

LATEST NEWS FROM EUROPE.

HOUSE OF LORDS, Aug. 19.

Viscount Melbourne moved the second reading of the Irish Church Bill, having announced to the House His Majesty's readiness to lay at their disposal his interest in the benefices of the Irish Church.

The discussion ensued, in which Lord Fitzgerald, the Earl of Ripon, the Bishop of Exeter, Earl Winchester, and Lord Glenelg took part. The Opposition Lords and Bishops generally protested against the bill, and declared their intention to mould it to their own shape in the Committee, but they allowed it to be read a second time.—Adjourned.

The following is the King's answer to the Address of the House of Commons on the subject of Orange Lodges: "I have received your dutiful address, submitting to me certain resolutions on the subject of Orange Lodges in the army. My attention has been, and shall continue to be, directed to practices contrary to the regulations and injurious to the discipline of my troops. I owe it no less to the dignity of my crown than to the safety of the country and the welfare of my brave and loyal army, to discourage and prevent every attempt to introduce secret societies into its ranks, and you may rely on my determination to adopt the most effectual means for this purpose."

TIMBER TRADE.—The following resolutions were reported on Friday night last from the Timber Duties' Committee of the House of Commons:

1. That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the present mode of taking the duties on deals is susceptible of improvement, and that this Committee would recommend that a mode be adopted which shall approach more nearly to a payment according to the contents of the deals.

2. That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the difference of duty of 45s. now imposed by law on timber the produce of Europe, as compared with timber the produce of our North American Colonies, is too great, and may be reduced.

3. That it is the opinion of this committee, that having a due regard to the interests which have been created in the British North American Colonies, by the system hitherto pursued, and to the representations of the Shipping Interest, a reduction of the protective duty, not exceeding 15s. per load, would be a fair arrangement.

4. That it is the opinion of this Committee, that such reduction be made, so far as may be consistent with the interests of the revenue, without any augmentation of the duty on Colonial timber.

5. That it is the opinion of this Committee, that, in any alteration made, such alteration should not affect the shipments made in the year 1836.

6. That it is the opinion of this Committee, that there should be a uniform mode of taking the duty on deals throughout the United Kingdom.

Report to lie on the table, to be printed.

The letter of a private friend in London, which we have just received, says,—

"The political affairs of this country are in a very serious state, and really, from the despotic tone the House of Commons is assuming, it is the duty of every Editor to impress strongly on the people what their conduct ought to be at another general election. The O'Connell and Roebuck party, as you will see by the accounts from Canada, are labouring every where to promote discord and rebellion. The Continent is also in a desperate state, and every where seems to indicate a general explosion for the overthrow of every established institution, and to begin every thing afresh for the aggrandisement of a few unprincipled and desperate men. Alas! the very rabble that are now helping them on, will be the first and most helpless victims of their machinations if they succeed."

The same friend says farther, and we trust he speaks truly—

"I think the House of Commons will demand a Conference with the Lords, when the Corporations Bill is returned, and that then both parties will yield a little, so as to get the Bill through this Session,—the Ministers however, to please the Tail and those that cluster round it, promising to bring forward another bill on the subject next year. Several meetings have already been held with a view to this arrangement, between some of the Lords and Commons."

Major General Middlemore has been appointed Governor of St. Helena, and Major General Darling Lieutenant Governor of Tobago, has been nominated

Lieutenant Governor of Barbados, in place of the former.

Earthquake in Lancashire.—The following is an account of the earthquake mentioned in our last. On Thursday morning, between three and four o'clock a very severe shock of an earthquake was felt at Lancashire, which caused considerable alarm to the inhabitants, many of whom rose from bed and ran into the streets. A chimney was knocked down in Bridge street, but we have not heard of any other serious accident or loss of life. The shock was felt at Ulverston, Kendal, Garstang, Blackpool, Preston and Kirkham. The noise produced by the phenomenon is described by a gentleman who was awake by it in Blackpool as that of heavy thunder. He states that his bed was shaken by the shock.

EXTRAORDINARY ARRIVALS.—During Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the number of vessels which arrived at this port was 245; 107 from foreign ports, and 138 coastwise. Fifty two were timber laden, from British America; 23 arrived on Wednesday; a number, we believe, quite unprecedented in one day.—*Liverpool Courier*, Aug. 12.

GLASGOW, AUGUST 15.

The intelligence which we lay before our readers to day, particularly the advices from the Continent, is of importance, and will be read with interest. An angry feeling seems to prevail throughout the whole of Europe. Commotions and riots have taken place in many quarters while they are apprehended in others; the whole indicating a speedy and general convulsion in Europe.

In Russia, the throne has been threatened by a conspiracy in Poland, and even extended to the camp at Kalisch.

Lord Palmerston, in answer to a question from Mr. Robinson, respecting the suspension of the commercial treaty between England and Portugal, stated that the latter Government had expressed a desire to renew the treaty, and that negotiations were consequently now in progress upon the subject.

The Jupiter frigate 50, is ordered to be fitted out at Sheerness for the conveyance of Lord Auckland, the new appointed Governor General, to the seat of Government at Calcutta.

GREENOCK, August 17.

