1834, that it was not the intention of His Majesty's Government to propose to Parliament any alteration in those Duties affecting the Timber and Deal Trade of that year, and that no step will be taken without the fullest consideration of the Colonial interests involved.

Experience has proved, that so long as this highly important question is involved in doubt and uncertainty, prudent persons will be deterred from investing capital in the establishment of Mills of approved construction, Stores, Wharves, and other works requisite for conducting the trade in those articles extensively and advantageously.

The building of Mills, fitted with machinery manufactured in the Mother Countries, would have the effect of greatly improving the quality of Deals and all other kinds of sawed Lumber in these Colonies; and there can be no doubt that the Trade in these articles or in squared Timber never can be carried on to the greatest advantage of which it is susceptible, either to the parent State or to these Colonies, unless those concerned in it are assured, that no change unfavourable to the North American Colonies will be made, until time shall have been given for reasonable profit to be derived from the capital to be invested in such establishments.

We need not enlarge on the policy, the vital importance, of fostering a trade, the healthy and hardy character of which affords the best nursery for Seamen—which employs upwards of two thousand sail of British Shipping—offers cheap transport and immediate employment to vast numbers of Emigrants—secures an increased and a continually increasing consumption of British manufactures—and which so manifestly and powerfully tends to strengthen the ties that bind us to the Parent State; for we have the most confident expectation that the consideration which your Majesty's Government will give to interests so vast and important, both in a Colonial and National point of view, must lead to the rejection of the solicitations of those who desire a change that would prove ruinous to the Colonies, and beneficial only to Foreign Countries, and the comparatively few British merchants who are commercially connected with those Countries.

Craving leave to refer to former petitions of the Council and Assembly, laid before your Majesty in the years 1831, and 1833, respectively, it now only remains for us, most humbly to entreat your Majesty, that this subject so important to the mercantile and manufacturing interests and to the maritime power of the United Kingdom, as well as to the prosperity of the North American Colonies, may receive the most serious consideration, and that no change in the scale of duties on Timber and Deals, unfavourable to British interests, may be made.

And as in duty bound will ever pray, &c.

The Commissioners of Light Houses think it their duty to publish the following letter, received from Mr. Bergen, and will draw the attention of the Legislature to the subject when they next meet.—The Canadas, Prince Edward Island, and this Province, are all deeply interested in this matter, as well as Nova Scotia; and Great Britain having withdrawn the support which she for some years afforded towards the establishment at Sable Island; it becomes the duty of the Provinces to adopt such measures as well render the lodging and sustenance of unfortunate persons thrown on the Island, as well as the building and supporting necessary Light Houses, a charge on the whole.—In any such case, the first steps must be taken by Nova Scotia, and we feel satisfied that they will be met by this Province, with assistance and thanks.

GENTLEMEN—

My residence at Sable Island has afforded me many opportunities of observing the disastrous consequences which have arisen from a want of two good light houses on that Island. Being well convinced of the advantages to be gained from them, I feel it an imperative duty, due not only to all friends engaged in maritime affairs, but to my fellow-creatures, to lay this matter before you, and earnestly press it upon your attention, and that of your government.

The record of known disasters at the Island, kept by Mr. Joseph Darby, the Superintendent, is replete with the history of cases in which large amounts of property have been sacrificed, and innumerable lives lost, owing to the want of lights to warn the voyager of his proximity to destruction.—Many of these cases may have fallen under your notice. I shall therefore mention only the loss of the brig *Atigail*, of Boston, with seven lives, and the narrow escape of the schr. *Grecian*, of Bucksport. These were vessels employed about the wreck of the ship *Eagle*; they struck on the north west bar in a heavy gale, the weather being so clear that they could have seen a light, had there been one, and thus have escaped. In this opinion I am confirmed by some nautical gentlemen of great experience, who were with me on the Island at the time, and by the statement of the Captain of the *Grecian*.

I have the pleasure to hand you a copy of Mr. Darby's Chart of the Island, furnishing an account of some of the principal wrecks—the record above alluded to, furnishes as many more.—These cases, where the particulars are known, are frightful; but how much more horrible the loss of lives where nothing is ever known, excepting that fragments of wrecks and of passengers clothing have come on shore.

I have learned that the Underwriters and Merchants of the United States contemplate making an application to their own government, that a proposal may be made to the British Government to allow the United States to build and support two Light Houses. But as the liberality of the Govern-

ments of the Provinces, as well as of Great Britain is proverbial, in all cases of this class where the matter is fairly placed in view, I cannot believe that a recommendation from yourself, with the strong proofs and arguments your information could furnish, would be for a moment neglected—and thus render an application through the United States unnecessary.

I have already brought this subject before the Commissioners of Light Houses for Nova Scotia, and shall be happy to know that a conjoint effort will be made.

So strongly am I convinced of the advantages to be derived to the Commercial world from the location of good lights on the Island, that I may candidly say, that any trouble I may undergo in forwarding this object, will be deemed a pleasure.

NEW STEAM BOAT.—The Steam Boat belonging to Messrs. John Hammond, W. Vaughan and D. J. McLaughlin, was launched, yesterday from the ship yard of Messrs. W. & J. Olive, in Carleton. She makes a handsome appearance on the water, and from the long established character of the Messrs. Olive, for producing first rate vessels, this Boat is expected fully to sustain their well earned fame. She is, we learn, 146 feet keel, and about 160 feet length on deck; breadth of beam 24 feet, independent of the wings.—*Id*.

On Tuesday last, a Coroner's Inquest was held on view of the body of Michael Rigney, Butcher, whose remains were found early in the morning on the beach near the south end of Charlotte street. After a tedious investigation, the Jury brought in a verdict, "that the deceased came to his death from causes unknown."

It is rather singular that no proof could be obtained, or report even of Mr. Rigney's track, subsequent to his parting company with two respectable individuals near the Golden Ball, at about 5 o'clock in the afternoon of Monday.—*St. John Courier*, November 14.

CHURCH COMMISSION.

We direct the attention of our readers to an important conversation which occurred in the Presbytery of Edinburgh yesterday, respecting the Church Commission. Much clamor has been raised throughout the country, on the ground that the instructions issued by government to the Commission, were trenching upon the constitution of our national Church; and an extraordinary meeting of the Assembly Commission has been called for Wednesday next, to consider this very important subject, the public will therefore be glad to learn, on the authority of Dr. Leg—and a higher authority on all matters connected with the constitution of the Church, we believe does not exist within her bounds, that the instructions issued to the commissioners by His Majesty's Government do not in the slightest degree touch upon the limits assigned to the temporal power in matters ecclesiastical by the acknowledged standards of the Church. It has all along appeared to us, that the friends of the Church have pursued a wrong course with regard to this commission. Their policy was to have afforded the Commissioners all the assistance in their power; to manifest no jealousy of them; and then, if they abused their powers, the Church might, with a good grace, complain of their conduct. But, as it is, any complaint on the part of the Church, is apt to be received with caution throughout the country, as springing from ill feeling previously manifested, rather than from any just cause. We trust, however, that the all but unanimous opinion of a body of so much weight as the Edinburgh Presbytery in favour of the legality of the instructions issued to the Commission, together with the additional instructions mentioned by Dr. Dickson, will go far to remove those unpleasant feelings, and the Assembly Commission, on their meeting next week, will find it inexpedient, at present, to move farther into the matter.—*Edinburgh Observer*.
