King's College, December 10, 1836.

The usual examination of the College and School will be held on Friday and Saturday, the 16th and 17th inst.

We are indebted to late American papers for the following summary of European intelligence.

The conservative papers are rejoicing over a manifest increase of conservatism, in almost every part of the country.

Parliament was opened, *pro forma*, on the 20th of October, and lastly prorogued to Thursday the 8th of December.

An order has been issued forbidding the commitment of any prisoners to Newgate, hereafter, except only those awaiting trial.

Hay was selling at Liverpool at 8 pounds (4) dollars per ton.

The death of Mrs. O Connell was reported at Dublin on the 19th of October. Ireland was still afflicted with the disturbances.

The English steamer Magnet and Red Rover came in contact with each other during a thick fog, off the north shore near London. The Red Rover went down in three minutes after; although there were near three thousand passengers on board of each boat, no lives were lost.

Conservative Dinner at Liverpool.—A large portion of the Morning Herald of the 20th of October, is occupied with an account of a grand conservative dinner given in Liverpool by the Trades' Conservative Association, on the 18th. Dinner tickets were issued for seven hundred and fifty persons; but these were all exhausted; hundreds applied who could not obtain them, even at the price of five guineas, which were offered for single tickets. The affair was got up with great splendour, and went off with unwearied spirit. Samuel Holme, President of the Society, presided, and discharged his office with distinguished ability. Among the speakers, in addition to the chair, were Lord Sandon, Hon. Charles Canning, Mr. R. B. W. Bramham, Mr. Gladstone, and Mr. Stuart Wortley. It was a festival which speaks well for the institutions of England.

STATE OF TRADE.

From the Manchester Advertiser, Oct. 23.  
BOLTON.—There is a slight depression here this week; the manufacturers are beginning to cry out, on account of their orders being stopped for exportation.

CHADDERTON.—Weavers complain sadly, and say that they have not more than half employment, particularly fancy silk weavers. There are but few cotton weavers in the neighbourhood.

HEYWOOD.—The cotton spinning and power-loom weaving is unusually brisk, and hand-are scarce. The fancy nankeen weavers at Unsworth and Prestwich are very busy, and weavers' wages are better for fancy work than they were twelve months since; yet plain cotton weavers are badly off.

MIDDLETON.—The silk weaving is unusually slack; weavers have to wait 12 or 14 days for a warp. Business is generally slack at this season; but it is expected to be brisk again after the silk fair. The raw material being so high is one of the principal things which

cause the slackness. Manufacturers have but few goods before hand, and they seem disposed to make only for present consumption.

ROCHDALE.—The market was rather dull on Monday for all sorts of linens; there was not much doing, owing to the wool giving way, which caused the buyers to wait them for less money. The wool market was very dull and heavy; all sorts of wool are coming down in price; consequently the manufacturers only buy a little for present use.

YORKSHIRE.—No alteration in the Leeds trade last week is noticed. Rather more business was done at Huddersfield, both in cloth and wool. At Bradford, yesterday week, low sixquarters still continued flat, and were to be had at considerably lower prices than were obtained some weeks ago. The demand for middle qualities still continued good, and fine goods maintained their prices. Not much was done in yarns, and the sales effected were at lower prices. The wool market continued extremely dull. At Halifax there was little demand for stuff goods of any kind, but prices were maintained. The Wakefield wool market on Friday last was dull, and prices a little lower.

MANCHESTER.—There is a considerable change in the goods market since last week; the prices are lower, and the sales are exceedingly limited. Power-loom printing calicoes are 6d a piece less than they were three or four weeks ago, the best 27 inch not being worth more than 8s. 9d to 8s. 10d, and very difficult to sell even at those prices; indeed, the buyers are afraid of touching a piece, except their immediate wants compel them to go into the market for a few to assort up their stocks. Twist has been in good demand until within the last few days; but the orders in hand being executed or engaged, the buyers are looking on, anticipating much lower prices.

FRANCE.—It is with great pleasure we announce that the state prisoners of war are at length released. Messrs. Perronet and Chateaufort first applied to the King for the remission of their sentence, which was immediately granted; M. de Raville then followed their example, with the like result; and Prince Polignac, at the solicitation of M. Lundy and the British minister, has had his doom changed to banishment from France, under the full weight of his condemnation and sentence of civil death.

The dukes de Nemours, second son to the King, has gone to Algiers, campaigning, after the example of his elder brother.

