The Petitioner of the Parish of Humbly Sheweth—

That he is a British Subject, and prays that a Licence may be granted him to cut Timber on the undermentioned Tract of Crown Land; such Licence to continue in force for the term of Five Years, from the 1st day of May, 1835—and during the said term your Petitioner pledges himself to pay the duty on not less a quantity of Timber than annually, unless the Timber becomes exhausted, when he will resign the Licence.

The situation he wishes to obtain is situated as follows:—
(If surveyed, the Lot or Lots to be described; if not surveyed, the courses and distances around the Tract he wishes to have, to be described.)

He pledges himself to keep a correct register of the Timber and Lumber obtained under the Licence now prayed for, and to exhibit the same to the proper Officer when required, and at the Crown Land Office annually, on the 24th day of June; and he will comply with all regulations to be observed by Persons cutting Timber or Lumber on Berths licensed to them in the manner now prayed for. with full power and authority to cut Timber and Lumber, within the said bounds, during the continuation of this Licence, subject to the Regulations hereunto annexed and under the terms and conditions in those Regulations contained.

This Licence to continue in force (unless resigned by the said) for the term of Five Years, from the 1st day of May, 1835, and no longer; and after which time no Timber or Lumber is to be cut or hauled out, under pretence thereof.

REGULATIONS.

The within named is required to pay duty at the Crown Land Office on tons of White Pine Timber annually, at the rate of Two Shillings per ton, and in the following instalments, viz. the sum of on the 24th day of June, the further sum of on the 24th day of December in the same year, and the residue, being on the 24th day of June in the following year, at which time and place he is required to exhibit an attested account, showing the total quantity of Timber and Lumber removed from the within described Berth during the preceding Twelve Months, and if he shall have removed a greater quantity than tons of White Pine Timber, he will then and there pay duty on such excess at the rate of 2s. 6d. per ton, for Red Pine Timber; 2s. per ton, for White Pine; 4s. per thousand feet, for Mill Lumber; and 10 per cent. on the current value of all other descriptions of Lumber in the market.

2. He is required to mark on each stick its number and contents, and to keep a register of the same in the camp; which register must be produced when required by any Seizing Officer, duly qualified; and he must also mark each stick as follows: such mark to be distinctly placed within triangles on three sides of the stick, near both ends, and all private marks must be placed near the centre of the stick.

3. He will be allowed to resign this Licence at the expiration of any one year, by giving three months previous notice and producing a certificate that the Timber is exhausted.

4. He must in all cases give Bonds, with one or two Sureties, to the King, for the payment of the duty and the faithful performance of all the conditions of the Licence.

5. He will be required to state on the 1st day of May, the quantity he intends cutting in that year, and pay duty accordingly; but he will be allowed to correct the quantity applied for within the year, and pay up the balance of tonnage, but in no case is the Timber to be cut before applying and paying instalments for the same.

N.B.—As much good would result from a uniformity of Surveying the Berths, Petitioners should, as much as possible, describe the Tracts they wish to occupy, by lines running north and south—east and west.

DUBLIN, Jan. 3.—Murder of Mr. Foote.

An account reached town this morning, announcing the murder of Mr. Foote, yesterday, within sight of his own dwelling at Rossbercon, on the Kilkenny side of New Ross, which is in the county of Wexford. It may be recollected that about this time twelve months, this unfortunate gentleman, who had reached his 72d year, was waylaid and fired at in the same place. He was then so severely wounded that his life had been for some weeks despaired of; and he had but recently fully recovered from the effects of the injuries then inflicted upon him. It is stated that as he was passing through a small lane immediately adjacent his own house, about three o'clock yesterday afternoon, he was attacked by some ruffians, who murdered him in the most brutal manner. His brains were literally beaten out with stones. His lifeless and mutilated body was quite cold when it was discovered by his servants. At the time of the murder, four of Mr. Foote's labourers were working in a field a short distance from the scene of slaughter. The town of New Ross is merely divided from the village of Rossbercon by a river. The tragical event had caused great consternation in the entire neighbourhood. When the post last night, five persons were in custody, charged on suspicion.—Mr. Foote was a member of the Irish Bar, but had not practised for many years. He was brother of the late Lundy Foote, the principal of the well known firm of snuff manufacturers in this city. On the occasion of the previous attack on the life of this ill-fated gentleman, the outrage was ascribed to conspiracy against him connected with land letting.

The news from the north of Spain, though it announces no new event of great importance, yet it represents the affairs of the insurgents as all but desperate. The latter

appeared to be so weakened and dispirited by their recent reverses, that they had been unable ever since to withstand at any point, and had fled in the utmost confusion on the approach of their opponents. Discord had also broken out in their ranks, and every thing seemed to indicate that as soon as the weather would permit Mina to carry on a regular plan of operations, he would soon add to his former exploits that of terminating this most unnatural contest.

