Our latest European dates are to the 13th April, and furnish us with the intelligence of the resignation of Sir R. Peel and the Duke of Wellington. Who will succeed them is not yet known. Some of the London prints state, that great exertions are in progress out of doors, to prevent the retirement of Sir R. Peel from office, by addresses both to the King and Ministers, deprecating the position in which the Church of Ireland is placed by the late resolution in the House of Commons, and setting forth the importance of having such men as his Majesty's present ministers at the head of affairs.

The decision of the House of Commons which led to the determination of His Majesty's Ministers to resign their offices, will be found in our columns.

The annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Preachers belonging to the New Brunswick district commences in this Town to-morrow, during which there will be preaching every evening at 8 o'clock in the Chapel. The unexampled success with which Providence has blessed the operations of this Society during the past year both at home and abroad, particularly in the Islands of the South, demands the gratitude of every lover of the human family, and will no doubt be ligisted to with a corresponding degree of sympathy and benevolence. An opportunity like the present seldom presents itself amongst us, and therefore we hope that many will avail themselves of so interesting an occurrence to manifest their liberality in promoting the moral and spiritual good of mankind.

From the Boston Palladium, May 8.

By the Poland, at New York, from Havre, the New York Editors have papers to April 10, and London dates to the 9th inclusive. The packet ship Albany, having on board the late French Minister to the United States, M. Surruirer and family, arrived at Havre on the 9th of April, and the U. S. frigate Constitution, Com. Elliot, arrived at Havre on the afternoon of the same day. Com. E. landed immediately and travelled post to Paris, to receive the order of Mr. Livingstone. A Havre paper of the 10th, says the Constitution had been "employed, as is well known, for the purpose of carrying the American Ambassador back to New York in the now improbable event that the vote of twenty-five millions will be rejected by the Chambers." The coincidence of the simultaneous arrivals of the Constitution & Albany, the one taking home the recalled French Minister, and the other to carry back the American, while at the same moment the French Chambers were discussing the very question in regard to which this mutual recall of ambassadors had taken place, is rather remarkable.

We have conversed with a Gentleman, Passenger in the Molly Moir, who informed us that he saw, just previous to his leaving Waterford, a London Paper, which stated, that on the 7th April the Chamber of Deputies rejected the American Claims altogether. We have little doubt of the authenticity of this intelligence—we did consider the resolution passed by Congress, a few days before the close of the session—"That it was inconsistent with the rights and honor of the United States further to negotiate in relation to the Convention of July 4, 1831, and that its execution should be insisted on as ratified"—as calculated to give offence to France, and we feel satisfied that such was its effect upon the Chamber of Deputies—several of the London Papers view the resolution in the same light.—*Hall's Royal Gazette.*

THE CANADA QUESTION.—Friday night's Gazette contains the appointment of Lord

Amherst as the Captain General of Upper and Lower Canada, and High Commissioner for the redress of Grievances in Lower Canada; and Thomas Elliot, Esq., is appointed his lordship's secretary. Lord and Lady Holmesdale will, it is understood, reside at Lord Amherst's seat Montreal, near Sevenoaks, during the noble earl's expected absence as his Majesty's commissioner in Canada. We believe it was not the intention of Viscount Canterbury to have claimed either salary or outfit for the performance of the duties which would have devolved upon his lordship, he being entitled to his pension as Speaker. Lord Amherst will receive the lucrative emolument of Captain General of the provinces. His lordship is or was one of his Majesty's lords in waiting, and filled the high appointment of Governor General of India during the Bhurtpore war. It was for his distinguished services in the east that his lordship was created an earl. His lordship succeeds Lord Aylmer as Governor General of the Canadas.
