LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Address of His Majesty's Legislative Council, in answer to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Speech at the opening of the Session:—

To His Excellency Major General Sir Archibald Campbell, Baronet, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.
The Humble Address of the Legislative Council in General Assembly.

May it please Your Excellency—

We thank Your Excellency for your Speech at the opening of the present Session of the Provincial Legislature; and we beg Your Excellency to accept our acknowledgments for your regard to the interests of all parts of the Country, manifested by your giving immediate effect to the Act of the last Session for increasing the representation of three of the Counties in the Province.

We join in Your Excellency's congratulation on the improved state of the Province, as compared with some years past. That the exertions of the Agricultural part of the Community have been rewarded, by a merciful Providence, with an abundant harvest, is a blessing we duly appreciate.

Extensively engaged as the Province is in Commercial pursuits, we rejoice that, notwithstanding the difficulties which have more or less assailed the public credit of countries which exercise a direct influence on the Commercial welfare of our own, so little injury has been sustained in this important arm of our prosperity.

We are happy to learn, that many useful enterprises have grown out of the present favorable state of things; and we should be glad to see the spirit of improvement extended to our Coast Fisheries, which offer to industrious, and well managed exertions, an inexhaustible source of wealth.

Our earnest attention shall be devoted to the ordinary affairs of the Province; and highly gifted as it is by nature, we feel truly sensible, that unless its resources are brought forward, and fostered, by judicious and careful measures, it cannot prosper. We shall endeavour to make our deliberations partake of that calmness, and our acts of that soundness of judgment, which are always beneficial in their effects, and will, we trust, terminate in such measures of general utility, as will merit and receive Your Excellency's assent and co-operation.

We are fully aware of the imperfections of the present Law for regulating the Statute Labour on the Public Roads, and we shall be happy to concur in such a Bill, as will remedy those evils, and effect a more judicious mode of applying it, particularly in the Towns.

Whatever matters Your Excellency may see fit to communicate to us by Message, will receive our most respectful and attentive consideration.

REPLY:
Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

I return you my best thanks for this Address, and be assured that I duly appreciate the value of that aid and support which you have promised to afford me, in furtherance of the objects recommended to your consideration.

Address of the House of Assembly:—
To His Excellency Major General Sir Archibald Campbell, Baronet, G. C. B. Lieutenant Governor, and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The humble Address of the House of Assembly.

May it please Your Excellency—

We, the Representatives of His Majesty's Loyal Subjects the People of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for the Speech you have been pleased to make at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly.

The Royal Assent to a Bill increasing the Representation of three Counties in this Province, is an additional proof of His Majesty's gracious regard for the interests of His Loyal Subjects; and we duly appreciate the promptness with which Your Excellency has carried this measure into operation.

It is a matter of great satisfaction to know that the present circumstances of the Province may be considered propitious, when compared with many past years.

The abundant harvest by which the labours of the husbandman have been re-

warded, cannot fail to excite deep feelings of gratitude to that Being from whom all blessings proceed.

That our Commercial interests stand unmoved by the embarrassments which have affected other Countries, is a circumstance, creditable as well to the exertions of the Mercantile Body as to the principles, by which these exertions have been actuated.

We hope, with Your Excellency, that all the useful Institutions now in operation, will, in their progress, prove highly beneficial to the rising spirit of enterprise, which evinces itself among all classes; but we sincerely regret that so copious a source of wealth as our Coast Fisheries, should by any improper management, be found in an unprosperous condition.

We thank Your Excellency for directing the Treasurer's Accounts to be laid before us, and we rejoice to hear that our Finances are in such a state of progressive improvement, as to enable us, by judicious management and wholesome economy, to insure prompt payment at the Treasury,—a measure absolutely necessary to render our appropriations available for the purposes intended.

We are deeply impressed with the great importance of that trust reposed in us by our fellow subjects—a trust, the duties of which, we shall best perform, by adopting (within the limits of our power) that wise and steady system of Legislation which cannot fail, under Providence, to call into action those energies and natural advantages which this Province and its inhabitants possess; and we assure Your Excellency of our firm conviction, that it is your earnest desire to adopt such measures as may conduce as well to the honor of our King as to the welfare of His Subjects, a desire with which His Majesty's Representative in this Province shall ever find the House of Assembly most ready to co-operate.

The Laws for regulating Statute Labour on the Public Roads, shall receive that attention which so important a subject demands.

Your Excellency may rely upon our sincere desire to give a candid and dispassionate consideration, to all measures which Your Excellency may, by command of His Majesty's Government, be pleased to lay before us, and also to all other measures which Your Excellency may communicate to us by special Message.

REPLY:

I thank you for this Address, and for the gratifying assurance which it contains of your readiness to devote your best attention to the consideration of the various objects recommended to your notice.

The Marquis of Londonderry is to be sent Ambassador to St. Petersburg.

The London Gazette, of Friday night, contains additional official appointments: of Sir John Becket to the office of Judge Advocate General; Lord Ellenborough, with Sir Alexander Grant, Mr. John Sullivan, and Mr. John Platts, to be Members of the India Board.

The London Gazette says that the Right Hon. Stapleton Viscount Combermere; the Right Hon. James Archibald, Lord Wharfedale; the Hon. Sir Edward Knatchbull, Bart.; Sir James Scarlett, Knight; Sir Edward Sugden, Knight; and Alexander Baring, were, by command of his Majesty, sworn of His Majesty's Most Hon. Privy Council, and took their places at the Board accordingly.

Earle de Grey, will be First Lord of the Admiralty in the room of the Earl of Aberdeen, who will be Secretary of State for the Colonial Department.

The Duke of Buccleugh goes as Lord Lieutenant to Ireland, and receives the vacant blue ribbon.

At his residence, in Queensbury, County of York, on the morning of the 20th inst, Daniel Morehouse, Esquire, in the 77th year of his age, after a most painful and lingering illness, which he endured with the most exemplary patience, fortitude and resignation. Major Morehouse was one of that band of Loyalists who, in the memorable year 1783, relinquished the hopes and expectations of youth, and came to this Province—where in the various relations of life, for the long period of half a century, he commanded universal respect and esteem. The Agency will, for the present, be chiefly confined to the usual business transactions with the Public Departments, but more especially with the Crown Land Office. There is an appointed channel through which matters unconnected with the Crown Land Office, generally pass; but it is clear that an Agent on the spot; acquainted as before mentioned, may, even here, be occasionally of use.

It is presumed that a constant residence of nine years at the Seat of Government, always in some way publicly engaged—and of which, three years were steadily spent in the Crown Land Office—must have some recommendation. Any thing further, is perhaps better left to time and experience. It should however be added, that as the Agent is wholly unconnected with, and independent of the Public Departments, he will be free to act for the interests of all who may employ him, with strict impartiality and unbiased zeal.