In Portugal every thing goes on well.—Senor Carvalho is enjoying his well deserved popularity. In consequence of his frankness and the honesty of his financial administration, the credit of Portugal now stands almost on a par with that of France or England. The annual allowance for the Royal Family at Portugal is fixed at the moderate sum of £115,000, and the minister has only asked £25,000 additional, to defray the approaching royal marriage. The queen is very popular in Lisbon, and the moderation shown in pecuniary matters by the royal family, together with the excellent conduct of M. Carvalho, convince all those who understand the real interest of the country, that its happiness will be best promoted by tranquillity and loyalty. But the factious Miguelites are unquestionably strong in some of the provinces, and are abetted by the factious priests, so that should Carlos' party make any successful stand in Spain, or be in the least degree assisted by Tory Ministers in England, the Miguelites might throw Portugal again into the most unhappy confusion.

China Trade.—The letters received by the ship Star, at Calcutta, confirm the news of the English trade at Canton having been stopped. Letters from the supercargo of the Star say that Canton letters have been received at Calcutta to Aug. 20th. They state that trade was suspended on the 17th, in consequence of Lord Napier having demanded a personal audience of the Viceroy. The letters add that most of the Hong merchants were bankrupt. The supercargo of the Star is a son of the owner, and well acquainted with the affairs of China.—N. Y. Journal of Commerce.

Latest from Canton.—British Trade reopened.—The whale ship Illinois brings papers from the Cape of Good Hope, to Dec. 27th. These papers contain Canton dates to the middle of October, which state, that all impediments to the foreign trade generally were removed on the 23d of Sept. and that the British trade was reopened on the 27th. Lord Napier took a course on this occasion to which the Chinese have been unaccustomed. Two British ships of war were ordered, in violation of the Chinese interdiction, to go up to the Bogue. The Chinese batteries opened a fire upon them, which was returned by the ships, and the batteries very soon destroyed. The Chinese then withdrew their interdict and submitted to the restoration of trade. A vessel, which left Canton on the 14th of October, brought a report that Lord Napier had died there in the early part of that month.—Ibid.

HALIFAX, Feb. 21.—On Tuesday evening last, the temperature of the atmosphere became unusually mild, with the wind at S.E. and about half-past ten o'clock we experienced one of the most awful thunder storms ever known in this country at this season of the year. Rain which usually descends in torrents upon these occasions was, however, an exception, but the lightning surpassed anything we have ever witnessed. The thunder that followed each discharge of the electrical fluid, continued to roll until a succeeding flash gave it renewed vigor. The night was extremely dark, and when the lightning appeared, the horizon was illuminated with a sulphurous flame, which for a few moments dazzled the sight.—Acadian Recorder.

We have been favored with a copy of the following document, which we have permission to publish. Most of our readers in this place are already acquainted with the circumstances to which it has reference.

DISTRICT GENERAL ORDER.

At a District Court Martial, held in this Garrison on the 5th instant, Private Samuel Townley, (No. 143,) of the 34th Regiment, was arraigned upon the following Charges, viz.:

1. "For conduct highly disgraceful to the character of a British Soldier, and subversive of good order to society, in being accessory in surreptitiously obtaining from the office of the Provincial Secretary a certain document, (a Marriage Licence), to be used by him under a signed name, on the 19th February, 1835.

2. "For having under such signed name used the document in question.

3. "For fraudulently causing or conniving, through the medium of some persons unknown, some legal Bonds to be entered into, for the purpose of carrying into effect the deception for which he obtained the document in question.

Upon which charges, the Court came to the following decision.

"That the Prisoner, Private Samuel Townley, (No. 143,) 34th Regiment, is guilty of the charges preferred against him; and does therefore sentence him to suffer solitary imprisonment in the cells of this Garrison for the space of two months."

His Excellency the Major General Commanding is pleased to confirm the finding and sentence of the Court, and directs the same to be forthwith carried into effect.

We understand the Marriage for which the above Licence was procured, was the one lately announced as having been solemnized by the Rev. Mr. BYRMIER,

between Samuel Sesson and Margaret Evinston, whose proper name is E. S. field; she having been before married to a man of that name, who is supposed to be now living in the United States. We also understand that the Persons who signed the Bond in question have been since discovered, and will be subject to legal prosecution.

Two Persons have been already convicted in this Province of similar offences, and are now suffering the penalty for their transgressions—which we hope may prove a salutary caution to others.