SPAIN.—The intelligence from Madrid is to the 15th of October.—The most important item is an account of the defeat of Gomez, the Carlist chief, by the royal forces under Alava and Espinosa, near Lucena, on the 13th. Some of the London Papers express doubts, but the report is strongly confirmed by the fact that Gomez had sent a flag to Alava, with offers to negotiate, at which there is no question. Gen. Alava refused to hold any terms with Gomez, seized the bearer of the flag, and sent him a prisoner to Madrid. The report was that the Carlists lost 2000 killed and prisoners in the engagement.

SWITZERLAND.—The Extraordinary Diet, convened for deliberation on the controversy with France, held its first session on the 17th of October at Berne. Nothing was done save the appointment of a committee to receive the instructions given by the several cantons to their deputies in the Diet, and report thereupon. The Diet adjourned, to meet again when the committee should be ready to report. A majority of the committee is said to be of the radical party, and disposed to be very "upish" toward France.

PORTUGAL.—The latest intelligence from Lisbon is of the 16th Oct. The new ministry were yet in office, but much embarrassed for want of money, and not likely to sustain themselves much longer. They were trying to concoct a plan for changing the mode of election, so as to make it conform with the newly adopted constitution. A decree had been issued appointing a special committee to investigate the causes of, and suggest a remedy for, the financial difficulties of the kingdom. The British fleet was still lying in the Tagus, with guns double-shotted and every thing ready for action in case of need. A hostile feeling to England existed very largely among the people. There were rumours of Miguelette demonstrations in the Algarves.

TURKEY.—It is said that the Russians have played Sultan Mahmoud a shabby trick, in restoring to him his fiefs of Silistria to a very dilapidated condition, and stripped of every gun that was good for any thing.

The insurrection in Bosnia has been

completely put down. Ali Fidaah Pasha, the chief instigator, has been captured and sent to chains to Constantinople.

The report of the death of Mehemet Ali, of Egypt, is not confirmed.

The governor of Smyrna has been displaced for extortionate conduct.

The Turkish army in Kurdistan has defeated and dispersed the band of the rebel Ravendoz Bey, and taken him prisoner. The Kurdish insurrection is therefore nearly at an end.

The plague was increasing at Constantinople, but its virulence was much less than usual.

There is a talk of an approaching war between Turkey and Persia, in consequence of some local aggressions on both sides.

UNITED STATES.—There seems to be little doubt that Mr. Van Buren is elected to the Presidency for the next term of four years, commencing on the 4th of March next. The electors throughout the Union would meet in their several States on Wednesday last, to throw their votes for President and vice-President.

Congress met at Washington on the 1st inst. By late accounts, it appears that President Jackson was in bad health, being affected with bleeding in the lungs.

CORONER'S INQUEST.—On Thursday last, an inquest was held on view of the body of *Ludlow Banks*, who was unfortunately drowned the evening previous. Verdict.—That the deceased came to his death by accidentally skating into an air hole, and was drowned.

## A BILL

To incorporate the Nashwaak Mill and Manufacturing Company.

WHEREAS the River Nashwaak affords a most desirable site for the erection of Mills and Machinery for the manufacture of Lumber and other purposes; and whereas a large amount of capital is required to be invested in order to make the same of great public utility as well to the farming as commercial interest of the Province, it is expedient that the individuals engaged in the undertaking should be incorporated.

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That Robert Rankin, William J. Bedell, Nathaniel Blake, Joseph Blake, John L. Blake, George E. Ketchum, Eli Ho-kins, H. G. Clopper, James Taylor, Jeremiah M. Connell and Thos. Gilbert, their associates, successors and assigns, be and they are hereby erected and declared to be a body politic and corporate by the name of *The Nashwaak Mill Company*, and by that name shall have the general powers and privileges made incident to a Corporation by Act of Assembly of this Province made and passed in the sixth year of His present Majesty's reign.

II. And be it enacted, That the first meeting of the said Corporation shall and may be held at Fredericton in the County of York, and shall and may be called by any two of the said Company, by publishing notice thereof for thirty days in the Royal Gazette, or in some other newspaper published in Fredericton, at which meeting or at any subsequent meeting to be for that purpose held, five directors (being members and stockholders of and in the said Corporation to such an extent as by the laws and regulations of the said Company may be provided) shall be chosen, which directors so chosen shall serve until the first annual meeting for the choice of directors, and until their successors are elected in their room, and shall have full power and authority to manage the concerns of the said Corporation, and shall commence the operations thereof, subject nevertheless to the laws and regulations which may from time to time be made by the said Corporation.

III. And be it enacted, That the capital stock of the said Company shall be forty thousand pounds and shall be divided into shares of twenty five pounds each, to be paid by the stockholders at such time or times as may be assessed and ordered by the said Company and the president and directors thereof as hereinafter directed: Provided nevertheless and it is hereby expressly required that fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock shall be paid within three years after the passing of this Act; and provided that the said Corporation shall not be entitled to purchase any property real or personal, or to incur any debts until the said fifteen per cent. of the capital stock as aforesaid shall be paid in.

