

kinds, Buckwheat excepted, Grass Seeds and all other kind of Seeds and Plants, Hides, Horse Hair, Horns, Hemp, Indigo, Iron, India Rubber, Indian Corn, Liquors (otherwise charged with duty), Lumber of all kinds, Leaf Tobacco, Lignumvite, Mahogany Logs or Boards, Meats (dried or salted), Mill Saws, Oats, Pitch, Peas, Rosin, Rice, Rye, Salt, Tar, Turpentine, Tallow, Tea, Vinegar, Wheat.

For and upon all articles of the manufacture of the United Kingdom, imported or brought into this Province whether by sea or inland carriage, or navigation, or which may be saved from any wrecked or stranded ship or vessel, for every hundred pounds of the real value thereof, the sum of two pounds ten shillings; excepting nevertheless:

Anchors, Barley (not or pearl), Beef, Bacon, Books (printed), Bread, Bunting, Coals, Copper (bolt and sheet), Copper Spikes and Nails, Canvas, Coal Tar, Cordage, Duck, Felt patent, Fishing Nets, Fishing Lines and Twines, Flour and Meal of all kinds, Iron (bolt, square, flat, pig or sheet), Iron Block Bushes, Loaf or refined Sugar (otherwise charged with duty), Lead, (bar and sheet), Mineral Salt, Malt, Machinery for mills or steam boats, Mathematical Instruments of all kinds, Maps, Oakum, Pork, Printing Pa-

per, Steel, Salt, Spikes and Sheathing Nails, Sticks tackle and apparel, Sheathing Paper, Tin in sheets or blocks, Zinc.

For and upon all Leather or any article made of Leather, and on Malt Liquor, not being of Foreign manufacture or the manufacture of the United Kingdom, imported or brought into this Province, five pounds for and upon every one hundred pounds of the value thereof at the place of the last shipment;

And for and upon all articles manufactured of Silk or Cotton in the British East India Possessions, upon Pepper and all description of Spices from whatever place imported, two pounds ten shillings upon every one hundred pounds of the value of the said articles at the place of the last shipment.

All which duties shall be paid by the importer or importers of such articles respectively, notwithstanding any duties which are or may be imposed and collected under any Act or Acts of the Imperial Parliament, and shall be and shall be drawn back on exportation or warehousing in the way and manner provided by an Act of the present Session of the General Assembly for collecting the Revenue of the Province.

II. And be it further enacted, That all goods which have been warehoused in this Province before this Act comes into operation, and which shall remain so warehoused after the operation thereof commences, and on which the Provincial duties heretofore imposed have not been paid or secured by a subsisting or continuing security, shall in lieu of all former duties become liable to and be charged with the Provincial duties hereby imposed on the like goods and merchandise.

III. And be it further enacted, That when any articles that shall have been warehoused or on which duties have been paid under this or any other or previous Act, shall be exported for the use of the deep sea or whale fisheries, the amount of such duties shall be repaid to the exporter by the Treasurer or Deputy Treasurer, or the warehouse bond cancelled, on affidavit of the exporter of the same having been so exported for the use aforesaid.

IV. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force until the first day of April which shall be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

WEDNESDAY, 16th March.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported, that he had addressed His Excellency to the following effect:—

"May it please Your Excellency, The Assembly, during the present Session, have anxiously devoted their time and attention to such measures as appeared necessary to give a proper direction to the spirit of enterprise which has of late been so actively manifested in various parts of the Province.

"The enactments of this Session will, I confidently hope, lead to the introduction of wealth, to the increase of Commerce, to extensive internal improvements, and to the encouragement and prosperity of every branch of industry.

"Such amendments have been made to the Law, as will, it is believed, render the attainment of justice more easy and certain than heretofore.

"The Assembly, in addition to other important services, have granted large sums for opening and improving Roads and erecting Bridges: by the judicious application of these grants, great facilities will be afforded to the settlement and improvement of the Country, and to the advancement of Agriculture; and I feel assured that Your Excellency will adopt such wise measures for expending these grants as will give full effect to the intentions of the Assembly, and realize the expectations and wishes of the People.

"The Assembly have passed a Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services: A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Services therein mentioned: A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges: and A Bill imposing Duties upon certain articles imported into this Province for the purpose of Revenue.

"These Bills I now present, in the name and in behalf of His Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Assembly, and humbly pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to assent to them."

His Excellency was then pleased to give his assent to the several Bills presented by the House, and also to thirty-four others. His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:—

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"The subjects of your deliberations, during the present Session, have been more numerous and important than any heretofore laid before the General Assembly of this Province, and it is earnestly to be hoped that the various Acts that have emanated therefrom, and to which I have given my assent, may tend in their operation to the further prosperity of His Majesty's loyal subjects in this already highly flourishing, happy and contented Colony.

