LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Tuesday, 20th December, 1836.
At 12 o'clock, precisely, His Excel-
lency the Lieutenant Governor proce-
ded in State to the Council Chamber,
and being seated on the Throne, the
Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was
directed to command the attendance of
the House of Assembly; the House at-
tended accordingly, and His Excellency
was pleased to deliver the following
Speech to both Houses:—

Mr. President, and Honourable Gentlemen of the
Legislative Council;
Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly;

In obedience to commands from His
Majesty's Government, I have called
you together at this unusual, and I fear
to many of you, inconvenient season of
the year, in order to lay before you, as
I am directed to do, with as little delay
as practicable, some important Des-
patches, in answer to the Address of
the House of Assembly respecting the
surrender of the Casual and Territorial
Revenue—copies of which shall be com-
municated at an early period.

The arrangements proposed by His
Majesty's Government, and which are
particularly detailed in these Despatches,
involve questions in which the welfare
of this Province is materially concerned;
and I therefore have to express my hope
that you will give to the subject that
calm consideration which its importance
demands, and that the result of your
deliberations may tend to the advance-
ment and permanent benefit of this ri-
sing and happy portion of His Majesty's
Dominions.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly,

I shall direct the Treasurer's accounts
and such other papers as may be neces-
sary for your information to be pre-
pared and laid before you, as soon as
possible; but as the close of the year is
so near at hand, it will perhaps be de-
sirable that they should be made up as
usual to that period.

The reports from the Treasurer, up
to this time, shew a very satisfactory
state of the Revenue.

Mr. President, and Honourable Gentlemen of the
Legislative Council;
Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly;

It affords me great satisfaction to ob-
serve, that the general prosperity of the
Province, notwithstanding some tempo-
rary check, which it is to be feared it
may receive from the deficiency of the
crops during the last season, seems to
be steadily advancing, and leaves little
for me to recommend to your conside-
ration, beyond the provisions for the Or-
dinary Services of the Province. Some
few particulars of minor importance will
be communicated by Message during
the Session.

At a meeting of the Rector, Church
Wardens and Vestry of Christ's Church,
Fredericton, held at the Church on the
14th day of December, 1836, read the
plan of the proposed Church Society;
whereupon Resolved, that this Corpo-
ration highly approve of the proposed

Church Society, and of the plan upon
which it is proposed to proceed with it;
that they are ready to become members
of the said Society themselves, and to
exert all their influence to obtain sup-
port to it from the members of the
Church in this Parish.

KING'S COLLEGE EXAMINATION.

The Examination of the College and its
introductory Seminary, the Collegiate
School, took place on Friday and Saturday
last.

The Students were examined, according
to their respective classes, in the Greek and
Latin authors read during the past term;
viz. Thucydides, Xenophon, Pindar, Sop-
hocles, Tacitus, Livy, Cicero and Horace.
They presented themselves, not with such
scanty portions as may be found in a *Delectus*,
but with entire volumes of those classi-
cal writers; and translated at the instant
passages then selected by the Examiners.
It is but just to add that, while almost all
the Students exhibited a marked improve-
ment, the description of the Plague of
Athens, the Fifth Olympian Ode, and the
First Chorus in Ajax, were rendered with a
precision and elegance which might have
elicited commendation in an English Uni-
versity. They were afterwards carefully ex-
amined in those parts of Logic in which they
had received instruction; and Mathematical
problems were solved by some of them with a
readiness which discovered a familiar ac-
quaintance with that branch of science.
But the most gratifying evidence, perhaps,
of their improvement in general knowledge
was found in the remarkable correct answers
given to a series of original questions, aris-
ing out of a course of Lectures in History
and its auxiliary sciences, Geography and
Chronology. At the conclusion of the Exami-
nation the Rev. Dr. Somerville bore testi-
mony to the respectful attention which the
Students had paid to his instructions during
the Term; and the Rev. the Vice-Presi-
dent, observing with how much pleasure he
had heard that declaration, confirmed it by
the satisfactory statement that, while the at-
tendance at Chapel and Lecture had been
highly exemplary, the general deportment
and conduct of the Students had very rarely
given him the least occasion for complaint.