IV. And be it enacted, That the said Corporation may and they are hereby authorized whenever the whole amount of the said capital or sum of forty thousand pounds shall have been paid in and expended for the purposes contemplated by this Act, at any general meeting of the said Corporation, from time to time to increase the said capital stock to any amount or amounts (not to exceed in the whole the sum of one hundred thousand pounds) by an assessment or assessments upon the shares in the property of the said Company.

V. And be it enacted, That all the shares in the said Company shall be numbered in progressive order, beginning at number one, and every member of the said Company shall have a certificate under the seal of the said Corporation and signed by the President and Secretary thereof, certifying his property in such shares as shall be expressed in the certificate.

VI. And be it enacted, That there shall be a general meeting of the shareholders and members of the said Corporation to be annually holden at Fredericton aforesaid at such time as shall for that purpose be appointed by the bye laws and ordinances of the said Corporation, at which annual meeting there shall be chosen of the said members five directors, being members and shareholders in the said Corporation to such an extent as may be provided and required in and by the said bye laws and ordinances of the said Company, who shall continue in office for one year or until others are chosen in their room, which directors when chosen shall at their first meeting after their election choose out of their number a President.

VII. And be it enacted, That every person owning a share in the capital stock of the said Corporation shall be a member thereof, and be entitled to vote at all meetings of the same, and members may give as many votes as they own shares, and that absent members may vote by proxy, each proxy being a stockholder and authorized in writing.

VIII. And be it enacted, That the president and directors of the said Corporation may from time to time assess upon each share such sum or sums of money as shall be judged by such Corporation necessary for

raising a capital or for the increase thereof for the payment of any debts of the said Corporation, and for the purchase of such real and personal property, and the erecting, building, making, setting up and procuring such buildings, dams, mills, boats, machinery and other things as may be deemed necessary and requisite for carrying on the business of the said Corporation. Provided always, that such assessment or assessments shall not in the whole exceed the amount of the capital stock appointed by this Act or the increased amount thereof, if the same shall be increased as hereinafter directed.

IX. Provided always and be it enacted, That unless fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock shall be actually paid in for the purposes of the said Corporation and a certificate of such payment signed and verified on oath by the said directors or a majority of them, which oath any Justice of the Peace is hereby authorized to administer, shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of the Province before the expiration of three years after passing of this Act, the operation of this Act shall cease and the existence of the said Corporation be terminated at the expiration of the said three years.

## A BILL

To incorporate *The Fredericton Manufacturing Company*.

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That —, and their associates, successors and assigns shall be and they are hereby erected into a Company, and declared to be a body politic and corporate by the name of *The Fredericton Manufacturing Company*, and by that name shall have all the general powers and privileges made incident to a Corporation by Act of Assembly of this Province.

II. And be it enacted, That the first meeting of the said Corporation shall be called by — or in case of his death, neglect or refusal, by any two of the said Company, by giving notice ten days at least previous to such meeting, which shall and may be holden at the time and place specified in such notice.

III. And be it enacted, That the capital stock of the said Corporation shall consist of the sum of ten thousand pounds to be paid in such money as shall at the time of the several payments hereinafter expressed be a legal tender in this Province; fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock to be paid in before the said Corporation shall be entitled to purchase any property real or personal or to incur any debts, and the remainder of the said stock to be paid at such time and times and in such parts or portions as the directors for the time being shall from time to time think necessary, the whole amount of such capital stock to be divided into shares of five pounds each.

IV. And be it enacted, That so soon as the said capital stock shall have been paid in and expended for the purposes of this Corporation, it shall and may be lawful for the said stockholders at any general meeting to be for that purpose called, to increase the said capital stock from time to time in such sums as they may deem expedient to a sum not exceeding fifty thousand pounds, and shall have power from time to time to increase the number of shares accordingly, or from time to time to assess such increase upon the original number of shares, or to increase the capital by both assessment upon and increase of shares.

V. And be it enacted, That the joint stock and property of the said Corporation shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the Company.

VI. And be it enacted, That unless fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock shall be actually paid in for the purposes of the said Corporation, and a certificate of such payment made and verified on oath by the directors of the said Corporation or a majority of them, (which oath any Justice of the Peace is hereby authorized to administer) shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of the Province before the expiration of three years after the passing of this Act, the operation of this Act shall cease and the existence of the said Corporation be terminated at the expiration of the said three years.