On Friday, the annual financial statement, known by the name of the Budget was brought forward by the Chancellor of the Exchequer. The amount of income over the expenditure for next year he estimated at £335,000. From this the interest due on the West India compensation grant has to be taken, which will leave a clear surplus of only about £200,000; a sum which admits little room for a reduction of taxes. The duty on flint glass is to be reduced from 6d. to 2d. a pound, which it is supposed will absorb about £70,000 of this surplus. He anticipated a further loss of £40,000 from an alteration in the duty on Spirit Licenses, and of £500 by removing the stamp from awards in Ireland.

AUGUST 24.

The Irish Church Reform Bill was read a second time in the House of Lords on Thursday evening. Its commitment was ordered for this day. The Bishop of Exeter announced his intention of moving the rejection of all the clauses for appropriating the surplus revenue to other than ecclesiastical purposes.

AUGUST 25.

The latest accounts from Madrid come down to the 14th. The gloom is every day becoming more profound in the political horizon of Spain.—The impulse given by the Movement party is extending like a contagion, and it is obvious that the Prince Regent's Government must succumb to it, or it will be shivered to pieces by the shock. It is well known that the Urban Militia cannot be relied upon by the Government; and as the whole of the regular troops are opposed to Don Carlos in the North, the Government have no means of arresting the progress of the revolutionary party to the Southward. In the mean time, Don Carlos has made a movement with a considerable body of troops, in the direction of Castile, to endeavour to arouse the agricultural population in his favour, in the expectation that they will be shocked at the excesses committed on the Monastic Establishments and the Clergy, by the Liberals or Exaltados. Great anxiety prevails in this country for the next arrivals from Madrid, as, at the date of the last advices, the Government were not apprised that their authority had been superseded in the Provinces. It seems also to be expected by those in the secret, that the receipt of the intelligence would be the signal for a rising in the capital.

PARIS, August 20.

FRIGHTFUL NEWS FROM SPAIN.

The Journal de Paris contains the following frightful intelligence from Spain:—

"The news from Spain are more and more afflicting. At Matara, and on different points, new popular movements have taken place to the cries of—Death to the Monks! Death to the Nobles! Death to the rich!—Liberty forever!"

"At Tarragona the lieutenant and the major of the place were strangled. Valentia has also been the theatre of deplorable excesses. At Barcelona the proclamations become more numerous. They call the inhabitants to arms to exterminate the Carlists and sustain the popular movement."

"Saragossa is waiting peaceable enough, governed by the Junta, the reply to the demands which it has addressed to the government. We are assured that Don Carlos intends directing all his efforts upon Castile."

The Courier Francais affects to believe that these statements of the Journal de Paris are exaggerated; but I confess that I cannot partake its opinion. From so many parts of the Peninsula—from private correspondents—from public journals—from official accounts—from the best informed men on the frontiers—and even from couriers and travellers who have left or passed through the places in question, we learn that the accounts published of the ultra-revolutionary movements in Spain are not at all exaggerated, and that the evils are quite as great as they are stated to be. The Journal des Debats contains the following news from Spain: 1st from Madrid.—Letters from that capital up to the 12th, arrived by express, state that the capital was tranquil, but that the deplorable events of Catalonia were known. The government had not taken any extraordinary measures, notwithstanding the extraordinary circumstances which surround it.

AUGUST 26.

SPAIN.—The Paris Journals and letters bring us gloomy accounts from the Peninsula. There has been a riot at Valentia, which was appeased only with blood. A project is said to be entered in Catalonia and the other provinces, to establish a Federal Republic, on the basis of the ancient divisions of the present Spanish Monarchy before the accession of Philip II. to the throne. Such projects are foolish as well as wicked, and can only tend to much confusion. Of the armies, the ministerial journals state that the Carlists had moved on the Ebro, and they indicate the success of the latter, rather than mention it by describing the Carlists as attacking the Christians at the bridge of Behobia, and firing on the French detachment at that post.

On Saturday last, Mrs. Catharine Dayton, formerly of Salisbury, North Carolina, in the 76th year of her age.

On the 20th inst., James Reed, Esq. Keeper of the Light House on Partridge Island and one of the Branch Pilots for that Port. Capt. R. while labouring under a fit of mental derangement, to which he was occasionally subject, left his home about three o'clock in the morning, and although diligent search was shortly after made on the island, and about the shore, his remains were not found until Wednesday, when they were discovered on the shore at the North side of the Island. He is supposed to have been killed by falling from the cliff above, a height of about fifty feet, as his skull was much fractured, and both his legs broken, and his body otherwise much bruised. Capt. R. was in the 50th year of his age, and has left a widow and six children. His remains were interred yesterday in the New Burying Ground in the Parish of Portland with Masonic Honors, and accompanied by the Portland Rifle Company Band, and the officers of the St. John Sea Fencibles, (in which he was a Captain,) and a volunteer Firing Party from that Corps, under the command of Captain Eagles, besides a very large and respectable assemblage of sympathizing acquaintances and friends.—*St. John Courier*.

In Burns street, Dumfries, Mrs. Ann Burns aged 63, wife of Mr. Robert Burns, retired officer of Somerset house, and eldest son of the bard. The deceased died in the same house, and will be interred in the mausoleum, where lie the remains of her great relative.

Near the Horse and Jockey, county Tipperary, Mr. Thomas Smee, a respectable farmer, aged 115 years. He never lost a tooth but one, and retained all his faculties to the last moment of life.
