AT THE COURT OF ST. JAMES'S,  
the 1st of April, 1835.

PRESENT:  
The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 3rd and 4th year of His Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad, after reciting that by the Law of Navigation, foreign Ships are permitted to import into any of the British Possessions abroad, from the Countries to which they belong, Goods, the produce of those Countries, and to export Goods from such Possessions to be carried to any foreign Country whatever; and that it is expedient that such Permission should be subject to certain conditions, it is amongst other things enacted, that the privileges by the Law of Navigation granted to foreign Ships, shall be limited to the Ships of those Countries which having Colonial Possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those Possessions to British Ships, or which, not having Colonial Possessions, shall place the Commerce and Navigation of this Country, and of its Possessions abroad upon the footing of the most favoured Nation, unless His Majesty by His Order in Council shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such Privileges to the Ships of any foreign Country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled by such foreign Country; and it is thereby provided that no foreign Country shall be deemed to have fulfilled the before mentioned conditions, or to be entitled to the Privileges aforesaid, unless and until His Majesty shall by some Order or Orders to be by Him made by the advice of His Privy Council have declared that such foreign Country hath so fulfilled the said conditions, and is entitled to the said Privileges: And whereas, it hath been made to appear to the satisfaction of His Majesty in Council that the conditions aforesaid have been fulfilled by the Government of Denmark, Now therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers in His Majesty in Council by the said recited Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth declare and it is hereby declared accordingly, that the Da-

nish Government hath fulfilled the before mentioned conditions, and that Danish Ships may import into any of the British Possessions abroad, from the Country to which they belong, Goods the produce of that Country, and may export Goods from such Possessions, to be carried to any foreign Country whatever.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable the Earl of Aberdeen, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, having the Department of the Colonies, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly, as to them respectively may appear.

In consequence of the backwardness of the Season, and the consequent pressure on the Agricultural part of the Community, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor deems it proper to dispense with the Militia Drills and Inspection for the present year; except that each Battalion is to assemble once by Companies at their usual places of muster, for the purpose of taking a correct list of the number of men enrolled in each Company District, in order that the Commanding Officer may be enabled to make a General Return of his Battalion, which is to be forwarded to the Adjutant General for the information of the Commander in Chief.

### KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON.

On Sunday, June 21, the Anniversary Sermon was preached at Christ's Church by the Venerable the Archdeacon, who delivered an appropriate and comprehensive Discourse on the just use of Reason in the interpretation of Divine Revelation.

The Annual Meeting of the College Council commenced on the Tuesday; when the College was examined, and the Students were arranged according to their respective proficiency.

On Wednesday the Collegiate School was examined, the Scholars taking place according to merit, as attested by the register.

The Council re-assembled on Thursday, His Excellency the Chancellor presiding; when the Honorable the Chief Justice and the Advocate General took their seats, pursuant to His Excellency's nomination. A Standing Committee was appointed to grant dispensations to non-resident Students; whose payments of every description to the College were so reduced, as not in future to exceed Ten Pounds per annum; and who will also be exempted, on due application, from attendance on any Worship or Instruction which may not be in unison with their religious profession. The Council passed a Resolution, that the Reverend George Cowell, A. M. of the University of Cambridge, and the Reverend John Birkmyre, A. M. of the University of Glasgow, be requested to accept the office of Examiners of Candidates for Degrees during the ensuing year.

A Convocation of the University was afterwards held for the celebration of the Encenia, at which His Excellency also presided, supported by the Venerable the President and the Reverend the Professor of Divinity. The Annual Oration was pronounced by the Reverend the Vice President, who presented a general view of the proper design and character of the institution, earnestly recommending the consideration of any real improvement, of which it might be susceptible. The solemnity concluded with the recitation of Mr. George Lee's Essay on "The Moral Philosophy of Aristotle compared with that of Cicero."

Mr. Lee's Essay receives the Douglas Gold Medal, and is the second from the author which has been thought worthy of the highest distinction of the Academic year. It was considered the best of seven Essays on the same subject; the Examiners report-

ing several to have been creditable compositions, while one other so far approved itself to their judgment, that they could pronounce it only less complete than that to which they awarded the prize.—The Silver Medal was assigned to Master Morris Robinson, who appeared at the head of the Collegiate school; his late colleagues in the first class having previously entered as Students of the College.

The Encenia was attended by a numerous assemblage of Ladies and Gentlemen, including those of the first rank in the Community; whose presence on such occasions is much to be desired, calculated as it must be to stimulate the Students to exert their talents with an honorable emulation, while it countenances and encourages their instructors.

FLORAL AND HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.—The Horticulturist is admonished, that meetings of the Standing Committees of the Society take place at Mr. Watts' Green House every Saturday, at Six o'clock; and as the weather has been uncommonly fine for the last week we may anticipate the appearance of competitors for prizes at the next meeting. A show of peas, melons and strawberries will not astonish us, and as they are all subjects for the prizes of the Society, there will perhaps be various competition. It is of no small importance with us to introduce and cultivate early peas, and we think the earliest of the family entitled to peculiar and favorable consideration: as it cannot be convenient, so we cannot be judges of their culinary virtue: not so with the melon and the strawberry, their merits must be proved by the gastronomic sense—they must be tasted to be duly appreciated. What an ambrosial feast may be anticipated upon melons and strawberries—nothing but a bowl of nectar can be wanting to make it quite classic and divine! It is expected too, that our Florists will emulate each other with their bouquets to grace the ambrosial board. In short, we think the Society anticipates, during our brief Summer, that every effort will be made to make Horticulture a delightful pastime, and a useful employment to all who have pleasure or profit in a garden.—Communicated.
