LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Tuesday, 16th June, 1835.

This day the Legislative Council
presented the following Address to His
Excellency the Lieutenant Governor,
in answer to His Excellency's Speech
at the opening of the present Session of
the Legislature:—

"To His Excellency Major General Sir
Archibald Campbell, Baronet, Knight
Grand Cross of the Most Honorable
Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant
Governor and Commander in Chief of
the Province of New Brunswick, &c.
&c. &c.

"The humble Address of the Legislative Coun-
cil in General Assembly.

"May it please Your Excellency—

"Deeply participating in your Excel-
lency's regret for the loss of the Appro-
priations of the last Session of the Gen-
eral Assembly, We gratefully acknow-
ledge your regard for the well-being of
the Province, evinced by the prompt
manner in which you have responded to
the urgent requests, addressed to your
Excellency from the different parts of
the Country, soliciting you to re-assem-
ble the Legislature at an early period,
by which judicious measure, We trust a
remedy will be afforded for the difficul-

ties and embarrassments under which
the various branches of the public ser-
vice would otherwise labour; and the
evils anticipated as likely to press with
peculiar hardship on the poor classes,
by the withholding of the expenditure
of the public monies, will be avoided.

"Anxious as We are to confine
our attention to the object which induc-
ed your Excellency to call us together
at this unusual season, We trust no ob-
stacle will occur to retard us in the im-
mediate despatch of the business before
us.

"It will be our constant endeavour
to cultivate that spirit of moderation and
wisdom so earnestly recommended by
your Excellency, and We hope that our
deliberations will be attended with the
happy result of promoting the welfare
of the people, and the best interests of
the Province."

To which His Excellency was pleas-
ed to make the following REPLY:—

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen
of the Legislative Council,

"The sentiments expressed in this
Address are most acceptable to me, and
I thank you for the assurance it contains
of your ready co-operation in the attain-
ment of the important object for which
I deemed it necessary to re-assemble
the Legislature."

ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Wednesday, June 17.

"To His Excellency Major General Sir
Archibald Campbell, Baronet, G. C. B.
Lieutenant Governor and Commander
in Chief of His Majesty's Province of
New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

"The humble Address of the House of
Assembly.

"May it please Your Excellency—

"We the Representatives of His Ma-
jesty's loyal subjects, the People of
New Brunswick, thank Your Excellen-
cy for the Speech you have been pleased
to make at the opening of this Session.

"We participate in the regret ex-
pressed by Your Excellency for the loss
of the Appropriations, and We are gra-
tified in having, through the judicious
exercise of Your Excellency's prerogative,
an opportunity afforded us of doing
every thing in our power to remedy the
inconvenience and distress likely to arise
for the want of the necessary expendi-
tures throughout the Country.

"In making such Grants as the ser-
vice of the Province requires, We shall
be guided by our usual liberality and
zeal for the public good, and We agree
with Your Excellency in the expediency,
at this inconvenient season, of confining
our deliberations chiefly to those objects
for which we are specially called to-
gether.

"Influenced by no other considera-
tions than an anxious desire to promote
the welfare of our Constituents and to
advance the general prosperity of the
Province, We feel that We shall best
consult those important interests, by
keeping constantly in view that spirit
of moderation in our proceedings, which
cannot fail to afford us solid and lasting
satisfaction."

REPLY.

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House
of Assembly,

"I receive with peculiar satisfaction
this Loyal Address from you, the Re-
presentatives of His Majesty's Faithful
and Loyal Subjects the people of New
Brunswick, as it affords me the gratify-
ing prospect that this Session may not
close without your relieving your Con-
stituents from the alarming state of an-
xiety, so strongly and feelingly expres-
sed in their Petitions on the want of the
usual Appropriations."

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, June 16.

COMMITTEE OF SUPPLY.

The House resolved itself into Com-
mittee of the whole, in consideration of
Supplies to be granted for the Public
Service.

