

SAINT JOHN, December 19.

The Weather continues intensely and unusually cold. On Thursday, the thermometer was from 12 to 16 degrees below the zero, and on the preceding day it was nearly as cold, with a high wind, accompanied by a dense snow storm. The crews of vessels in the Bay and on the coast must suffer much during this severe weather; we regret to state several wrecks have taken place, in consequence. The steamer Maid of the Mist which generally makes the passage to or from Digby in six hours, was thirty-two in accomplishing it this week. She started from Digby at 7 o'clock on Wednesday morning with a light fair wind, having about twenty cabin passengers and a number of oxen and sheep on deck, and when about seven or eight miles from the land was met by the very cold gale and snow storm of that day, which, with the vapour, rendered the air so thick, that Capt. Reed determined, rather than risk the safety of the vessel and the lives of the passengers and crew in returning, to continue his course across the Bay. To the well known skill and judgment of Capt. R. and the good qualities of the Maid of the Mist as a sea-boat, are mainly to be attributed, under Providence, the preservation of the lives of all on board. Finding it necessary in order to avoid the danger of the Quaco Ledges and to keep her head to the wind as much as possible, to steer to the westward, they made the land at Musquash on Thursday, and got into port in the afternoon, presenting an awful spectacle of what must have been endured on board. The man at the wheel, we understand, had to be relieved every fifteen minutes; and it was impossible for the crew to keep a long look out of more than a minute or two at a time. Two of the oxen perished from the cold, and the heads of several of the others were completely covered with a thick coat of ice; none of the sheep died, although equally exposed, and their coating of ice much thicker than that on the oxen. The passengers speak in unmeasured terms of the exertions of Capt. Reed and all his crew during the whole of the time they were exposed to the raging elements.—*Cour.*

FIRE.—On Tuesday afternoon the brig Edwin, owned by Messrs. E. Barlow & Sons, lying in Adams' slip, York Point, was discovered to be on fire, but by means of the prompt and persevering exertions of a large number of persons who were immediately assembled, the devouring element was arrested in its progress, but not before it had partly destroyed the interior of the cabin, (where it originated) and otherwise injured the vessel. Melancholy to relate, the cook of the Edwin, Francis Paul, a native of Yorkshire, England, lost his life.—*Gazette.*
