SUMMARY OF THE LATEST EU- ROPEAN NEWS.

LONDON, April 24th.—The English
funds have scarcely undergone any va-
riation to-day, but money is rather more
abundant, and prices are firm. Con-
sols left off at 92 7/8 to 93 for the ac-
count; Exchequer bills at 36s. to 37s.
premium.

Parliament has adjourned over for the
Easter holidays. It would not assem-
ble for business again until the 12th of
May.

Lord John Russell was married to
Lady Ribblesdale on the 11th of April.

LONDON, Saturday evening, April 25.
—There is now a full in home politics,
with the exception of a very little stir

about the elections, which are, in reali-
ty, however, exciting no interest be-
yond the parties concerned.

Consols remained 93 for the account,
yesterday, and to-day have been almost
stationary, at 92 7/8 to 93.

A new coining of silver pieces to pass
for 3d. and 1d. as well as of shillings
and sixpence, was preparing for the
West Indies.

Active preparations are making for
prosecuting the work of the Thames
Tunnel. Upwards of one hundred men
are engaged in preparing for the recep-
tion of the new shield, and other op-
erations.

Lord Amherst, the Royal Commis-
sioner to Canada, was to embark on the
20th in the Pique, a new frigate of 36
guns. He was to be accompanied by
his nephew the Earl of Hillsborough,
and Mr. Elliott as his secretary. The
widow of the late Lord Napier, and
family, have arrived in England from
China. The dignity of a Baron of the
United Kingdom has been conferred
on the Right Honorable Alexander
Baring, with the title of Baron Ashbur-
ton.

The reported engagement of H. M.
Ship Canopus, with three Russian ves-
sels of war at the Dardanelles, appears
to be incorrect; letters from Constani-
tinople of the 17th March, makes no
mention of the affair.

The Limerick Chronicle of the 8th
April says, the 94th, 95th, 96th, 97th,
98th and 99th Regiments, the last four
on foreign service, will, it is supposed,
be disbanded before a year elapses.
The 94th and 95th, as they are at
home, perhaps sooner. The draft 98th
regt. at the Cape has been counter-
manded at the depot.

THE ARMY.—The 43d Regt. is now
we understand on the passage to relieve
the 34th in New Brunswick, which
Regt. will proceed from thence to Hal-
ifax to relieve the 96th, which goes to
England.

LONDON, April 21st.

The Paris Papers which we received
at a late hour this morning by express,
put us in possession of the whole report
of Saturday's proceedings in the Cham-
ber of Deputies, by which we find that
the debate on the American claims was
brought to a close. The Bill as amend-
ed by the Committee, proposing a grant
of 25,000,000*fr.*, was voted by a majori-
ty of 239 against 137. According to
an amendment proposed by General
Valaze, to which ministers assented,
and which was agreed to by the Cham-
ber, the indemnity is not to be paid un-
til after the French Government shall
have received satisfactory explanations
with regard to the message of the Pre-
sident of the Union, dated December
2, 1834.

An evening paper (the Messenger,)
gives the particulars of an extraordi-
nary scene, which occurred on that day
in the Chamber of Deputies. M. Mau-
guin, one of the members of the ex-
treme left, had given notice the day be-
fore that if the ministers did not com-
municate to him the original papers on
the subject of the American claims, he
should feel obliged to submit to the
Chamber a remarkable communication
which he had received. The Minister
not having, in the interval, communi-
cated the papers, M. Mauguin ascend-
ed the Tribune, and after a luminous
discussion of the question before the
Chamber, produced the singular docu-
ment of which he had spoken. The fol-
lowing are the facts of the case:—A
person wrote to an hon. Deputy, that
if he would examine the original docu-
ments he would find a falsification in
them, which the texture of the paper
itself would expose. It seems that the
paper upon which the statements are
written was manufactured at a period
subsequent to the date of these docu-
ments. M. Mauguin further stated that
it was this strange discovery which had
induced M. de Polignac to reject claims
thus palpably stamped with fraud. It
is difficult, says the Messenger to describe
the sensation which this discovery pro-
duced in the Chamber. Mauguin, be-
fore quitting the tribune, renewed his
application for the original papers; but
the Minister of Foreign Affairs asserted
that none existed. In reply to this
assertion, it is all but impossible to sup-
pose that the Cabinet of Washington
has not furnished the French negotia-
tors with an account of claims.—Will
any one believe that the American
Government, on demanding an indem-
nity from France, said to the Government
of France,—"You must find out your-
selves what you owe us."

