

The English Mail for October arrived here on Saturday last. The Packet in which it reached Halifax had 21 days passage, and brought London papers to the 7th ult., and Falmouth to the 10th, but they contain very little news of importance.

Henry Stephen Fox, Esq. has been appointed His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States of America.

The Dispatch, sloop of war, Commander Daniels, has arrived at Portsmouth in 14 days from Halifax.

On Tuesday at noon, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent and Princess Victoria, arrived at the Albion House Hotel, Ramsgate. At a quarter past 5 o'clock the Firefly, Steamer, arrived with the King and Queen of Belgium. The meeting of those distinguished individuals may be easily conceived. The Duke de Nemours joined the party in the evening.

On Wednesday Addresses from the inhabitants of Ramsgate were presented to their Royal Highnesses the Duchess of Kent and Princess Victoria, and to the King of the Belgians—in the Reply of the Duchess we notice the following expression: "My maternal feelings, and those I owe to the King and the Country, lead me to share with you in the hope you express relative to the Princess. It is the object of my life to render her deserving of the affectionate solicitude she so universally inspires, and to make her worthy of the attachment and respect of a free and loyal people."

The King said, in his answer to the Address: "I thank you also for the kind wishes which you express to me for the happiness of the nation whose destinies Providence has been pleased to confide to my care. We are near neighbours, though separated by the sea, and I can assure you that in that nation there exists a very warm and kindly feeling towards the British nation."

The Duke of Wellington and Earl of Roslyn paid their respects on Wednesday. The King of the Belgians came to Ramsgate yesterday, leaving the Queen at Ramsgate.

The Brussels paper gives the following account of King Leopold's visit to England: "It is well known that the Princess Victoria, as presumptive heiress of the Throne of Great Britain, cannot quit the three Kingdoms without the consent of Parliament. This is the reason that has induced the King of the Belgians to visit England. We know that he will be at Brussels again with the Queen on the 7th Oct."

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The Cadiz juntas have the southern provinces of Spain almost wholly at their command, and they act in perfect independence of the government of Madrid. Everything seems to portend that the administration of M. Medizabal will not last very long.

October 7. The public suspense in London and Paris, respecting the Spanish Ministry is terminated in a manner the most gratifying, by the arrival of letters direct from Madrid, of the evening of the 28th ult. announcing from authority the formation of the new ministry, which was to appear in the Gazette the next morning.

CITY, Twelve o'clock.—The pressure of money in the Stock Exchange continues unabated, which tends very much to prevent any immediate rise in the Government Securities.

Consols for the account have varied 1-4 per cent, in the course of the morning; they are now quoted at 90 1/2 buyers."

With respect to the alleged general satisfaction of the army the *Journal de Paris* publishes an article, purporting to be a contradiction of the rumour, but which is nevertheless an admission that secret societies existed in two regiments at least.—*French paper.*

NEW-BRUNSWICK MARBLE.—We have had an opportunity of examining different specimens of beautiful white Marble, brought from an extensive and valuable quarry lately discovered at Musquash, and owned by the Messrs. Woodward. We understand it is the intention of these enterprising Merchants to have the quarry opened on an extensive scale, which will at once give many of our citizens an opportunity, and at a cheap rate, of beautifying their dwellings with this rich and chaste building material; while at the same time it will prove a valuable article for export, either to the home market as ballast, or to the United States. As all our vessels require a large amount of ballast, we are of opinion that each might make a profitable business by carrying it in place of the present unproductive systems. The marble has been pronounced by competent judges to be equal to some of the Italian white marble, which generally sells at New York at ten dollars a cubic foot; so much for the value of the article in the United States. One of the specimens which we examined, contains a serpentine blended with it, which gives it a beautiful appearance, and forms a valuable compound for ornamental purposes, and is generally known by the name of *Verd Antique*.—We most sincerely trust that the quarry may realize the fondest hopes of the Proprietors, for every man who is instrumental in developing the resources of our highly favoured Province is justly entitled to the best wishes and thanks of the community at large; for all have an interest in whatever tends to promote the general prosperity of the country.—*Gazette.*

It is with much satisfaction that we are enabled to acquaint our Readers of an exploring party having started yesterday morning, on the route of our intended Rail Road. They will proceed through the Country between the Pallrey Lands and then at the Oromocto, and Shogomock, coming out in the vicinity of Eel River, at Woodstock. They expect being joined by a Surveyor to be appointed by His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell, then they will proceed towards Mar's Hill, and continue their course until they reach the Sources of the St. John and Chaudiere, and probably will not terminate their explorations until reaching the City of Quebec.—*Standard.*

TIMBER DUTIES.—It will be seen by a notice in our advertising columns, that a Public Meeting will be held at the Masonic Hall in this City on Monday next, for the purpose of considering the propriety of petitioning the Imperial Parliament against the alteration in the Timber Duties, as recommended by a Committee of the House of Commons. The question is all-important to this Province and Canada; and we trust that the example now set will be generally followed throughout the Colonies—as there is little doubt but the united remonstrances of so many British subjects would have a powerful influence in the decision that may be come to in the Councils of the Nation.—*St. John Courier.*

SMALL POX.—We regret to learn that three cases of small pox occurred among the crew of the ship *Wakefield*, since leaving Liverpool. One of the seamen died of the disease—the other two have recovered. The ship was ordered to quarantine by the Visiting Physician.—*Ibid.*
