

sample of Strawberries. I however on the morning following gathered about three pints, principally of those I consider as Keen's seedlings, fifty of which filled a pint measure. I had no opportunity of ascertaining their weight until the next morning when I found six of the fifty weighed 19 dwts. 10 grains, and I am well convinced in my own mind that had the same berries been weighed when first gathered, six of them would have exceeded the ounce. The plants from which this fruit was procured were set out in the autumn of 1833, consequently this is but the second year of their bearing; they were planted generally three in a stool, and at about two feet six inches distance each way—they were kept tolerably clean during the season, and their runners cut three times, but that was not enough; each plant was surrounded with a layer of moss, which has the effect of keeping the root moist and free from weeds; it also keeps the fruit clean, and forms a portion of manure to the plant when dug in with other dressing in the fall. I must remark that the runners were got from Mr. Watts' garden, but I believe I am correct in stating that the different varieties came originally from Mr. Putnam. I would further mention that I have a number of seedling Strawberries, raised from a Keen's seedling, which will in all probability produce fruit next season, the different varieties of which I shall have much pleasure in submitting to the Floral and Horticultural Society."

The varieties of Strawberries exhibited by Mr. Woolford, were Keen's seedling, the English red hautboy, the roseberry and white wood. Some other members of the Society produced fine Strawberries, but they were not exhibited for premium, on account of the known and remarkable excellence of those of Mr. Woolford; we think however they should have been shown—indeed the objects of the Society, if properly pursued, must induce every one to make the best show he can of the produce of his garden, whether he excels enough to gain a prize or not.