Mr. Hayward in the chair of the Com-
mittee. Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.
The Chairman reported, that the
Committee having the business referred
to them under consideration, in the Com-
mittee the following Resolution was
moved:—

Resolved, in the opinion of this Com-
mittee, that the Resolutions of Appro-
priation which passed the House by Bill
at the last Session of the Legislature,
should be adopted without alteration;
and that no further matter be considered
by this Committee, except making the
usual provision for the expenses and
travelling charges of the Speaker and
Members of this House serving in Gen-
eral Assembly, and also the annual
allowance of the Clerks of the Legisla-
tive Council and this House.

To which the following amendment
was moved, to insert after the words the
Legislature "with the exception of the
grant to the Trustees of the Savings'
Bank of Saint John."

And upon the question for adopting
the amendment, the Committee divided
as follows:—

YEAS:—Messrs. Palmer, Hanington,
Street, Burns, Connell, Miles, Gilbert,
Taylor, L. A. Wilmot, Brown, Clinch,
Hill, Morehouse, Rankin, and Freeze.

NAYS:—Mr. Speaker, Messrs. Wood-
ward, Chandler, End, Partelow, Robin-
son, J. M. Wilmot, Slason, M'Leod,
Wyer, and Ford.

And it was carried in the affirmative.

The question was then taken upon the
Resolution as amended—when it was
likewise carried in the affirmative.

Wednesday, June 17.

Resolved, That there be granted to
the Clerk of the Legislative Council in
General Assembly, the sum of one hun-
dred and fifty pounds for his services the
last Session.

Upon the question for sustaining the
Resolution, the Committee divided as
follows:—

L. A. Wilmot, Brown, Woodward, Gil-
bert, Miles, Connell, Burns, Morehouse,
Partelow, J. M. Wilmot, Palmer, and

And it was carried in the affirmative.

To the Clerk Assistant of the Legisla-
tive Council, the sum of twenty shil-
lings per diem, for his services during
the last Session.

To the Clerk of the House of As-
sembly, the sum of two hundred pounds
for his services during the last Session.

To the Clerk Assistant of the House
of Assembly, the sum of — pounds
for his services during the last Session.

Upon the question that the blank be
filled up with the sum of twenty shillings
per diem, the Committee divided:—
YEAS, 12; NAYS, 13. And it was de-
cided in the negative.

The question was then taken for fill-
ing up the blank with one hundred
pounds, and it was carried in the affir-
mative.

To the Speaker of the House of As-
sembly, the sum of one hundred pounds
for the last Session, and to each and
every Member of the House of Assem-
bly for defraying the expenses of at-
tendance in General Assembly the last
Session, the sum of fifteen shillings
per day, not however to exceed thirty
pounds to each Member for such attend-
ance; and for the travelling charges of
each and every Member the last Ses-
sion, the sum of fifteen shillings per day,
allowing twenty miles for each day's
travel, to be certified by the Speaker.

To the Speaker of the House of As-
sembly, the sum of twenty-five pounds
for the present Session, and to each and
every Member of the House of Assem-
bly for defraying the expenses of at-
tendance in General Assembly the pre-
sent Session, the sum of fifteen shillings
per day, not however to exceed forty
pounds for such attendance; and for the
travelling charges of each and every
Member the present Session the sum
of fifteen shillings per day; allowing
twenty miles for each day's travel, to
be certified by the Speaker, the same
to be in lieu of any sum which the Spea-
ker or Members of this House might
be entitled to by any Act to be passed
this Session.

Thursday, June 18.

Resolved, as the opinion of this Com-
mittee, that such Resolutions of Appro-
priation as are agreed to and reported
from this Committee should be engrossed,
and sent to the Council for concu-
rence.

And upon the question, the Commit-
tee divided as follows:—

Whereupon it was carried in the affir-
mative.

And that the Committee then passed
another Resolution, as follows:—

Resolved, That nothing in the afore-
going Resolution contained, shall be con-
strued to interfere with the sole right,
invariably claimed by this House, of
granting and modelling Supplies for the
Public Service.

Friday, June 19.

Resolved, That there be granted to
the Trustees of the Savings' Bank of the
City of Saint John, the sum of —
pounds, to reimburse them for the em-
bezzlement made by its late Cashier of
its Funds, including the claim for an-
nual services made by him which had
not been provided for.

