda, of the prevalence of Yellow Fever on board of some of the ships of the squadron on the West India Station, is truly distressing. Capt. Agar, of the Arctique, a Lieutenant and ten seamen of the Victor, and Mr. Crane, Purser of the Arctique, are reported to have fallen victims to it, and the Hon. Captain Prebost, of the North Star, dangerously ill.—15.

AT A MEETING OF A NUMBER OF THE MERCHANTS AND OTHER INHABITANTS OF FREDERICTON, HELD ON THE 26TH DECEMBER, 1833.

To take into consideration the propriety of adopting measures, to obtain the establishment of a Bank in Fredericton, the following Resolutions were agreed to unanimously:—

Resolved, That this Meeting, being deeply sensible that the example and experience, of all enlightened commercial countries, fully demonstrate the great benefits derived from the introduction and prosecution of Banking, and from the establishment of Banks, based upon liberal principles, and having heard with much pleasure, that efforts are being made in the City of St. John, for the incorporation of another Provincial Bank, of opinion, that the establishment of a Branch, of the proposed Bank in Fredericton, will tend greatly to relieve the Mercantile, Mechanical, Agricultural, and all other classes of the community, from many of the difficulties, under which they now labor.

Resolved, That as the Committee appointed by a meeting held in St. John, to adopt the necessary measures to attain the required institution, have intimated a perfect willingness, and wish, that the counties of York, Sunbury, and Carleton, with all others trading with Fredericton should participate in the advantages to be derived from the proposed Bank, it is the opinion of this Meeting, that measures should be immediately taken, to co-operate with the committee in St. John, for the attainment of the object they have in view.

Resolved, That a Petition be prepared for the signatures of this community, to be presented to the Legislature praying the enactment of a Law incorporating THE COMMERCIAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK, and containing a clause, or clauses, rendering it obligatory on the Directors, to establish a Branch in Fredericton, and to enforce the commencement of business therein, at the same time, and in all respects similar, to the operations of the principal establishment in St. John.

Resolved, That this meeting, being fully convinced, that the introduction of the Scotch System of Banking, will greatly enhance the benefits which the Province will derive from a new Bank, and be of innumerable advantage to the Agricultural Counties in particular, and noticing that the Report of the St. John Committee, avows an intention of introducing that system, is of opinion, that the Petition should pray the Legislature to insert a clause in the proposed Bank Bill, requiring the Directors to introduce it as far as practicable.

Resolved, That the following Gentlemen be a committee, to adopt the necessary measures to carry into effect the objects embodied in the preceding Resolutions:—viz.—
