

the overhanging staging between the towers, it has been determined by the Directors to postpone the further prosecution of the work till Spring, when we have no doubt it will be completed in a short time. Indeed, considering the magnitude of the work which has already been accomplished, and the casualties and delays which those who undertook it have had to contend with, we think they have exceeded general expectation, in having done so much work in one of our short seasons.—*Saint John Courier*, Nov. 12.

The Weather has been unusually severe for the season. Sleighs have been in requisition during the week, and we understand a number of the smaller rivers are frozen over. There are a number of vessels in port, and every day furnishes a new arrival. We trust, however, to experience a short respite before the winter sets in.—*Miramichi Gleaner*, Nov. 8.

The Mexican Envoy to the United States has left for his own country, and speculations are as plenty as blackberries among the American Editors, respecting the causes which led to the adoption of so serious a step. The opinion most generally entertained appears to be, that as the President of the United States either could not or would not give a satisfactory reason for the occupation, by the American troops under Gen. Gaines, of a part of the Mexican territory, the Minister of the latter country could not, consistently with his duty, longer continue in friendly relation with the United States, and he therefore took his leave. Blame is attributed to General Jackson, for keeping studiously concealed from the Mercantile body, all knowledge of the difficulties which had taken place, which are likely seriously to affect the interests of a large portion of them who are so deeply engaged in the Mexican trade.—*Montreal Gazette*, October 27.

THE MONEY AND PROVISION MARKETS.—It is somewhat singular, that, notwithstanding the scarcity of money, the price of provisions and the expenses of living should be so extravagantly high. As a general rule, whenever money is scarce, the prices of everything are low, and vice versa; at present, as the money market grows harder, the prices of all articles of living, regularly advance; which can only be owing to the unusual and extraordinary disproportion between the demand and supply.

What a prospect have we before us for the winter season! With pork at thirty dollars per barrel—a higher price than has been known in this city for the last twenty years—flour at ten dollars per barrel, with every prospect, notwithstanding the importation of foreign grain, of being fifteen or twenty—and other articles of provision nearly in proportion, the extreme poor will not be the only sufferers. With not enough provisions to buy if money was plenty, and no money to purchase them, though in abundance, little less than starvation must be the lot of many. The richer classes too, will have to lament as well a state of things principally produced by the political perversity and stupidity of politicians, the reckless gambling of unprincipled speculators, and the adroit manoeuvres of selfish and heartless monopolists.—*New York Paper*.
