

and her neighbours will be less striking—the evidences of their superiority less disheartening and distinct. But this is not all: as the standard of mental and moral character is elevated—as we become distinguished by an ardent pursuit of truth—by the noble flights of imagination—the graceful creations of fancy, those things which are independent of mere politics and economy, Nova Scotia may acquire a reputation which in peace will be a universal passport for her sons, and in times of peril must secure for her sympathy and support.

This Institute has already done much to accelerate the march of improvement. Its resources were never greater than at the present moment—its prospects more brilliant—the hopes of its friends better sustained. I know that you who have the power will continue to labour for the improvement of the young; and I feel assured, that those of us who may outlive the vigor of youth, will find the Boys reared in this Institute, the props and instructors of our declining years. They will mount the platform to pay us back with interest whatever we may have bestowed. They will make our grey hairs honorable by their improvements in manners and in mind—they will shower upon our fading intellects the discoveries of modern science, and delight us with the higher philosophy of a riper and more cultivated age. And should they, in turning back to the past history of the Institute, recall any of the views which I have endeavored this evening to develop—though they may smile at the imperfect language in which they were conveyed, I think their experience will prove them to have been correct; and justify the only apology, which, in the language of the Roman Orator, I make for their expression: Who is here so vile, that does not love his country?

If any—speak—for him have I offended.

Downing Street, 1st December, 1834.

Sir—I have the honor to acquaint you, that the attention of my Predecessor seems to have been drawn from various quarters to the gratification which would be experienced in the principal British Possessions in North America, if they were provided with sets of works published in England, with so much care and at so much expense, by the Record Commission. It is almost needless to say, that a strong wish was felt to seize so suitable an occasion of offering to His Majesty's subjects in North America a token of the regard felt for them by the Government of the Mother Country, and also of furnishing them with the means of cherishing that interest which it is to be hoped they may long retain in the history and institutions of this Kingdom. An application was therefore made to the Record Commissioners, and I have now the pleasure to acquaint you that they will be ready to supply a sufficient number of their Publications to afford one copy to each British Colony on the continent of North America, besides an extra copy for the use of the important and flourishing City of Montreal. The works will be forwarded to you with as little delay as possible. I must devote upon yourself the task of selecting the place of deposit for the gift, merely remarking that it should be a public library of sufficient permanence, security and extent, to ensure the safe keeping of the Records, and to justify the donation; and that of course it should be a spot accessible to all Members of the Legislature.

We have to announce the intelligence of the Decease of His Royal Highness the Duke of GLOUCESTER, which melancholy event took place at Bagshot Park, on the 30th of November last, after an illness of fifteen days.

The English Mail for December, reached this place on Saturday last. The dates are from London to the 4th, and from Falmouth to the 6th ult. Sir ROBERT PEEL not having arrived from the Continent, all is conjecture with respect to the formation of the new Ministry. The duties of the Government were still conducting under Commission, with the Duke of WELLINGTON at the head.

We have been favored with a copy of a Despatch from His Majesty's Secretary of State, addressed to His Excellency Sir ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL— which, with the permission of His Excellency, we publish for the information of our readers; who we doubt not will duly appreciate this "token of regard" on the part of the Government of the Mother Country—whose History and Institutions will, we trust, long continue to be subjects of deep interest to the inhabitants of New Brunswick.

SCOTTISH CHURCH IN CANADA.

(From the Montreal Gazette.)
At the close of the last war, the only Presbyterian Churches established in this Province, were those in Montreal and Quebec, while in Upper Canada, the venerated father of the Rev. John Bethune, of this city, presided over what then was the only congregation regularly formed within the Province. This congregation may be said to have extended over all the Scottish settlements in Glengarry, across to the Ottawa river, but, which, at the present time, forms five separate charges.

Compare this state of the Scottish Church with its condition at the present day, when its list contains the names of upwards of thirty labourers. After many difficulties, the Church has advanced and prospered; its prospects are brightening; and its children look forward to still greater and more beneficial results. The system of church government recognized by the General Assembly, the temporal head of the Church, was introduced into the Province a few years ago, by the formation of several Presbyteries, and one Synod. This, though self constituted at first, has been formally acknowledged by the General Assembly, who in the year 1833 passed an enactment, declaring that it was proper and expedient for the ordained Ministers of the Church of Scotland, connected with fixed congregations, throughout all the British Colonies, to form themselves, wherever circumstances would permit, into Presbyteries and Synods, adhering to the standards of the Church, and maintaining her form of worship and government; and at the same time prescribed the general rules to be observed by such Presbyteries or Synods, as to the admission of new members. A standing Committee was also named by the General Assembly, to correspond with such Churches in the Colonies, for the purpose of giving advice on any question with regard to which they might choose to consult the Church of Scotland, and affording them such aid as it might be in the power of the Committee to give in all matters affecting their rights and interests.

At the original formation of the Synod of Canada, it consisted of the Presbyteries of Quebec, Glengarry, York and Bathurst, but at the Synod of 1833, the latter was divided, and a new Presbytery of Kingston formed. It may be said that the Church of Scotland in these Provinces in a prosperous condition, and when it receives its full share of the proceeds of the clergy reserves, as an endowment for the support of the Ministers—and as soon as King's College at Toronto, and McGill College, in this city, are placed upon a liberal footing, and in full operation, so as to allow of a University education, preparatory to ordination being obtained, the onward course of the Church will be, as it has been, eminently successful.
