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Madrid June 3.—The capital is perfectly tranquil. Nothing remarkable from the Provinces, except those which are unfortunately the theatre of civil war.

Bordeaux, June 12.—We have received by the extraordinary conveyance, news from Lisbon to the 27th May, which announces an important change in the Ministry. On the 25th the Queen charged the Marquis of Saldanha with the formation of a new Ministry, and on the 27th he formed it as follows:

Saldanha, President of the Council and Minister of War—the Duke of Palmella, Minister of Foreign Affairs—Marquis de Loule, Marine—Francisco Antonio de Compos, Finance—Juan de Sousa Pinto de Magalhães, Interior—Manuel Antonio Carvalho, Justice and Worship.

These names, known and honored in the patriotic annals of the country, have been received by the whole population with acclamations of joy.

The *Courier de l'Isere* announces that the manufactures of Lyons are at this moment in full work, and so numerous are the orders for silk goods for America, that at present not one half of them can be executed. A rise in wages has taken place in consequence.

From English papers to the 16th June, A long debate had taken place in the House of Peers on the subject of the appointment of Earl Gosford as Governor General of the Canadas.—From what fell from Lord Glenelg of the Cabinet, it appears that Earl Gosford is to be accompanied by two Commissioners, and that the three are to decide on the grievances complained of by the Canadians.

In England, measures of continually increasing efficiency are adopting to succour the Queen of Spain, whose situation appears to become daily more critical. Recruiting parties for her service are distributed throughout the kingdom. Admiral Napier has offered to take the command of the Queen's fleet, and General Bacon who had served with distinction in the Portuguese army has volunteered to join her army.

Government has adopted an important measure in aid of the cause of the Queen of Spain. A royal proclamation appeared in the *Gazette* of the 9th, granting permission, for the period of two years, to all persons desirous of entering the military or naval service of her Majesty Isabelle the second, Queen of Spain, to enter such service either as a commissioned or non commissioned officer, or as a private soldier, sailor or marine, and to accept any commission, warrant or other appointment from or under her, and to enlist in such service, and to accept any money, pay, or reward for the same.

The London *Courier* says that it is proposed to raise fourteen battalions of infantry, three of artillery, and one of riflemen. The principal recruits were to be raised in Devonshire, Lancashire and Ireland, and it was expected that a portion of the force would be despatched in a fortnight.

It appears also that the French government had given leave to the officers of the French army to enter the Queen's service, and that a corps of 12 or 1500 men had already been enrolled in the Pyrenees.

SLAVE TRADE.—Lord Brougham said that he understood there were in the Mauritius 30,000 slaves, the greater part of whom had been imported there subsequently to the passing of the law prohibiting that traffic. He wished to know whether any steps had been taken to ascertain what number of slaves had been so imported; and next, whether any measures had been adopted to render it impossible for any one of the slaves so imported from being taken into account, in awarding the compensation paid to slave proprietors, under the emancipation act.

Lord Glenelg had no doubt of their having been illegal importations of slaves into the Mauritius: but he had no means of judging of the numbers so imported. The great difficulty in the case was this—that there had been no illegal importation of slaves for the last fifteen years into the Mauritius, whatever might have occurred before. This had been ascertained from persons appointed to investigate the subject.

Lord Brougham must say, that if we were to pay £500,000 or 600,000 in respect of illegally imported slaves, it would be one of the most hateful operations ever perpetrated in the financial concerns of this country.

LATE FROM SPAIN.—The brig *Millon*, Captain S. Killam, of this port arrived on Friday last, in 34 days from Bilbao. Capt. K. relates the following particulars respecting the war between the Queen and Don Carlos. The troops of the former amounted to about 45,000,

of whom only 5000 were stationed in the town (Bilboa,) in command of the cannon; while the army of the latter, amounting, it was supposed, to about 20,000, could be seen on the mountains surrounding the town, and was in possession of the greater part of the musketry. A party of 10,000 of the Queen's troops, mistaking a party of the enemy for that of the former, were suddenly attacked, and obliged to retreat, with the loss of 1000 men taken. A British steamer had arrived with troops and ammunition, and a body of 60,000 French troops were hourly expected from Bayonne, to assist the Queen.—The morning the *Millon* left after getting about four miles down the river, she grounded, and hearing the noise of cannon, Capt. K. proceeded towards the town, but when within a short distance, finding that a severe engagement had taken place, he returned on board. The Carlists had taken a gun boat.—A British man of war, and the steamer, were lying off the harbour, to go up at high water.—*Yarmouth (Nova Scotia) Herald*, July 24.

FLORAL AND HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.—The unpleasant weather on the 24th ult. was lamented, as it prevented the attendance of many at the weekly meeting, and was of course unfavorable to a show of either fruits, flowers, or vegetables. We regret to say, the same cause prevented a private match in seedling Sweet Williams between three members of the Society, which would have come off that day but for the weather, and we fear the incessant rains since then will prevent entirely this interesting competition.

The weather did not, however, prevent us from ranging through the gardens of Mr. Woolford and Mr. Watts; where, among other objects of attraction, many seedling Pinks delighted our eyes by their various and novel hue. Some of them amused us much as freaks of nature "in her hours of dalliance," and we noticed particularly on the same stock flowers of the most beautiful crimson, with others of snowy whiteness, fringed with a delicate crimson edge.

The finest flower we saw was a magnificent Dahlia in Mr. Woolford's garden. It stands high on the stock above the foliage, and displays its Royal raiment unhidden by leaves. Its form approaches nearer to a hemisphere than any of the sort we have ever seen; its outline forms a perfect circle. Its colour is a deep deep purple, and for size we never saw it equalled—its diameter is 5½ inches. It was imported from Colville's Gardens, near London, and bears the name of *Colville's Dahlia perfecta*. This beautiful Dahlia was again an object of attraction on Saturday the 1st instant, when many gay flowers, native as well as exotic, were exhibited, but we are not authorized to mention any particularly. We cannot, however, conclude this without remarking, that the Dahlia now bears five gorgeous blossoms and fifteen buds, which promise to become equally beautiful flowers—and we think they will bloom successively until our old enemy Jack Frost gives his dread quietus to every flower in our gardens.

Mem. Those who have favorite Gooseberries to show, will, we think, meet competitors on Saturday next. One of the plants presented by Captain Douglas, of the *Brig La Plata*, from the West Indies, will probably then be in full blossom.—*Communicated*.

On Thursday the 23d day of July, an Inquest was held at Magersville, before G. B. Covert, Coroner, upon view of the Body of a man found floating with the current, and who, from appearance, had been a long time drowned. No evidence being adduced of the name of the deceased, or in what way he came to his death,—a verdict was returned accordingly. The following is a description of his clothing, person, &c.—He was about five feet eight inches high, homespun flannel shirt, no Jacket on, dark colored Waistcoat, of coarse cloth, white flannel Drawers, twilled Trowsers, of cotton and wool, coarse Shoes, his feet in quite a putrid state.—*Com.*
