

boats started, the rowers, having tried each other's powers in the long round, they came in, in couples—the prizes being carried by L. Johnson's Who'd have thought it, \$20; A. Brackett's Miller's Daughter \$12; J. B. Martin's Bold Britannia \$8; and Negus's Better Late than Never \$4.

The Fourth was the canoe race, in which a great number competed; it, as usual, excited much interest, and afforded a great deal of amusement. The first prize of \$12 was won with ease by Louis Paul, who has generally been successful in former years. An Indian named Prosper, got the second of \$10, Paul Coke \$8, and James Paul \$6.

The Fifth Race was for the Silver Cup, by gentlemen amateurs.—Four gigs started—the Adelaide, owned by Mr. Tapp, and manned by the gentlemen of the Ordnance Department; the Elizabeth, owned by Sir Thomas Usher, and manned by gentlemen of the Rifles, The Victoria, owned by the Hon. T. N. Jeffery; and the Water Witch, owned by Mr. Bauer, both manned by young natives of the town. This race excited a great deal of interest; the sympathies of the great majority of the spectators were naturally with their young townsmen—but, as the two opposing gigs were rowed by full grown and athletic men, they appeared to have but little chance. To our great astonishment, however, the Victoria came in far ahead, and the water witch next. The former was rowed by Messrs. R. Beaumont, Boggs, George Paw, Samuel Story, Jared Chipman, and steered by Thomas Boggs, Jun.; the latter by Messrs. Edward Pyke, Edward Twining, John Creighton, John Howe, and steered by William Creighton.

The presentation of the Cups came next. Several showers having fallen in the course of the morning, Lady Campbell, whose health is delicate, was obliged to leave the ground, and Miss Halkett performed the ceremony of presentation. The young gentlemen then adjourned to the Umpires' tent, and drank a bumper or two of Champagne. We regret to find that there has been an omission in the inscription on the Cups, no mention having been made of the share which the fair ladies, connected with the Army and Navy had in the subscriptions with which they were purchased.

The Sixth Race was for Indian Canoes, paddled by Squaws. This was quite a novel feature in the sports of the day. About half a dozen Canoes started, paddled by three ladies each—and indeed they seemed to enter as heartily into the competition as their more athletic lords and masters. Mary Tony won her \$10 fairly in Lewis Paul's Canoe—Mary Thomas took the second prize of \$6, and Madeline Morris the third of \$4.

The Seventh Race, (Sweepstakes of \$50) was contested by four oared gigs, chiefly manned by Shoremen, and won by the Ariel and by Mr. E. Cunard, Junr. This ended the rowing Races; and as there was scarcely a breath of wind, of course the greatest attractions of the scene. An immense number of sail boats were however at the line, clothed with all kinds of sails, and others in readiness to catch "airs from heaven or blasts from hell," or any other quarter; the starting scenes were motley and rather amusing, for so closely were the boats crowded together, that with the lightness of the wind, it was almost impossible for them to get away and keep from running foul of each other. Away they went, however, and the whole of the afternoon was occupied by tacking, trimming, wetting sails, and making the most of the wind there was.

The First Sailing Race, for fishermen's boats was won by the Mary, owned by Mr. Slackenwhite, \$50. The Fair Maid was the second, owned by John Fleming, who got \$30. The LaHogue, Edward Hays, \$20.

Second Race—third class boats, \$20, won by the Snake, William Stone; the Friendly Intention, David Smith, \$15; the Splitting Knife, George Brown, \$10.

Third Race—second class boats, \$50, won by the Triumph, owned by Mr. Fullerton; \$30, Ellen, Mr. Ince.

Fourth Race—first class boats, \$50, won by the Sir P. Halkett, a new boat, built for the occasion by Mr. E. Mosely; \$30, by the Water Witch, owned by the officers of the 83d Regiment.

The Melville flag ship, 74, had been hauled alongside the Dock Yard, and decorated by her officers in the most splendid manner, for the Ball which terminated the day's amusement. We understand also that the exclusiveness, with which such entertainments have in most cases been conducted, was upon this occasion considerably relaxed, and a mixed company assembled of the rank, fashion, and beauty of Halifax, not to be surpassed. Nothing could exceed the polite attention of the gallant officers to their welcome guests, and the hilarity of the evening was uninterrupted till a late hour. Supper was served on the lower decks, and the tables groined with substantial and delicacies of the season. After supper several loyal and stirring toasts were drunk, dancing recommenced, and the company finally separated, highly gratified, and carrying in their hearts an enduring remembrance of the gallant and respectful attention of the "true blues"—an incident for memory which will be dwelt on with pleasurable emotion in after years.

The Melville, by the courtesy of Sir Peter Halkett, was free for inspection from Wednesday last until Sunday evening, and thousands of the town's people have availed themselves of the opportunity to visit, what must be a curiosity to nine tenths of the population—the interior of a British 74.—*Halifax Times.*