The Examination of the School was con-
ducted in much the same manner. The
classical authors here produced were Homer,
Xenophon, Virgil, Horace and Caesar; pas-
sages from each of whom were construed
and parsed in a way sufficiently attesting
the diligence of the preceptor. But the
proficiency which some of the Scholars dis-
covered, in their Mathematical studies was
still more remarkable. The English de-
partment of the School also reflected not a
little credit on the ability and zeal with
which it had been instructed. Some really
admirable specimens of writing were exhi-
bited; and the correctness and spirit with
which the English History was read by a
numerous class of fine and hearty
boys could not but give cordial pleasure;
affording as it did a satisfactory proof that
in the heart of this loyal Province "the
King's English" is purely taught, and the
attention early directed to the peculiar ex-
cellencies of our Country's Constitution, and
the distinguished examples of piety, patrio-
tism and heroic virtue, which its history dis-
plays.

It is much to be wished that a successor
to the Rev. Dr. McCawley in the Profes-
sorship of Mathematics and Natural Phi-
losophy should be appointed; more espe-
cially as the senior pupils in the Collegiate
School have been found so well prepared to
pursue those branches of science, and as the
College is now furnished with a valuable
apparatus of philosophical instruments.—A
Lecturer in Geology and Mineralogy would
also find an interesting collection of mate-
rials ready for his use; Dr. Gesner, the
zealous and devoted cultivator of those stu-
dies in the neighbouring Province, having
recently presented the College with a rich
variety of specimens, chiefly the fruits of
his own investigations on the shores of the
Bay of Fundy.

The English Mail for November,
which arrived here yesterday, furnishes
London dates to the 3d and Falmouth
to the 5th ultimo. We subjoin a few
extracts:—

Considerable alarm has been excited
in the northern countries of England,
and in Scotland, by the premature set-
ting in of the winter, as in many dis-
tricts the potatoe crop is yet entirely
in the ground.

Whatever view can be taken of the
state of our Corn Market, will be found
to be indicative of progressive and high
advances in the price of Wheat; and
that to an extent warranting the as-
sumption that our ports will be open for
the admission of foreign grain, in the
ensuing spring, at a very low rate of
duty.

It is already discovered that the
stocks remaining after last year's har-
vest were insufficient for the demand
that has followed, when taken in con-
nection with the harvest of this year
and the consumption going on; notwith-
standing the impression which existed
some months since, that the abundance
of last year's harvest would fully make
up any deficiency in that now gathered
in. We think we can account pretty
satisfactorily, for this increase of con-
sumption over presumed abundance of
stock; and we proceed to do so, with

information before us, upon which we
believe the utmost reliance can be
placed.

The Paris papers of Tuesday bring
the startling intelligence of an attempt
just made by Louis Napoleon Bona-
parte, son of the Duchess of St. Leu,
to excite an insurrection at Strasburg.

The prisoners at Ham, are to be re-
moved to a *Maison de Sante*, but no
pardon will be offered them except on
their petition to the King.

FRANCE.—The Paris papers of Mon-
day are very barren of any news of the
slightest importance, foreign or domes-
tic. They are still engaged in specu-
lations upon the state of parties in the
Chamber, the incidents of the ceremony
of raising the obelisk, and the contra-
dictions to which the reception of the
new French Ambassador at Madrid had
led.

On the subject of Switzerland, the
Paris papers of Monday contain not a
word worth extracting. This silence
(of the Government journals at least)
our Paris letters attribute to the ex-
ceedingly serious aspect the affair had
assumed. Letters from good authority
in Berne had reached Paris, stating
that the majority of the committee to
which the documents connected with the
dispute with France had been referred
had resolved on reporting unfavourably
for the amicable adjustment of the mat-
ter. Our Paris letters on the other
hand, state that the French Govern-
ment had become incensed at the me-
anaced contumacy of the Cantons, and
had begun to think of exacting signal
submission, nothing short of a deputation
from the Cantons to the throne of
France, praying oblivion of the errors
and offences committed.—Times.