To which it was moved as an amend-
ment, to strike out all after the word

"Resolved," and insert—That the fur-
ther consideration of the grant to the
Trustees of the Savings' Bank be post-
poned until the next Session of the Gen-
eral Assembly. And upon the ques-
tion for adopting the amendment, the
Committee divided—YEAS, 15; NAYS, 10.
And it was carried in the affirmative.

That then another Resolution was
moved as follows:—

Resolved, That there be granted to
the Clerk of the Legislative Council,
the sum of fifty pounds in addition to
the grant already made him by the Com-
mittee this Session.

To which it was moved as an amend-
ment, to strike out all after the word
"Resolved," and insert—That the fur-
ther consideration of the said Resolution
be postponed until the next Session of
the Legislature.

And upon the question for adopting
this amendment, the Committee divided
as follows:—

Ordered, That the Report be accepted.

From the Halifax Royal Gazette.

The Athol, Troop Ship, which ar-
rived yesterday, brought two Companies
of the Royal Artillery, and Detach-
ments of the 34th, 83d and Rifles—un-
der the command of Lt. Col. Eeles of
the latter Corps. We understand she
will proceed in a few days to Quebec.
The Romney, Troop ship, with the 43d
Regiment, for New Brunswick, we have
been told, was to sail from Cork on the
8th or 9th of May.

We have been politely favoured with
Newfoundland Papers of the 9th inst—
which have furnished London accounts
to the 2d May, extracted from Papers
received at St. John's by the Athol.

St. JOHN'S, N. F. JUNE 9.

Arrived on Friday morning last, the
transport ship *Athol*, having on board
Captains G. B. Fraser, R. S. Arm-
strong; Lieuts. H. Greary, H. R. E.
Wilmot, and 66 privates of the Royal
Artillery—to relieve the company do-
ing duty at this station. They disemb-
arked yesterday, immediately upon
which the Artillery here, under the com-
mand of Captain Wyatt, left the garri-
son, and proceeded to join the *Athol*.
They were escorted to the Government
wharf by the whole disposable military
force at the respective forts, and attend-
ed by a numerous assemblage of the in-
habitants of the town, anxious to testi-
fy their sense of the orderly and uni-
formly correct deportment of the men
during their residence here, and the
high respect which they bear towards
Captain Wyatt, who, as an officer and a
gentleman, has entitled himself to their
highest consideration.

The *Athol* has also on board detach-
ments of the Royal Artillery and the
34th and 83d Regts. of Infantry for
Quebec and Nova-Scotia, and one Ri-
fle Company for Halifax; with the
whole of which, together with the Com-
pany embarked here, she will immedi-
ately proceed to her destination.

We have London papers to the 2d
May; but they contain little that is
worth extracting.

The French Chambers have, after
protracted sittings, passed the American
Indemnity Bill by a large majority.—
There is however one point reserved—
that the money shall not be paid down
until explanation shall have been offered
upon some parts of the President's
Message, which are taken to reflect up-
on the national honor and dignity of
France. This little difficulty, it is
thought, will easily be overcome.

Lord John Russell has lost his elec-
tion for the south of Devon, Mr. Par-
ker, a Conservative candidate, having
been returned by a majority of 627.

The Rt. Hon. Lieutenant-General Sir
Hussey Vivian has been appointed Mas-
ter-General of the Ordnance.

FRANCE.—The *Constitutionnel* says that
the Minister of Finance, fearful of the re-
sponsibility that he might otherwise incur,
has resolved not to pay the first instalment
of the American indemnity until the Cham-
ber of Deputies shall have declared sufficient
satisfaction that may be offered. Ac-
cording to the *Gazette de France* prepara-
tions are making at the American Legation
for the departure of Mr. Livingston, who,
the same journal adds, is said by persons be-
longing to the Embassy to look upon the
amendment agreed to by the Chamber of
Deputies as a virtual nullification of the
treaty.

The *Courier Francais* says, that Mr. Li-
vingston, the American Minister, loudly asserts
that neither the present President of Ameri-
ca nor his successor, whoever he may be, will
consent to retract or explain the message of
President Jackson, and that, moreover, his
(Mr. Livingston's) return to America would in
all likelihood be followed by the passing of
a non-intercourse bill with regard to France.
Accounts from Toulon, dated the 21st ult.
states, that by order of the Minister of Marine,
an extraordinary levy of sailors is to be made
throughout the whole of the 5th maritime ar-
rondissement. The *Pilot du Calvados* asserts
that similar orders are in course of execution
at Caen and in all the other maritime dis-
trict, and the levies as soon as raised are sent
to Brest.