SPAIN.—Gen. Mina has resigned the
command of the army of the Queen of
Spain, on account of the state of his
health. In his letter of resignation, he
speaks in strong terms of the increased

strength and brightened prospects of
the army. Gen. Valdez had been ap-
pointed in his place.

Bayonne, April 19.—Gen. Valdez
having assumed the command of the
whole of the troops in Navarre, the
Basque Provinces, Aragon, &c.; con-
sequently, after the conference with
Don Carlos, Lord Elliot will proceed
to the headquarters of Valdez, proba-
bly at Logrono.

The Queen's Government appears
now to be acting with becoming ener-
gy, and nothing whatever can warrant,
at all events for the present, armed
French intervention.

BERMUDA, May 19.—Arrived on Tuesday
last, H. M. S. *Vestal*, Captain W. Jones,
from Jamaica. We are concerned to state
that previous to the *Vestal's* leaving Jamai-
ca, she lost her Surgeon, [Williams,] two
Midshipmen, and several Seamen, and since
her Assistant Surgeon, by Yellow Fever.
The Officers and crew of the *Dee*, steamer,
also suffered from the same cause, and the
Regiment in garrison at Kingston, [we be-
lieve the 64th] was reduced to a skeleton.
The *Forte*, *Serpent*, *Gannet*, and *Mag-
nificent*, were at Port Royal on the 26th.

CAPTURE OF A SPANISH SLAVER.—A Span-
ish brig, of three hundred tons, named the
Formidable, which had acquired no small
notoriety among the British cruisers on the
coast of Africa, by her own speed and the
boldness and dexterity of her captain, was
captured on the 17th of December, off the
mouth of the old Calabar river, by his Bri-
tannic Majesty's brigantine Buzzard. The
action was commenced by the slaver, after
a chase of some hours, and was maintained
for some time with great spirit on both sides.
At length the brigantine ran the slaver on
board, and the latter almost immediately
surrendered. The captain of the Formida-
ble, an officer of the Spanish navy, behaved
with great gallantry, fighting and encourag-
ing his men until disabled by three musket
wounds. The captors found on board the
prize 700 slaves, and a crew of 66 men, armed
with muskets, pistols and cutlasses. Four
of the Spaniards were killed and eleven
wounded; of the British, six wounded.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

At a Meeting of the BOARD OF HEALTH for
the County of York, held at the County
Court House, in Fredericton, on Monday
the fifth day of May, in the year of our
Lord one thousand eight hundred and
thirty-four:

ORDERED, That no Building or place
within the Town of Fredericton, be-
tween the River Saint John and the reserved
Street called Charlotte Street, shall be
used as a Slaughter house for the killing or
butchering of any Oxen or other animals
whatsoever; and every person offending
against this order, shall for each and every
offence forfeit and pay the sum of Five
Pounds, to be recovered and applied as the
Law directs.

The District Committees are enjoined to
pay particular attention to the proper clean-
ing of the Tanneries in the Town.

Whereas the depositing rubbish, filth,
scrapings of yards, and other offensive ma-
terials, below, on or near the Bank of the
River, tends to affect the purity of the air,
and therefore, in case of the Town of Fre-
dericton being visited by any malignant pes-
tilence, may tend to its increase and spread-
ing among the Inhabitants; for prevention
thereof, It is Ordered, that no dirt, rub-
bish, filth, scrapings of yards, or other of-
fensive material of any description, shall be
deposited or laid on any part of the shore or
bank of the River in front of the Town
of Fredericton, between the upper side of
the landing next adjacent to Government
House grounds and the first inlet below the
Town; and that any person or persons who
shall cast, deposit or lay, or aid, assist or be
concerned in casting, depositing or laying
any dirt, filth, rubbish, scrapings of yards or
other offensive material, on any part of the
said Shore or Bank, shall for each and every
offence forfeit and pay the sum of Forty
Shillings.

