Lord J. Russell left Queen street, Mary-fair, on Thursday morning, to attend his election for South Devon. Lady John Russell, who had returned with her Lord from Woodburn Abbey, accompanied his Lordship. Lord John Russell will return to town about the 30th inst. to resume his official duties as Secretary of State for the Home Department. Lord Melbourne has appointed John Young, Esq. to be his Lordship's private Secretary. Mr. Stanley, the new Secretary of the Treasury, has appointed Mr. Geo. Arlthnot to be his private Secretary. There will, we understand, be no opposition offered to the return of Mr. Spring Rice for Cambridge. Sir John Campbell will be returned for Edinburgh without opposition. Not less than nine of the new Ministry are representatives of Scotch constituencies. It is reported that E. L. Bulwer, Esq. is shortly to be created a Baronet.

IRISH CHURCH.

Mr. Shiel gave notice that on the first day on going into a committee of supply, he would move a resolution to this effect—that no person who should hereafter be appointed to, and enter upon an ecclesiastical benefice in Ireland shall be deemed to have a vested interest in it, entitling him to compensation in the event of its being suppressed.

Sir R. Inglis would also beg to give notice that on the hon. member's making that motion, he (Sir R. I.) would move that the oath which the hon. member had taken should be read.—(Great cheering from the opposition.)

The House then adjourned, at half-past four, till Tuesday the 12th May.

Recall of Sir Howard Douglas.—Col. Sir George Berkeley, Baronet, is said to be about to receive the appointment of Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands; and, therefore, Sir Howard Douglas will be recalled before he can have entered on the duties of his office.—[Morn. Herald, April 26.]

Sir Robert Peel's speech on announcing his resignation, excites universal interest in his favor. From this daily increasing feeling I do not doubt to see him yet borne on the shoulders of the people to the helm of affairs. The working class now begin to see the difference between a prompt reformer of abuses like Peel, and a talking machine like Lord John Russell.—[Liverpool correspondent of the Montreal Herald.]

An instance of unexampled despatch occurred lately in the port of London, in the discharge and loading of a ship, 500 tons. The Hannibal, one of the American line of packet ships in the trade between London and New York, entered the St. Katherine's Dock on Wednesday afternoon, the 14th Jan., discharged a general cargo, and left the Dock for New York on the following morning, with a full cargo of British manufactures, produce, spirits, wine, iron, &c.

FRANCE.—We have received Paris papers of Sunday, in which we find an ample confirmation of all that we have hitherto advanced, relative to the difficulties in which the French Government would involve itself by the prosecution of the prisoners of April. The aspect of public affairs grows

daily more and more alarming; and if the trials be proceeded with the consequences may be dreadful indeed. At first, the only persons who opposed the trials, in a direct manner, were the more liberal among the public journalists, the ultra-Republicans, in the Chamber of Deputies, and Marshal Gerard, their President of the Council. No sooner had the retirement of Marshal Gerard from office made known to the nation the King's opinion on the subject, than the French people, (presuming that the King was only actuated by a desire to conform himself to their sentiments) manifested in a thousand ways not to be misunderstood, that the opinions of Gerard were those of the majority of the nation. When this failed of the desired effect, more direct steps were taken. Addresses poured in from every part of France, praying the King to grant an amnesty. Unfortunately for the popularity of the sovereign, it was then discovered he had personal feelings which he had resolved to gratify, despite of every impediment from without. To increase the King's perplexity, the National Guards, on the departments of the Rhone, and the Perle of almost every department have forwarded addresses, praying that an amnesty may yet be granted. Now the five millions of National Guards scattered throughout France are the right arm of the Orleans dynasty, and their support of the prisoners must, if the King proceeds in his mad career, lead to the most disastrous consequences.—Sun.

SLAVER CAPTURED.—A Spanish Slaver belonging to Havana, was lately captured near the Grand Caymans, by the English schooner of war Skirjack. She was taken by boarding, after a running fight, the English having two men killed and the Spaniards one. When she left Africa, she had on board 790 slaves, and all but 455 died on the passage. Seven of the slaves were killed and eleven wounded during the action. She was carried into Havana.

FIRE IN BOSTON.—A destructive fire broke out at about four o'clock in the afternoon of the 18th, in Blackstone-street, in the northern part of the city, by which about thirty houses, shops, and stables were destroyed. The fire caught in a carpenter's shop of Messrs. Stetson and Smith, and was occasioned by the upsetting of a spirit lamp, employed at heating a pot of glue, which instantaneously communicated the flames to every part of the building, and subsequently to the adjacent houses. A number of persons were severely hurt by the falling of the ruins, and others were much burnt. Two men and two children were reported to have lost their lives by the falling of a wall.—A number of families lost all they possessed. The losses sustained by the insurance offices in Boston on the occasion, are stated to be as follows:—Firemen's, \$12,000; Merchants', \$6,000; Mutual, \$4,000; Tremont and Commonwealth, \$2,000 each; National and Ocean, \$1,000 each; American, \$1,200; and Manufacturers', \$400.

At a fire in Front-street, New York, the wife and three children of one Mooney, a labourer, together with a person named Sweeney, from St. John, N. B., unfortunately perished in the flames.

MONTREAL, May 16.—We observe by the Quebec Official Gazette, that the meeting of the Provincial Parliament has been prorogued from the 30th inst. to the 1st July next. This, we presume, has been rendered necessary by the delay which has taken place in England in the embarkation of the High Commissioner, whose presence in the Colony, at the time of the Legislature being in session, is essential.