M. De Rigny presented, on Monday, to the
Chamber of Peers, the project of a law ratifying
the treaty with America, and granting the 25
millions. He explained how the Government
meant to act with respect to the amendment,
rendering explanation on the part of the
American President a necessary preliminary to
payment. He stated that diplomatic inter-
course having ceased between the two coun-
tries, it was for the Americans to renew it,
and the Envoy charged with demanding pay-
ment would no doubt be charged to offer suf-
ficient explanations.

Boston, June 10.

The Albany, Capt. Hawkins, from Havre,
and the Britannia, Capt. Waite, from
Liverpool, have arrived at New-York,
bringing dates to the 1st May.

The Constitution frigate had gone to
Coves for water, and will return to Havre
to bring Mr. Livingston home.

Don Carlos does not appear to lose ground
in Spain. Mina is on his last legs—his
health dreadfully impaired, and no clever
man to take the command of the army.
France and England must now interfere.
A French army will enter Spain the mo-
ment the American question is settled.
Nothing of interest in England.

Our Relations with France.—The New-
York American contains the following:

"It must not be disguised, however, from
our readers, that Mr. Livingston, as we
have from private but authentic sources the
certain assurance—considers the *provisio*
question so nearly tantamount to a rejection
of the indemnity, that he feels himself bound
by the spirit of his instructions; to return in
the Constitution to the United States—
which frigate, therefore, may be hourly
looked for."

We apprehend there is much plausibility
in the following extract from a letter from
Paris, published in the London Morning
Chronicle:

"The adoption of the amendment of Gen.
Valaze, forbidding payment until satisfac-
tory explanations were received from Presi-
dent Jackson, has given rise to some diffi-
culties. Mr. Livingston, instead of represent-
ing the President as likely to explain, has,
previous to his departure, made a counter
demand of explanations relative to the last
diplomatic communication made to the Pre-
sident by M. Surruier. In order to un-
ravel the last knot of this entangled skein,
Louis Phillip has determined, it is said, to
despatch Gen. Bernard to Washington.—
The General has so long served in America,
and is at once so familiar with the chief of
both Governments, that it is hoped that he
will bring about a complete reconciliation.
Another mode of getting over the difficulty
is also spoken of, that is to make the
amendment of Gen. Valaze be rejected by
the Peers."

PIRATES EXECUTED.—On the 11th in-
stant, Captain Don Pedro Gilbert, and Juan
Montenegro, Manuel Castillo, Angel Gar-
ria; and Manuel Boyga, underwent the
awful sentence of the law, at Boston, for
having, while forming part of the crew of
the piratical sch'r. *Panda*, robbed the
Merican, of Salem, of \$20,000, and afterwards
attempting to destroy the crew and all evi-
dence of their crime, by setting fire to their
vessel. On being informed of their fate,
the day previous to their execution, they
attempted to commit suicide, and Boyga so
far succeeded, by inflicting a deep gash on
the left side of his neck, with a piece of tin,
as to require to be carried up the ladder to
the platform of the gallows, in a chair, ap-
parently unconscious of his situation. To
the last, they protested they were innocent
of the crime for which they were about to
suffer. Two of their comrades, *De Soto*
and Ruiz, were respited, the former for six-
ty days, and the latter for thirty.

DESTRUCTIVE CONFLAGRATION.—The most
destructive fire ever experienced in Charle-
ston (South Carolina), is stated in the
Patron of the 6th inst. to have taken place in
the morning of the preceding day. It
broke out at half past twelve o'clock, and
was not extinguished until nine hours after.
Three hundred and seventy-four buildings
were destroyed, of which number, 182 were
dwelling houses or stores. Estimated value
\$190,000.—The fire is supposed to have
been the work of an incendiary.

DISGRACEFUL OUTRAGE.—The Newfound-
lander, of the 21st of May, says:—

"We received yesterday the following
particulars of one of the most horrible out-
