The Briseis Packet, takes the next Mail to America.

The new Treasury Commission was issued this morning—the names are as follow—the Duke of Wellington, Lords Rosslyn, Ellenborough, Maryborough, Sir John Becket, Mr. Planta.

Sir R. Peel is expected home on Friday or Saturday, and, if so, the finishing arrangements will soon be made.

Several meetings have been held in the City, and resolutions adopted in favor of the formation of a Whig Ministry.

Parliament has been prorogued to the 18th December.

The provisions of the Insurrection Act have been proclaimed to be in force in the barony of Clanwilliam, the parishes of Castletown, Kilpatrick, and Ballintemple.

There is scarcely a word of foreign news of any interest.

The French Cabinet has been again formed—the Duke of Treviso is at the head of it.

Since the above was put in type, we were favoured with a paper of the 1st Dec.—The only thing of any interest which we notice in it is an offer of Lord Brougham to join the Administration as Chief Baron of the Exchequer.

SUNDAY SCHOOL FESTIVAL.—We have always felt peculiar pleasure in noticing any attention shown to the juvenile part of our community, especially when it tends to enlarge the mind and correct the passions. For some years past, we have viewed with delight the growing interest which has been displaying itself in the more efficient establishment of Sabbath Schools in this town, convinced that the disinterested labours of discreet and judicious Superintendents and Teachers in such institutions, must be of incalculable service to youth, and even powerful auxiliaries to the labours of the Christian Minister. As an encouragement to the Scholars, the Teachers of the Wesleyan School in this place, resolved to give them a "treat" on *New Year's Day*—for which purpose they were assembled in the Chapel. Although the day was very severe, 134 were present; and a more interesting and happy scene we scarcely ever remember to have witnessed. They had previously been examined publicly, when the proficiency many of them displayed, gave the greatest satisfaction to the friends present. The children appeared rightly to appreciate this spontaneous effusion of their Teachers' good will towards them.

The Committee, Visitors, Teachers, &c. afterwards met in the Vestry, where tea had been prepared for them. Upwards of forty were present. Several addresses were delivered during the evening, all of which spoke encouragement to those who labour in this interesting department of Christian instruction. We are fully convinced that such meetings must have a very beneficial effect.

There are on the books 165 children and 27 teachers; a library has been founded during the year—the books of which are eagerly sought by the scholars; towards the establishment of this one generous friend gave ten pounds.

REPORTER.—We understand that the County of York is adopting the principle laid down by the "Standard," and that a Subscription is in progress to collect £10 for the services of a Reporter to the House of Assembly at the approaching Session; leaving £7 each for the Counties of Sunbury and Carleton; and from the acknowledged importance of the measure, we doubt not that those Counties will cheerfully meet the demand. The amounts, when collected, are to be deposited in the Central Bank.

NORTH-EASTERN BOUNDARY. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, Washington, Dec. 24, 1834. The following resolution offered yesterday by Mr. LINCOLN, was taken up for consideration: Resolved, that the President of the United States be requested to lay before this House, (if in his opinion it is not incompatible with the public interest,) any communications which may have been had between the Government of the United States and that of Great Britain, since the rejection by the former of the advisory opinion of the King of the Netherlands, in reference to the establishment and final settlement of the North-eastern Boundary of the United States, heretofore in controversy between the two Governments.

And that he also be requested to communicate any information which he may possess of the exercise of practical jurisdiction, by the authorities of the British Province of New Brunswick, over the disputed territory, within the limits of the State of Maine, according to the true line of boundary, as claimed by the United States, and especially upon that part of the territory which has been incorporated by the government of Maine into the town of Madawaska, together with such representations and correspondence (if any) as have been had by the Executive of that State with the Government of the United States on the subject.

Mr. PARKS inquired of the mover, what were the objects of the resolution, particularly the last two clauses of it.

Mr. LINCOLN entered, at length, into an exposition of the state of the question to which the resolution refers, and an explanation of his object in calling for the information.

