We beg to call the particular attention of our readers to the advertisement in our columns of Messrs. AT a meeting of the Board of Directors of *The Central Fire Insurance Company*, held at the office of the Company on Monday, 5th December, 1836:

PRESENT.

The President,
Mr. Hartt, Mr. Smith,
Barker, Chestnut,
McPherson, Fisher.

The following Resolutions were passed:
1. *Resolved*, unanimously, That this Board are utterly at a loss to ascertain the motive the Directors of the Central Bank had in view in passing the Resolutions which they agreed to at a special meeting, held on the 25th of November last, which it is presumed was for that purpose specially holden, inasmuch as they all appear to refer to a pledge, which they, the Directors of the Central Bank, assert this Board gave to them relative to the appropriation of the funds of this Corporation. The walls of the Central Bank must, in the opinion of this Board, contain extraordinary obnoxious qualities, or a majority of the Directors of that Institution, who were present at the special meeting, have acted a most impetuous, unaccountable and inconsistent part. The Directors of the Central Bank appear to have forgotten, that this creature of their imagination was generated some thirty days ago, and a special meeting of the Stockholders of the Central Fire Insurance Company called to ascertain and determine the fact of its existence. At that meeting, in the calling of which they took a distinguished part, they attended in the twofold but heterogeneous capacity of accusers and judges, and after a patient and careful investigation, to use their own language, the Stockholders, including Messrs. Pickard, O. Smith, Bedell and J. T. Smith, a majority of the Directors who attended the special meeting of the Central Bank, "unanimously resolved, that there were no grounds whatever for the report, that the Directors of this Company have been guilty of a breach of faith with the Central Bank—that their proceedings had been just and honorable, and the affairs of the Company conducted with integrity—that their conduct met and merited the approbation of the Stockholders, and that this Board was justly entitled to the thanks of the Stockholders." The aforementioned Directors cannot have forgotten that these Resolutions were modified to meet the sole scruples of themselves and the Solicitor of the Central Bank, in order that the word unanimously might properly be included. It is a matter of great surprise that the Directors of the Central Bank did not dispute the authenticity of the minutes of this Board at the meeting of the Stockholders, for the Resolution of the Board referred to in the 4th Resolution passed at the special meeting at the Bank, was read aloud on the first day's meeting in the presence of the President of the Central Bank, Mr. Simpson, and the four Directors above referred to, was in the hands of the President of the Central Bank, Mr. Simpson's, and some of the other Directors, and also audibly read by the President of this Company at the adjourned meeting of the Stockholders of this Institution, when the four Directors above mentioned were likewise present, when it was not pretended by any of the Directors of the Central Bank that the Resolution then read was not the Resolution which was agreed to on the 22d August last. Indeed what renders the conduct of the majority of the Directors of the Central Bank still more incomprehensible is the fact, that they, together with Mr. Clopper, the President, and Mr. Simpson, exercised all their influence and ingenuity at the special meeting of the Stockholders of the Central Fire Insurance Company, to avoid an investigation of the minutes of this Company relative to the proceedings of this Board with the Central Bank, or any enquiry into the alleged "breach of faith."

2. *Resolved*, unanimously, That on Monday the 22d of August last, the Directors of this Company attended at what the Directors of the Central Bank have been pleased to call a conference, being in reality a meeting of this Board in the upper back room of the Central Bank, whilst the Directors of the Bank were meeting in the front room. At that meeting Mr. Simpson, the former President of this Company, being also one of the Directors of the Central Bank, after retiring to the sittings of the Bank Directory, returned and informed the Board what the funds of this Company then paid into the Central Bank amounted to, and also stated certain promises or pledges which the Directors of the Bank wished this Board to make, relative to the disposal of the funds of the Company when finally received, which were indignantly rejected by this Board, every Director present repudiating the idea of an independent body pledging themselves to any other

Institution as to the future management of its affairs, and after some little conversation a resolution was agreed to, which resolution, in the hand writing of Mr. Fisher, was carried into the room then occupied by the Bank Directors by Mr. Simpson, and was the only perfect act or resolution this Board agreed to that day. No minute of this meeting was ever made on the Books of the Company, as this Board never for one moment could entertain the idea that their deliberations were to be regulated by the will or opinion of any other Board of Directors; but to prevent any misunderstanding the resolution was copied by Mr. Simpson, and filed amongst the rough minutes of the Company, and read by Mr. Simpson and confirmed at the first succeeding meeting of this Board. And this Board most distinctly challenge the Board of Directors of the Central Bank either to show that this Board has in any respect departed from that resolution, or that any other resolution did or does exist, or that any evasion of the understanding then established has been attempted but by themselves.

