

vinces me that we can cultivate grapes with greater facility than melons and with equal success."

We cannot now conveniently take notice of the fruits that were the subject of prizes, and we shall therefore conclude this paper with a few words upon wall training of fruit trees. The neglect of this is a capital defect in our gardens. It is well settled to be an excellent method in the management of fruit and almost indispensable in the culture of many sorts. Mr. Watts has deservedly the credit of introducing it here. The common, but wholesome, current was the first subject of this mode of cultivation, and we must express our astonishment that current bushes now "run riot" in our gardens, which could be trained to fences and walls without the least interference with any other garden operations: For experience has taught us that they will grow as thrif- tily, bear more fruitfully, and endure in this way longer than they can under the common mode of cultivation. We gathered a cup full of wall trained currants on the 23rd of October, in perfection then, notwithstanding the severe frosts in the early part of the month. In short, we look upon a current bush in the middle of a garden as a thing out of place, and a very striking blemish.

The "fan mode" of training is approved by some, the "horizontal" by others.

A book of high authority, says—"When the garden walls exceed seven feet in height, the fan mode is preferred by the best practical Gardeners, for in this way the tree can much sooner be made to fill the space of wall allotted to it, and the loss of a branch can most easily be supplied at any time. The fan mode is particularly well adapted for such kind of fruit trees as do not abound in superfluous wood, or extend their branches to a great length, as the peach, nectarine, apricot and cherry trees. For walls under seven feet in height, the horizontal method of training is still preferred, as in this way the wall can be more completely filled, although not in so short a space of time. In this mode, which was first strongly recommended by Hitt in his excellent Treatise on Fruit Trees, a principal stem is trained upright and branches are led from it horizontally on either side. Many kinds of pear trees and also apple trees are very productive when trained in this horizontal manner." The same author recom- mends the bending of the extreme branches downwards by which the growth of wood is checked, and that of fruit promoted. The bending of the branch or twig is recom- mended also from its conformity with the natural growth of trees and shrubs of every description.

We have exceeded already the limits we prescribed for ourselves, but shall resume our remarks on this subject as soon as we conveniently can.
