been sustained, and thence, stepping from the machine, he traversed the spire by means of the brackets. The injury done to the stone work is stated to be considerable, as was to be expected from a stroke sufficiently violent to displace the masonry, as previously described.—It is said, however, that a sufficient repair will be effected without the necessity of taking down any portion of the spire.

Captain Dickson, 25th Regiment, has invented a cloak, weighing but fourteen ounces, for general use in the army. It is intended to fit on between the soldier's knapsack and mess-tin, and will effectively keep him from wet.

We have very great pleasure in noticing the arrival some days since at this port, from the Thames, of H. M. Packet Steamer, *Star*, Lieut. Binney, being the first of the improved description of vessels built expressly for the packet service, upon the plan of the present surveyor of the Navy, Capt. Symonds, since the introduction of his successful trial ship, the *Pandora*. This splendid craft, which is larger than the *Pandora*, is rigged as a bark, and measures 359 tons, (125 more than the old class,) is seven feet two inches high fore and aft between decks, and draws no more water with all her stores on board than the tea gun brig—she is very handsome in appearance, proves a good sea boat as far as she has been tried, and from the testimony of several nautical gentlemen, we prognosticate that she will answer fully for dispatch as a mail boat, and for affording every comfort and accommodation to passengers. The *Linnet*, will soon be ready to come down, and when followed by others that are building, we shall be able to congratulate the commercial interests of the kingdom upon the packet establishment being composed for the most part of a class of ships combining in a preeminent degree, dispatch, accommodation and safety.—*Falmouth paper*.

RUSSIA.—According to accounts from Hamburg of the 23d of June, brought by the captain of a merchant vessel from Cronstadt, the Russian government had in the previous month discovered a conspiracy against the Emperor and the State, organized by the same persons who were similarly implicated in 1826, but were not brought to trial. More than 60 persons have been arrested at St. Petersburg and the provinces. The matter is kept a secret; and, lest it should be communicated abroad, all letters are opened at the foreign post-office. Several of the conspirators have fled, and the police and custom officers have received instructions to look after and apprehend them. The cause of this plot was the breaking up of the school of military cadets, whose pupils were all sent to the regiments stationed in Siberia and the Caucasus as common soldiers. Some regiments of the Imperial guard shared the same fate. The Polish General Krukowiecki, who at the last war in Poland surrendered the city of Warsaw, escaped from the place of his residence. The Prussian police received orders to arrest him, but accounts from the grand duchy of Posen announce that he had been for several weeks in that province with a false passport, which was furnished by a friend.

Glasgow papers to the 9th July were received at Miramichi last week, by the arrival of the Ship *Marchioness of Queensbury*, in 23 days from the Clyde.

The official returns of the revenue and expenditure of the country, for the year and quarter ending the 5th July, have been published.—On these, the *Glasgow Courier* remarks—"It is far from agreeable to our feelings to rejoice over the misfortunes of these islands, even although they should be caused by the free-trade nostrums of a party politically opposed to us. We therefore content ourselves with merely announcing the fact, that on the year there is a deficiency of £1,758,386; and on the quarter, as compared with the corresponding period of last year, a defalcation of £656,407."

Accounts from the Cape of Good Hope are to the 11th May. The war with the natives was considered to be at an end, the confederacy among the hostile chiefs being broken up. The Colonial forces had recaptured 15,000 head of cattle, and 3,000 more were daily expected.

The telegraphic despatch published by the French government announces

that the Queen's army, amounting to 20,000 men, entered Bilbao on the 1st, without any engagement, and that the head quarters of Don Carlos were established at Onate.

The French Government appears to have changed its intentions with respect to the auxiliary army to be sent into Spain. The Prefect of the Seine informed all persons who applied to be enrolled that counter orders had been issued, and that he was not authorized to accept any offer of engagement.

The Paris Papers of Saturday contain no domestic intelligence, except some further reports of the trial of the prisoners before the Court of Peers. The speech of one of them, named La Grange, has excited a great sensation. The Peers appear much puzzled how to act, but the majority are evidently disposed to punish the accused, and of course they will find some method of putting their disposition into effect.—*Stand.*
