WHEREAS in pursuance of the authority
vested in me by an Act of the General
Assembly of this Province, intitled "An Act
to extend the privilege of solemnizing Marriage
to all Ministers or Teachers of the several Re-
ligious Congregations in this Province," Licence
was heretofore granted to the Reverend Enoch
Wood, a Minister of the denomination of Chris-
tians called Wesleyan Methodists in this Pro-
vince, giving to him, the said Enoch Wood,
the privilege to celebrate and solemnize Mar-
riage between persons being of that denomi-
nation;

And whereas the said Enoch Wood has
in writing under his hand declared his de-
termination not to consider himself under any
restriction in the celebration of Marriage among
persons of any denomination, providing in other
respects there is no legal objection; which de-
claration on the part of the said Enoch Wood
being contrary to the terms of the said Licence,
and an abuse of the power vested in me by the
said Act, I do hereby in pursuance of the said
power and authority vested in me by the said
Act of the said General Assembly, revoke and
recall the said Licence so as aforesaid granted
to him, the said Enoch Wood, of which all
persons concerned will take due notice.

in the seventh year of His Majesty's

AVON BRIDGE.—A part of the scaffolding
and other work, which has lately been erect-
ed, fell with a great crash on Wednesday
the 31st ult. Twelve persons were precipi-
tated with the ruins into the river, but no
severe bodily injuries occurred. The acci-
dent, it is said, is attributable to the Con-
tractor, on whose shoulders the loss will
fall. It will put him back with his work at
least a week, and cost about £150.—St.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23.
GREAT FIRE.—Last night, about 12
o'clock, a Fire broke out in a part of the
premises in Albemarle Street, occupied as a
Brewery by Mr. Morrissey. Before any as-
sistance arrived, the flames had reached such
a height, as to defy any attempts to subdue
them. Unfortunately too, a continuance of
dry weather has so reduced the wells of the
town, that scarcely any water could be had,
and the engines which were soon on the spot,
with their attendants, were of little ser-
vice, indeed only added fuel to the flames,
while raging at their height. The conse-
quence was, that not only the place where
the fire originated, but the extensive brew-
ery, with the houses adjoining, and a section
of the square in a line back, and fronting on
Grafton street, in the direction of the wind,
which was at south west, became a prey to
the flames. At length a more plentiful
supply of water being obtained by forming
ditches to the wharves, the engines were
brought into play sufficiently brisk to pre-
vent the fire from spreading beyond the
square in which it commenced; and to the
exertions of this branch of the Fire Depart-
ment, may be attributed the safety of the
surrounding property. At one time indeed,
great apprehensions were entertained for
the opposite block in Grafton street, as a
store owned by Mr. W. Black, ironmonger,
had taken fire on the roof, and the heat was
most intense, from the proximity of the
burning houses. With the exception of the
brewery, and its appendages, the other
buildings destroyed were occupied chiefly as
Dwellings, and the loss is therefore not so
great as it might have been, had the fire
happened in a part of the town where busi-
ness is more extensively transacted. As it
is, however, it must be considered as a
disaster of a comfortable home. His Excellency
the Lieutenant Governor, the Hon. T. N.
Jeffery, and other distinguished inhabitants,
were at the scene, directing and aiding the
people to extinguish the flames. The Army
and Navy were as usual most effective in
their valuable assistance.

The principal sufferers by this disastrous
fire, which for extent is the severest calamity
of the kind with which Halifax has been
for a long time visited, are—Mr. Morrissey,
loss of brewery and stores, insured at £1500.
Dr. Head, two houses uninsured. Mr. Jno.
Steel, house insured. Property of Mr.
Lockyer, supposed to be insured. Mr. Jno.
Esson, house insured for £250. Estate of
late Mitchell, carpenter, insured. Mrs.
Thomas, house insured for £600. In addi-
tion to these losses is that of the African
school, which was pulled down.—*Times.*