3. *Resolved*, unanimously, That the 7th, 8th and 9th Resolutions of the special meeting being an exculpation of the conduct of Mr. Simpson, any observation thereupon by this Board is at this time quite unnecessary and uncalled for.

4. *Resolved*, That the three supplementary resolutions referring solely to certain charges said to have been made against Mr. Clopper at the meeting of the Stockholders at the office of this Company, by Mr. Asa Coy and Mr. Gaynor, have no bearing whatever upon the duties of this Board, although this Board fully appreciate the candid, honorable and independent manner Mr. Gaynor and Mr. Coy conducted themselves at the meeting of the Stockholders; this Board are of opinion that it has business of much more importance to attend to, than to interfere with the private differences of any number of individuals however influential or important any one of them may be in any quarter.

5. *Resolved*, That the minutes of this day's proceedings, together with the resolution passed at what is called the conference on the 22d of August last on the file of the Company in the hand writing of Mr. Simpson, be published. Minutes of the Meeting at the Central Bank on the 22d of August, 1836:

The Directors having this day met at the Banking Rooms of the President and Directors of the Central Bank, agreeably to their request on a conference respecting the funds deposited for the Central Fire Insurance Company in the vaults of that Institution, the following resolution was moved and adopted.

That all the specie received from the Central Bank, shall be returned to that Institution, so soon as the same is counted by the Commissioners, and that the Bank will be called upon for no specie but to refund payment actually made by the Stockholders in the said Bank for payment of stock; and

That the other deposits in the several incorporated Banks be removed therefrom in specie and deposited in the vaults of the Central Bank to the credit of the Corporation, but reserve to themselves the privilege of again withdrawing the amount of specie received from other Banks, provided those Institutions may desire to have it again after being counted.

The meeting then adjourned.

A BILL

To incorporate *The Fredericton Manufacturing Company.*

I. *BE* it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That —, and their associates, successors and assigns shall be and they are hereby erected into a Company, and declared to be a body politic and corporate by the name of *The Fredericton Manufacturing Company*, and by that name shall have all the general powers and privileges made incident to a Corporation by Act of Assembly of this Province.

II. And be it enacted, That the first meeting of the said Corporation shall be called by — or in case of his death, neglect or refusal, by any two of the said Company, by giving notice ten days at least previous to such meeting, which shall and may be holden at the time and place specified in such notice.

III. And be it enacted, That the capital stock of the said Corporation shall consist of the sum of ten thousand pounds, to be paid in such money as shall at the time of the several payments hereinafter expressed be a legal tender in this Province; fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock to be paid in before the said Corporation shall be entitled to purchase any property real or personal or to insure any debts, and the remainder of the said stock to be paid at such time and times and in such parts or portions as the directors for the time being shall from time to time think necessary, the whole amount of such capital stock to be divided into shares of five pounds each.

IV. And be it enacted, That so soon as the said capital stock shall have been paid in and expended for the purposes of this Corporation, it shall and may be lawful for the said stockholders at any general meeting to be for that purpose called, to increase the said capital stock from time to time in such sums as they may deem expedient to a sum not exceeding fifty thousand pounds, and shall have power from time to time to increase the number of shares accordingly, or from time to time to assess such increase upon the original number of shares, or to increase the capital by both assessment upon and increase of shares.

V. And be it enacted, That the joint stock and property of the said Corporation shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the Company.

VI. And be it enacted, That unless fifteen per cent. of the said capital stock shall be actually paid in for the purposes of the said Corporation, and a certificate of such payment made and verified on oath by the directors of the said Corporation or a majority of them, (which oath any Justice of the Peace is hereby authorized to administer) shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of the Province before the expiration of three years after the passing of this Act, the operation of this Act shall cease and the existence of the said Corporation be terminated at the expiration of the said three years.
