The attention of young men who have made a superior proficiency at school is invited to the advertisement in another column, offering a Scholarship in our Provincial University to general competition. This prize, it will be observed, is open to all candidates, without any other condition than that they be prepared for the specified examination. The best scholar may consequently be assured of his election, whether born and educated in the Province or elsewhere, and without enquiry after the class in Society, or religious denomination, to which he may belong. Nor will his subsequent progress be affected by such considerations; graduation, as well as matriculation, in this College being unlimited by subscription or other tests, except in the instance of degrees in Divinity—which very few desire, and none need to take.

Should a respectable number of candidates appear on the present occasion, it is very likely that the College Council will feel themselves encouraged to establish other Scholarships of the same description; so that one perhaps may be proposed for competition at each return of the annual Examinations. For the Council are fully alive to the importance of their trust, and resolved to omit no means in their power to promote the efficiency of the College and extend its usefulness.

An error prevails in some quarters which it may be expedient to take this opportunity of correcting. The College has been considered, it is difficult to conceive on what grounds, as chiefly, if not exclusively, a theological institution. So far is this from being the case, that, while undue prominence has never been given to its theological instruction, of the twenty one Students in actual attendance on the Lectures of the present Term, a single individual only is known to entertain the intention of becoming a Minister of Religion. The disproportion is indeed to be much lamented, and cannot fail to lead to the most serious reflections in those who regard the best interests of the community. For however valuable a liberal education may be to the physician, the lawyer, and in other walks of life, the presence of young men prospectively devoted to the sacred profession is exceedingly desirable in the College itself; while the general welfare will always require a competent number of Clergymen, whose learning shall command respectful attention, and enabled to bestow their whole time and talents on the duties of their holy office.

In our columns of last week appeared an advertisement from Mr. Dickson, announcing his intention of commencing a course of Lectures on English Grammar. Having seen Mr. D's testimonials, we have no hesitancy in recommending him to the favourable notice of all who may be anxious to obtain a correct and critical knowledge of the English language; but more especially to those individuals whose education in this essential branch of literature may have been neglected in their early youth. The Editor of the Newfoundland "Times" speaking from personal knowledge of Mr. D's mode of instruction, says that it will accomplish as much "in the short space of one month, as the old system of teaching is calculated to do in twenty four."

We are gratified to learn that the Lectures commenced on Monday night last, to a respectable class, with the prospect of several additions being made to it during the week. Might not a female class be formed, instructions to whom to be imparted during the day?

The Common Council unanimously re-elected John R. Partelow, Esquire, Chamberlain for the ensuing year; and His Worship the Mayor re-appointed Mr. Joshua Bunting to the office of High Constable.

HALIFAX, April 5, 1836.

Yesterday His Excellency came down to the Province Building in the usual state, and closed the Session of the Legislature. Salutes were fired from the Citadel Hill, and a Company of the Rifle Brigade received His Excellency at the entrance of the Building. The Assembly being summoned to the Council Chamber, were prorogued in the following Speech:

Mr. President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council.
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I thank you in His Majesty's name for the Supplies you have granted for the Public Service during the present year. It shall be my study as well as my duty, to see that they are faithfully applied.

I am concerned to observe, that the usual Grant to the Inspecting Field Officers of Militia has been omitted; but I confidently trust that next Session you will continue that Grant, as the means of maintaining that constitutional Arm of Defence and security to the Province in a state of efficiency.

I regret that the Union of King's and Dalhousie Colleges, as submitted to you at the commencement of the Session, and as recommended by His Majesty's Government, has been postponed. I trust that in the next Session you will operate in accomplishing this measure, as it is evident that there are not means within the Province for maintaining two Colleges, without depriving some of the useful public Seminaries and Parochial Schools of part of the Grants now so liberally made to them by you, for the Education of the Children of the great mass of the People, who are so widely dispersed in this Province.

I also regret that a more favourable consideration has not been given to the improvement of the Great Roads and Bridges, leading from the Capital through the Province. I regret this the more, as I had been led to entertain better hopes from the resolution expressed by you in the last Session.

In now relieving you from further attendance in General Assembly, I cannot but convey to you my best acknowledgements for the zeal and ability with which you have discharged your Legislative duties; and I am sure that upon your return to your respective homes, you will continue to inspire and cultivate those sound principles of loyalty and affection to our most Gracious Sovereign, and attachment to the Parent Kingdom, which alone can promote and secure the real interests of this happy and contented Colony.

Died.

On the 27th ultimo, after a lingering illness, Mr. Jedediah Carvell, in the 39th year of his age, leaving a wife and five small children to lament their loss; his remains were interred on the Friday following, numerously and respectfully attended.

On the 2d inst. after a long and painful illness, which she bore with pious resignation to the Divine will, Mrs. Hannah Witham, in the 24th year of her age, leaving a disconsolate husband and a large circle of friends to lament their loss.

At the Rectory House, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, on the 11th ultimo, Mr. Hugh McMaster, aged 76, long a resident of this Province.

At his residence in Londonderry, on Friday the 18th December, Colonel ANDREW BROWN, Commander of the most honorable order of the Bath, late of the 79th Highlanders. This distinguished officer and excellent man joined that highly respectable corps on its formation in 1793, and shared in all its noble achievements from that period to the end of the late war; Colonel Brown embarked with his regiment for Egypt in 1807, as Lieutenant and Adjutant, and was present with it on its landing on the 8th of March, and in all the actions that subsequently took place in that country, in which the British troops were engaged, for which service the Egyptian medal was conferred upon him in 1808 Colonel Brown proceeded with his regiment to Portugal, and was present at the battle of Corunna on the 16th of January following, and the other engagements which were previously fought in the Peninsula; he also served in Holland and throughout the whole of the Peninsular war, from 1811 to the battle of Toulouse in 1814; at Waterloo, Colonel Brown was most severely wounded in the mouth, at which time two companies of the 79th were nearly all cut off; after the war he served in America, and retired from the army in 1830, with great honor to himself, and honored with the respect and esteem of the whole regiment. In Colonel Brown true religion and great courage were concomitant, and we have seldom had to record the death of a more amiable fellow citizen. —*Londonderry Sentinel.*

The brave and distinguished individual whose death is announced in the above paper, was a brother of Mrs. Somerville, the Lady of our worthy and highly respected townsman, the Rev. Dr. Somerville, L.L.D.

RESOLVED, That for the future, in the accounts of the Overseers of the Poor for any Parish in which relief shall be extended to Emigrants, which accounts shall be transmitted to this House with the view of procuring reimbursement from the Emigrant fund, it shall be made to appear in a separate column, stating the names of such Emigrants, that every such Emigrant for whom a charge is made, has arrived in the Province within one year immediately before the time of such relief being so extended, otherwise this House will not agree to an appropriation for any such charge; this restriction being in the opinion of this House necessary, in order to comply with the spirit and intention of the Emigrant Act, 2 W. 4, c. 26.
