THE ROYAL TAR.—On Monday last, this fine new steamer made a trial of her machinery, which we are glad to say, (considering the disadvantages always attendant on the first starting,) was very promising.

After the boat had plied about the harbour for some time, between two and three hundred of our citizens were regaled in her splendid and spacious cabins with a hot luncheon, accompanied by "rivers of Sherry and oceans of Champagne," provided for the occasion by the spirited and hospitable owners. All on board seemed highly pleased with the excursion and the repast, and in return for their gentlemanly and generous reception from the owners and Master of the Boat, (Capt. THOMAS REED), drank a number of appropriate toasts, among which were, "Success to the Royal Tar," "Health and Wealth to the enterprising and liberal Owners of the Royal Tar," "The Captain of the Royal Tar," "The patriotic and beloved Sovereign from whom the Royal Tar is named, THE SAILOR KING!"

On Thursday morning the Royal Tar started for Eastport and St. Andrews, whence she returned yesterday, performing the passage from Eastport to this harbour in less than five hours—which is considered a very quick run.

The Royal Tar has a fine appearance on the water, and is fitted up with every convenience to ensure comfort and accommodation to passengers; and from the well known character of her commander, we are persuaded that nothing will be wanting on his part to give general satisfaction.—Saint John Courier, May 7.

BEWARE OF COUNTERFEITS!—This Province, we fear, is likely to be overrun by counterfeit American Notes. Several of this description were circulated at Saint Andrews last week; and we are sorry to say that it once instance, at Lancaster, in the vicinity of this City, a Mr. Atkinson, received from an American named THADDEUS BARTLETT, to the amount of \$500 of the worthless paper; and others have also been imposed upon by the same individual. The forgeries, we understand, are principally Five Dollar Notes of the Waldo Bank, Belfast, and Lincoln Bank, Bath, both payable to C. Goodwin, and dated 1st October, 1832. A warrant was issued on Saturday last, for

the apprehension of Bartlett; but we regret to learn that he has not as yet been apprehended.

As it is probable that attempts will be made by this worthy and his emissaries to circulate his forgeries to other parts of the Province, and in Nova Scotia, too much caution cannot be exercised in receiving Foreign Bank Notes, especially from strangers or suspicious characters. We trust the authorities will succeed in bringing the offenders to Justice.—Ibid.

Died.

At his residence in Fredericton, on the 2d instant, after a protracted and painful illness, which he bore with Christian piety and resignation, the Rev. Mr. M'Sweeney, Roman Catholic Priest, in the 38th year of his age. Mr. M'S. was distinguished for integrity of principle, universal benevolence, and unbounded liberality to the poor and distressed, and for the mild and charitable disposition which he evinced towards all classes of the community. He was justly endeared to the numerous flock, over which he had the pastoral charge for a series of years, and his death is deeply felt and regretted by a large circle of his friends and acquaintances.

His mortal remains were carried in solemn procession to the Catholic burying ground, and there deposited, attended by a numerous and respectable concourse of the inhabitants of this town and its vicinity.

The Rev. Mr. Cummins Parish Priest of Saint Andrews officiated on this melancholy occasion; and his timely arrival, which was unexpected, afforded much consolation to the deceased in his departure from this transitory world.

At St. John, on the 2d inst. after a short illness, the Honorable RICHARD SIMONDS, Treasurer of the Province, aged 47 years.

The death of this truly estimable man leaves a blank in the community which it will be difficult to replace; and as a public servant, with all the varied, though necessary qualifications to discharge the duties appertaining to a high and responsible office, such as he filled, we know not where one can be found who could give such general satisfaction.—He entered at a very early age into public life, having been returned when very young as one of the Members in General Assembly for the County of Northumberland, and he continued as such, until the latter part of the year 1828, when he was appointed by Sir Howard Douglas, on the death of the Hon. JOHN ROBINSON, Treasurer of the Province, and a Member of the Executive and Legislative Councils, then united.—He was at that time Speaker of the House of Assembly, to which situation he had been elevated in February 1828.

On the separation of the Executive and Legislative Councils, in 1833, he was attached to the latter, and was one of its most efficient members.—He has left a wife and numerous family and relatives, to whom his loss will be irreparable, and we truly sympathize with them in their affliction.

His remains were interred on Friday, attended by a very large number of citizens, and several Gentlemen from other parts of the Province, who were desirous to pay the last tribute of respect due to an individual so highly and universally esteemed.—The stores, &c. throughout the City were closed during the time occupied by the funeral ceremonies.

At Saint John on Wednesday morning last, after a short illness, Mrs. Eliza, wife of Mr. Simeon Lee Lugin, Merchant, of that City, aged 35 years.