The debate was continued till three o'clock, by Messrs. Evans, Smith, Lincoln, Parks, and Foster, (the House several times refusing to take up the order of the day,) when, without taking the question on the adoption of the resolution, the house adjourned.

Destructive Fire at the Thames Tunnel.—This morning, about one o'clock, a fire broke out on the works of the Thames Tunnel, leading to the shaft at Rotherhithe, about a hundred yards from the scene of the late disastrous conflagration, in Church-street. In a few minutes after the first alarm was given, several workshops and sheds were in flames, and the fire soon extended to other buildings and erections connected with the works of this great undertaking. The inmates of the adjoining houses, principally inhabited by poor families, commenced removing their goods, and a scene of the greatest confusion ensued, the engines arrived in quick succession, but owing to the absence of water, the fire was raging uncontrolled, for three quarters of an hour, by which time it had extended to the large private residence of a merchant, and one of the principal inhabitants in Church-street. The greatest exertions were now used by the firemen to save the dwellings of the poor inhabitants, in which they fortunately succeeded. A long range of buildings and workshops belonging to the Thames Tunnel Company were reduced to ashes, the private residence was gutted, and very few articles saved, and some outbuildings and stables adjoining were also destroyed. It is said the loss to the Thames Tunnel Company alone will exceed £2000.—The Tunnel is uninjured, nor will there be any suspension on the works on account of the fire.

The London Times certainly did wonders in bringing out the report of the dinner given to Earl Grey, in the Pavilion, Edinburgh, on Wednesday morning—that is within a day and a half from the time the great event occurred. The reporters to the number of three or four, worked by subdivision, remained in the Pavilion till nearly 12 p.m., then hired post chaises, travelled by express, and with lights and desks inside extended their notes as they passed along at the rapid rate of 13½ miles per hour.—This certainly rivals the power of steam, the wonders of the railway, and many other wonders to boot.—But much may be done by subdivision; and we suspect the world is still in ignorance of the length to which this great art may be carried.—*Dumfries Cour.*

HAMBURG, Oct. 21.—Great damage has been done, and many ships sunk or wrecked on the coast, by the late storm from the 17th to the 19th. At Cuxhaven the sea rose 20 feet. Newwerk is under water. Several commercial failures have lately occurred at Hamburg. One Jewish firm in the wool trade, is mentioned as deficient to the amount of between 70 and 80,000*l.*

Coldstream Guards have been given guns with percussion locks by way of experiment.—It is intended, if found to answer, to substitute them throughout the whole army; much caution will be necessary on the part of the men in handling these guns.

At present Scotch dresses, plaides, &c. are all the rage in Paris. Scotch ribbons are also much worn, both within doors, and outside when promenading.

NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATURE. The following may be taken as a summary of the business, which, during the week has come before the House:—The Quit Rent Commutation Bill passed and was sent to the Council—yesterday His Excellency's assent was given to it, together with several other bills of minor importance.—On Tuesday last Mr. Dodd's Bill, allowing the Master of the Rolls to resign his seat at the end of the Session, was sent from the Council with an amendment, suspending its operations until His Majesty's pleasure was known.—On Wednesday the amended Bill was rejected by a large majority, and again returned. A Bill has been introduced to regulate the collection of the Post Office Revenues—His Majesty having surrendered to the Province the control of the internal Revenue of that Department—A Bill altering the sitting of the Supreme Court in Halifax from the first Tuesday of January to the second Tuesday of February next, has passed both branches of the Legislature. A Bill has come before the House, and was under discussion on Saturday, to divide the County of Halifax, Colchester, and Pictou. It provided that Halifax and Colchester should return each four Members—while Pictou should return but three.—*Times.*

Loss of H. M. SCHR. NIMBLE.—Extract of a letter from Havana, Nov. 1834.—H. M. Schr. Nimble was lost on the night of the 31st instant, on Cape Verde, in the Bahama Channel. The Officers and crew have arrived here all safe; about 70 negroes were drowned—she had on board 270 when she struck, which she had taken out of a slaver that she had run on shore—the remainder were brought round here in a cruiser. The Spanish Government has offered the commander a bribe of war to take his crew to Nassau.
