

and I need not attempt to impress upon your minds, in the renewal of this important Law, the benefits to be derived by the Country from a better mode of applying that Labour, particularly in the Towns, where local circumstances and the condition of the Inhabitants point out the necessity of a different system.

I shall take an early opportunity of communicating to you, by Message, some measures of importance, which I am commanded by His Majesty's Government to lay before you.

The Provincial Legislature of Lower Canada, which was summoned to meet for the despatch of business on the 27th instant, is further prorogued until the 21st February next.

KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON.

Five years have elapsed since this institution was organized under His Majesty's Charter, and put into effective operation. During that period, it has received by matriculation thirty-one Undergraduate Students, and admitted by incorporation five Graduates who had previously belonged to another University. Within the same period it has conferred sixteen Degrees; two of Doctor in Divinity, two of Doctor and one of Bachelor in Civil Law, and eleven of Bachelor of Arts. It now reckons among its members, exclusive of the College Council and Professors, two Doctors in Divinity, a Doctor and a Bachelor in Civil Law, two Masters and thirteen Bachelors of Arts, one examined Student, and eleven Undergraduates who are keeping Term for their Degree.

The entire Academic body consists of forty-one actual members. The numbers must of course appear but small, compared with those of similar institutions in older and more populous communities; they are however, when all the circumstances are taken into view, by no means inconsiderable, and perhaps exceed the expectations which could have been reasonably entertained. By lowering the standard from the character of a University to that of a School, the College might certainly have filled its walls; but in that case it would merely have superseded the proper business of the Grammar Schools, and the want would have still remained which this institution was created to supply:—the Province would have contained no appropriate place of education for its youth, from their departure from school to their entrance on the active engagements of life.

The course of instruction combines, as far as circumstances admit, the systems pursued at Oxford and Cambridge, with a partial introduction of the method adopted in the Scotch Universities. The Hebdomadary, or weekly regulation, of the Term which has just now commenced stands as follows:

It is very much to be wished that the Masters of the Grammar Schools throughout the Province would pay particular attention to the course pursued in the College, and make the instruction of their higher classes as well in Mathematics as in Classics, especially preparatory to it. Without such specific preparation indeed, however worthy of approval the general system of the schools, the youthful mind cannot be expected adequately to avail itself of the advantages which the College presents. Nor, it ought to be suggested for the consideration of parents not less than instructors, are the best endeavours of the Professors likely to be productive of their desired effect, unless their pupils shall have been imbued with that love of knowledge, and trained to those habits of diligent enquiry and steady application, which, with just principles of religion and morals, are capable of prevailing over natural indolence, and inclination to unprofitable pleasures and pursuits.

On Sunday the 11th inst. were delivered in the Wesleyan Chapel in this town, in behalf of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, by the Rev. Messrs. Williams, Shepherd, and Strong. On Monday evening following the Annual Meeting of the Fredericton Branch of this institution was held in the same place. Mr.

R. Chestnut in the chair. The congregations were large and attentive at all the services, and the collections were £18.—*Watchman.*

The Annual Sermon in aid of the Funds of the Fredericton Bible Association was preached in the Methodist Chapel on Thursday evening last, by the Rev. Mr. Williams of Miramichi, who ably advocated the claims of this Institution. The collection was about £5.—*Id.*

LOSSIEMOUTH.—Although Morayshire has happily not hitherto been visited with the dreadful malady called Cholera, other diseases have unfortunately been prevalent in it during the present year, particularly in this place, where both typhus and scarlet fever have raged, and in some cases proved fatal. Every precaution and medical skill have been adopted, and happily the fevers have now disappeared. Among the medical gentlemen, Mr. David D. Manson, Surgeon, during his residence with his uncle, the Rev. Dr. Rose of Drainie, has been most unremitting and successful in his attention and treatment of the patients; and as a mark of their respect and gratitude, the inhabitants of this place have voluntarily subscribed for and presented to Mr. Manson a very handsome Silver Snuff Box, with an appropriate inscription.—*Elgin Courier.*

From the Saint John Courier.
The Barque Liverpool, which arrived this morning, sailed from Liverpool on the 12th ult. and brought papers of the 11th, with which we have been favored. The following are the only paragraphs worth extracting:

Sir Howard Douglas.—The requisition which has been in course of signature for some days past, calling on the gallant baronet to become a candidate for the representation of this borough, was on Tuesday closed, when it was found to have been signed by upwards of 3,300 individuals, a greater number of names, we believe, than has ever been before attached to a similar document.—*Gore's Advertiser, Dec. 11.*

Arrival of Sir Robert Peel.—Sir Robert Peel arrived this morning at 8 o'clock, and at eleven was visited by the Duke of Wellington. Shortly afterwards, the right hon. baronet went to St. James's to pay his respects to His Majesty, and we are confident, at the hour at which we write, that Sir R. Peel has accepted the office of Prime Minister. A King's messenger, we learn, has been ordered to be in readiness to proceed to Knowsley, the seat of Lord Stanley, this evening. Except the confident belief, that the right hon. baronet has accepted office, it would be premature to speculate on the progress which may have been made in the formation of an administration.—*London Standard, Dec. 9.*

A private Letter from England, received by the Packet, mentions that Vice Admiral Sir George Cockburn has been recalled, and appointed to a seat at the Admiralty Board.—*Hal. Royal Gaz.*

The Packet has been further detained until Saturday evening next, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to await the arrival of the Mail Boat from Boston, which is now due. Lady and Miss Campbell, and two younger children of His Excellency and her Ladyship, proceed to England to-morrow, in the Briseis.—The health of Miss Campbell, we regret to state, being such as to render her removal to a milder climate necessary.—The Honorable S. Cunard also takes passage in the Packet.—*Id.*

LAMENTABLE SUICIDE.—A young gentleman, named Nicholson, educated at one of the English Universities, highly connected in that country, and having many respectable connexions in this city, drowned himself yesterday morning in the North River between Hoboken and Courtland-street. He had been disappointed of his usual remittances from England, and was involved in debt to a considerable extent for board and pecuniary accommodations from friends; and being a young man of a high sense of honor and very excitable temperament, had often declared that he could not survive the disparagement into which the negligence of his friends at home had thrown him with his generous acquaintance here.—He purchased a phial of the sulphate of morphine in Canal-street, went with some friends on an excursion in a sailboat to Hoboken, drank a large quantity of brandy and water there, and on stepping on board the boat on his return, he was observed to swallow the contents of the phial. Within three or four minutes he suddenly sprang up, uttered the words "happy nonentity,"

and plunged headforemost into the river. He was observed to rise once about 200 yards below the boat, and was then seen no more. Mr. Nicholson was a young gentleman of bright literary attainments, and has left in the possession of a friend manuscripts evincing great labor and genius. He had spent a handsome fortune, but his revisionary interests were extensive.—*N. Y. Enq.*