Resolved, That the quantity of rubbish
placed and suffered to remain and increase on
the Commons and uninclosed grounds, and
in the public streets of the Town of Frede-
ricton, and the stagnant water which is fre-
quently allowed to remain in the gutters and
water courses of the said Streets, cause un-
wholesome exhalations and are dangerous
to the public health, It is therefore Ordered,
that from and after the publication of this
Order, no rubbish, straw, packing cases, bar-
rels, boxes, lumber, dirt, filth or water, be
suffered or permitted to be placed, thrown,
cast or remain in or upon any part of the
said Streets or Commons; and any person
or persons offending against this Order,
shall for each and every offence forfeit and
pay the sum of Ten Shillings, to be recov-
ered and applied as the Law directs. And
for the more effectual prevention of the ac-
cumulation of dirt, rubbish and stagnant
water, as aforesaid, It is further Ordered,
that every householder within the Town of
Fredericton shall, on Saturday in each and

every week, cleanse and sweep (or cause to
be cleansed and swept) the Street in front of
the house and premises by him or her occu-
pied, from the margin to the outside of the
gutter or water course of the said Street,
and to clean out the gutters or water courses
so as at all times to afford a free passage to
the water which may be therein, and when
there shall be a space of ground (without
any Inhabitants residing thereon) between
any two Buildings, the persons residing on
either side thereof shall cleanse and sweep
the same, each person to cleanse and sweep
the half adjoining his or her house or pre-
mises: Provided always, that no person shall
be required to sweep or cleanse a greater
distance than four rods to the right or left of
his or her house or premises; and when any
house is occupied by more than one tenant
or family, it shall be equally the duty of
every such tenant to perform and obey this
Order; and every person or persons who
shall neglect or refuse to perform the duty
required by this Order shall, for each and
every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of
Five Shillings, to be recovered and applied
as aforesaid.

Ordered, That no dead beast or animal
whatsoever, shall be cast or thrown into the
River Saint John, or any other River, or in
or upon any part of the Lands within the
County of York, under the penalty of Twen-
ty Shillings for every breach of this Order:
And further, that the Owner of any such
dead beast or other animal shall, within
twenty four hours after the death of such
beast or other animal, bury the same or
cause it to be buried at least three feet be-
low the surface of the earth, under a penalty
of Twenty Shillings, for every offence or
neglect of this Order.

Ordered, That every House occupied by
any tenant within the Town of Fredericton,
shall forthwith be provided by the owner or
occupier thereof with a decent and sufficient
Privy, with a sufficient Vault beneath the
same, and if any house be unprovided there-
with after the first day of June next, the ow-
ner or occupier thereof (at the election of the
Committee for the District in which such
house may be situated) shall forfeit and pay
a penalty of Forty Shillings, for each and
every week he, she or they shall neglect to
provide the same, to be recovered and ap-
plied as the Law directs.

examine the Town of Fredericton and ad-
jacent Lands, the same be divided into six
Districts as follow:

- No. 1. To extend from Phillis' Creek to
the centre of Westmorland Street.
- No. 2. Thence to the centre of York street.
- No. 3. Thence to the centre of Carleton
street.
- No. 4. Thence to the centre of Regent
street.
- No. 5. Thence to the centre of Saint John
street.
- No. 6. Thence to the first creek below
the town.

That the following Persons be Commit-
tees to examine and superintend the said
Districts, and make such orders relative
thereto as they may deem necessary.

- For District, No. 1. Thomas Pickard,
Charles Lee, and James Taylor, Jun.
- No. 2. William J. Bedell and Thomas
Emerson.
- No. 3. Rev. Dr. Somerville and George
F. S. Berton.
- No. 4. William Fraser and William T.
Peters.
- No. 5. Jarvis Ring and Geo. E. Ketchum.
- No. 6. D. L. Robinson and L. A. Wilmot.

The several District Committees will im-
mediately visit their respective Districts, and
all persons are expected forthwith to have
their enclosures and premises fit for in-
spection.