"In now relieving you from your laborious duties, I rely with confidence upon your encouraging and promoting, by your individual influence, among the people at large, those feelings of attachment to our excellent Constitution, and of dutiful affection to our gracious Sovereign, for which the inhabitants of New Brunswick have ever been conspicuous."

His Honor the President of the Legislative Council then said,

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued until the third Tuesday in June next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the third Tuesday in June next, then here to be holden."

The following Abstract of, and observations upon the Charter of the Central Fire Insurance Company has been handed to us by the Gentleman who prepared the Bill. We insert it for the information of persons in distant parts of the Province, who may be anxious to ascertain the provisions of the Bill, which, from the number of laws passed during the Session of the Legislature, may not be published for several weeks.

Sec. 1. Is the usual incorporating clause.

Sec. 2. Provides that the Capital shall consist of £50,000, one fifth to be paid within six months and the remainder to be paid when the Directors may require; the whole to be divided into 5000 Shares of £10 each.

Sec. 3. Authorizes the Corporation to call for a deposit of not less than 2 nor exceeding 5 per cent, previous to the election of Directors, and expressly disqualifies all the subscribers for Stock, who shall not have paid in the said deposit, from voting for Directors.

Sec. 4. Provides that the Stockholders shall, within six months, pay one fifth of their Stock, and give good security by bond, with two or more Sureties, for the remaining four fifths.

Sec. 5. Authorizes the calling of the first Meeting for the enactment of Bye Laws, and election of Directors.

Sec. 6. Provides for the holding of the annual meeting for election of Directors on the first Tuesday in March in each year.

Sec. 7. Invests the Directors with full power to manage the concerns of the Corporation and pay the Officers and Servants.

Sec. 8. Enacts that three Directors shall constitute a Quorum for the transaction of business.

Sec. 9. Enacts that no Director shall receive a salary, but that the Stockholders may make compensation to the President.

Sec. 10. Enacts that 20 Shares shall be the qualification of a Director.

Sec. 11. Authorizes Stockholders to vote at all Meetings by proxy, no Stockholder holding more than five proxies, and apportion the votes the same as in the Mechanics' Whale Fishing Company.

Sec. 12. Provides for the election of Directors at any other day when they have not been elected at the annual Meeting, due notice being previously given.

Sec. 13. Enacts that when the sum of £10,000 shall have been paid in and counted by Commissioners, the Directors may commence operations.

Sec. 14. Gives the Corporation general authority to Insure.

Sec. 15. Requires that all Policies entered into by Agents shall be countersigned by them.

Sec. 16. Authorizes the Directors to make semi-annual dividends.

Sec. 17. Authorizes the Corporation to hold real estate to any amount not exceeding £5000.

Sec. 18. Authorizes the Directors to invest the Capital Stock of the Company in such public or corporate funds or joint companies as they may deem advisable, or to lend the same to individuals for a period not less than a year by Bond, Bill, Note or otherwise.

Sec. 19. Restrains the Directors from dividing more than 12 per cent. per annum, till the surplus Fund and Capital Stock amount to £25,000.

Sec. 20. Authorizes the Directors to loan the surplus Fund for a period exceeding a year.

Sec. 21. Restrains the Corporation from Banking.

Sec. 22. Enacts that the Shares and Stock shall be assignable.

Sec. 23. Enacts that the Directors shall be liable for all losses that may occur with any policy of insurance effected by them, after the Company has sustained loss to an amount equal to its Capital Stock.

Sec. 24. Enacts that the Capital Stock shall alone be responsible for the debts of the Company.

Sec. 25. Provides for the renewal of the Securities given for Stock as often as the Directors may require.

Sec. 26. Enacts that no Stockholder shall have any right to inspect the account of any individual with the Company.

Sec. 27. Requires the Directors to lay before the Stockholders, at the Annual Meeting, a complete statement of the affairs of the Company.

Sec. 28. Enacts that the affairs of the Company may be at any time examined by a Committee of the Council and Assembly.

Sec. 29. Enacts that 20 Stockholders, proprietors of 1000 Shares, may call a General Meeting of the Company, for ordinary purposes.

Sec. 30. Enacts that 30 Stockholders, proprietors of 3,500 Shares, may call a General Meeting for the purpose of dissolving the Company.

Sec. 31. Requires an Annual Statement of the affairs of the Corporation to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Province, for the use of the Legislature.

Sec. 32. Restrains the Corporation from Insuring more than £200,000 within this Province without the Stockholders being liable therefor.

Sec. 33. Limitation Clause.