SPAIN.—A telegraphic despatch, da-
ted Bayonne, October 27th, received
by the French Government, states that
on the 20th General Rodil was at San-
to Cruz de Mudely, and in communica-
tion with General Alais at Baylen.
Gomez was at Fuencaliente, but no-
thing was known with respect to his
plans. General Alvarez, who had been
appointed to succeed the traitor Peon,
formed a junction with the Portuguese
division at Leon on the 17th. Saenz
had then returned into the Asturias,
having failed in his attacks on Leon and
Oviedo. On the 26th the Carlists were
actively engaged in carrying on the
siege of Bilbao, and had made several
ineffectual attempts to bar the river.

M. de Latorr Maubourg has, on the
part of the French Government, im-
peratively demanded a modification of the
Constitution of 1812, by the erection
of a second Chamber, the *rebo*, and a
reservation of the royal power of dis-
solving the Cortes. Reports have been
rife at Madrid that the northern po-
wers, King Louis Philip, and Lord Pal-
merston had united in the demand
for a moderate form of Government,
and that upon this condition Don Car-
los should be compelled to cede his
pretensions upon payment of an an-
nuity, but they received no credit.

The Queen Regent's speech to the
Cortes, on the 24th ult. has been re-
ceived by express from the Spanish
capital. There are several remarka-
ble points in this address, but at present
we would call attention to two—namely
the expression of confidence in her
ministers, and the apology which she
offers for the acts of oppression of which
they have been guilty since their acces-
sion to power. It is probably the first
time that a sovereign, "born and
bred," has apologised from the throne
for acts of rapine and injustice com-
mitted by the servants of the crown in
the alleged defence of the national li-
berties. The Queen Regent also, in
alluding to the manifestations of foreign
states towards Spain, takes occasion to
thank the British government, in the
person of Lord Palmerston, for the sup-
ply of 100,000 muskets, lately sent to
Spain by him. The King of the French
does not get quite so much applause as
his English ally. An apology is like-
wise offered by her Majesty for the
nonpayment of the dividends on the for-
eign debt, and similar apology is offer-
ed on behalf of the ministry, for having
issued the decree for the forced loan
without the sanction of the Cortes. It
remains to be seen how far that body
will sanction so outrageous an assump-
tion of their peculiar powers.—Herald.

PORTUGAL.—The excitement noticed
last week as existing in the Portuguese
capital has somewhat subsided, though
a trifling incident might suffer to bring
about another crisis. A decree pub-
lished in the *Diario* of the 12th, regu-
lates the elections for the general
Cortes, which are to meet on the 18th
January. The kingdoms of Portugal
and the Algarves, divided into 27 dis-
tricts, are to elect 112 members: each
district, with the exception of that of
Lisbon, electing from three to six de-
puties, in proportion to its population.
The metropolitan district has ten mem-

bers allotted to it. Twenty members
are allotted to the islands and colonies:
Madeira electing four deputies; the
Azores, eight; Cape Verde Islands,
two; Goa, two; and Angola, St. Tho-
mas, Mozambique, and Macao, (with
Timor and Solor,) one each. The suf-
frage is much the same as that which
constituted the basis of the late indirect
system; but here it is direct, and ac-
counts, with a few exceptions, to uni-
versal suffrage. A substitute for each
deputy is to be elected at the same
time. Three months, therefore, have
still to elapse before the Cortes can
meet.—A rumour was prevalent in the
early part of last week, that the British
Government were about to send a con-
siderable military force to Lisbon. For
this rumour there is no foundation. We
have at present in the Tagus a naval
force of six sail of the line, with an ex-
tra complement of marines. This force
is quite sufficient to carry into effect
the object of his Majesty's ministers;
viz., to give protection to British sub-
jects and British property; and in case
of necessity, to the Queen and Court of
Portugal.

In consequence of the preparations which
are making in this Office for the business of the
Legislature, the Proprietor of the *Royal Ga-
zette* has been prevented from completing the
composition of the defence to which reference
was made in last week's number. It will
shortly appear either in this Paper or in the
Saint John Courier.
